

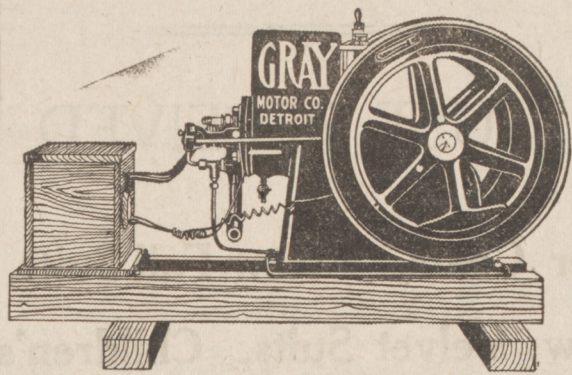

NEW BISHOP OF NATCHEZ

Atlanta, Ga., Aug. 29.—In the presence of a great gathering of prelates and priests of the South and of the Catholic laity of Atlanta and vicinity the Rev. John E. Gunn, D. D., was today consecrated bishop of Natchez, Miss., as successor of the late Bishop Heslin. The ceremony was performed in Sacred Heart Church and was attended by all the pomp and detail prescribed by the Roman Catholic ritual. The consecrating prelate was Archbishop Blenk of New Orleans, who was assisted by the bishops of Savannah, Mobile, Nashville and other cities of the South.

The new bishop of Natchez was born in Ireland forty-eight years ago and comes of a family that has been prominent for generations in the famous Irish lace industry. He received his early education under the direction of the Marist Fathers in Dundalk, Ireland, and later studied the higher branches of learning in England and in Rome. In the latter city he was ordained to the priesthood in 1890. For two years following his ordination he was engaged in mission work in England. Then he came to America to become a teacher in the new Marist College in Atlanta and later was assigned to the Sacred Heart parish in this city. He continued his pastoral duties and mission work in this vicinity until his recent appointment to the bishopric.

AMERICAN BAR MEETING

Boston, Mass., Aug. 29.—The thirty-fourth annual meeting of the American Bar Association was opened in Huntington Hall, today and will continue through tomorrow and Thursday, concluding with a banquet Thursday evening. Many eminent representatives of the Massachusetts bar were present at the opening, in addition to some 400 delegates from other parts of the country.

President Edgar H. Farrar, of New Orleans, called the gathering to order and Lieutenant Governor Frothingham and Mayor Fitzgerald delivered the greetings of the State of Massachusetts and the city of Boston. In his opening address President Farrar reviewed the most noteworthy changes in statute law in the several States and by Congress during the past year. The initial session concluded with the annual reports of the other officers and the election of new members.

Tomorrow morning former Justice Henry B. Brown of the Supreme Court of the United States will read a paper on the "New Federal Judicial Code." In the evening William B. Hornblower of New York will be chosen at the session Thursday morning.

WILL CHEAPER IMPLEMENTS RUIN THE FARMER?

The reciprocity agreement will benefit the farmers of York in two ways. It will give him larger, more accessible and more stable markets. It will give him the benefit of substantial reductions in the duty which he has to pay on the machinery and implements of his calling.

The duty on wagons will be cut from 25 per cent. to 22½ per cent. On plows from 20 per cent. to 15 per cent.

On tooth and disc harrows, from 20 per cent. to 15 per cent. On binders from 17½ per cent. to 15 per cent.

On drills and planters, from 20 per cent. to 15 per cent. On mowers, from 17½ per cent. to 15 per cent.

On horse rakes, from 20 per cent. to 15 per cent. On cultivators, from 20 per cent. to 15 per cent.

On threshing machines, from 20 per cent. to 15 per cent. On windstackers, baggers, etc., from 20 per cent. to 15 per cent.

On hay loaders, from 25 per cent. to 20 per cent. On potato diggers, from 25 per cent. to 20 per cent.

On fodder or feed cutters, from 25 per cent. to 20 per cent. On grain crushers, from 25 per

cent. to 20 per cent.

On fanning mills, from 25 per cent. to 20 per cent.

On hay tedders, from 25 per cent. to 20 per cent.

On field rollers, from 25 per cent. to 20 per cent.

On bells and gongs, from 30 per cent. to 27½ per cent.

With the reciprocity agreement ratified all Canadian farm products, except wool, will be entitled to entry to the United States without payment of duty. The free list will include:

Cattle of all kinds. Horses of all classes. Sheep and swine. Poultry, whether live or dead, and eggs.

All varieties of grain. Beans. Garden, field and grass seeds. Hay and straw. Flax seed.

Potatoes, turnips, onions, cabbage, and all other vegetables in their natural state.

Apples, pears, peaches, grapes, berries of all classes; all other edible fruits in their natural state, and honey.

Butter, cheese, milk and cream. This is the farmer's chance. Vote for Laurier and Atherton and Larger markets.

1862—Brig. Gen. Jefferson Davis, U.S.A., shot and mortally wounded Maj. Gen. William Nelson in an altercation at Louisville.

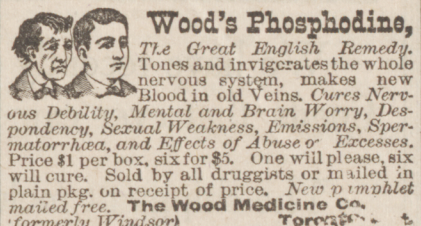
1864—Gen. Crook superseded Gen. Hunter as commander of the department of West Virginia.

DEPARTMENT OF THE NAVAL SERVICE

A competitive examination will be held in November next at the examination centres of the Civil Service Commission for the entry of Naval Cadets for the Naval Service of Canada; there will be 25 vacancies.

Candidates must be between the ages of 14 and 16 years on the 1st of January next; must be British subjects and must have resided in Canada for two years immediately preceding the examination; short periods of absence abroad for purpose of education to be considered as residence.

Successful candidates will join the Royal Naval College at Halifax, in January next; the course at the College is two years and the cost to parents, including board, lodging, uniform and all expenses is approximately \$400 for the first year and \$250 for the second year.

On passing out of College, Cadets will be rated midshipmen, and will receive pay at the rate of \$2 per diem.

Parents of intending candidates should make application to the Secretary Civil Service Commission, Ottawa, before the 15th October next.

Further information can be obtained on application to the Secretary, Department of Naval Service, Ottawa.
