MARTY O'TOOLE
TO PITCH AGAINST
BOSTON TODAY

Fred Clarke Believes he will Make Good--Not to Use his Battery Mate

Boston, Aug. 29.—Marty O'Toole, the St. Paul pitcher, for whom Pittsburgh paid \$22,500, is to be sent against Boston tomorrow for his first game with the National league, according to Manager Fred Clarke.

Clarke, who has carried O'Toole around the eastern National circuit, has never before said when he would pitch. Last night he said:

"I do not know whether O'Toole, who has been complaining of a lame pitching arm ever since he joined us, is right; but he told me today that he believes his flinging apparatus is in shape again, and I have decided to start him in on Wednesday.

"Marty comes from South Framingham, and his friends and neighbors in that place are anxious to see him in action. I might also add that O'Toole formerly pitched for several clubs in the New England league, and from the latter I have received requests to have him make his first big league appearance in Boston. I shall, therefore, start him in Boston Wednesday."

Asked whether Kelly, O'Toole's St. Paul battery partner, would catch him, Clarke inclined last night to the belief that he would send Gibson in to catch, as he is more familiar with National league batters than Kelly. Clarke added, however, that Kelly might be worked if he showed peeper form in practice.

Eastport, Me., Aug. 28.—Al Rudolph of Brooklyn, N. Y., welter-weight fighter failed to stop George Nedeff the Syrian slugger, tonight at the opera house tonight in a 12 round contest. The men fought 6 rounds and had 15 minutes' rest.

Nedeff has yet to be defeated and is a new fighter who recently left the wrestling game. The Syrian took considerable punishment, but finished strong, and at no time was in danger. SEASON SERIES

Picked Team will Play Pennant winners--Best Four out of Seven Games

Buffalo, Aug. 28.—At a meeting of the directors of the Eastern league today it was decided to play a post season series, to start on Sept. 26, between the pennant winners and a team composed of at least one and not more than three players from each of the other teams. Twenty percent of the gate receipts will go to the remaining 80 percent to be divided among the players, 60 to the winners and 40 to the losers.

The series will be the best four out of seven games. The action of Pres Darrow in three protested games, Montreal vs Toronto, Montreal vs Newark and Toronto vs Baltimore, was upheld and the protests disallowed, leaving the league standing as at present.

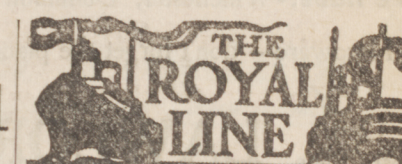
