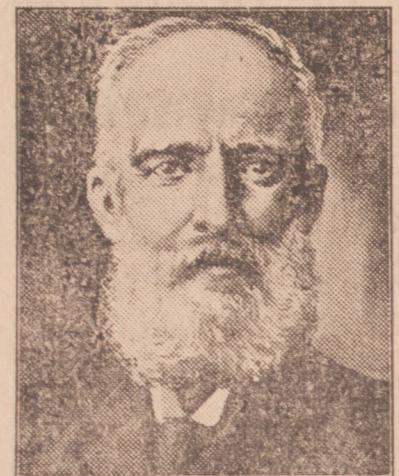

TIME FOR LIBERALISM TO ASSERT ITSELF

Hon. Geo. P. Graham, ex-Ministers of Railways was among the speakers at the recent meeting of the Ontario Reform Association and made an inspiring address. The recent reverse, he said, might prove victory in disguise, in that Liberalism had always grown stronger on adversity than on success. Under present conditions the Liberals for revenue only would desert, and the Liberals for principle would stand more firmly than ever before. Mr. Graham paid an eloquent tribute to Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and the great advancement which Canada had made under his Premiership. Sir Wilfrid, he said, was great in victory, and greater in defeat. He would now lead the strongest Opposition since since Confederation.

Mr. Graham ironically complimented the Conservative party on the fact that Premier Borden had been unable to trust the administration of the Financial Department to a member of his own party. The Premier elect had even turned his back on his old desk-mate. The ex-Minister quoted Mr. Monk's declaration that the latter had selected the Quebec members of the Cabinet to show that Mr. Borden was not even master in his own house.

The ex-Minister concluded with the declaration that the present was the time for Liberalism to show itself. It was the time for sacrifice and for standing firm on the strong foundation of true Liberalism, what was best in the interest of the masses. The resolution was unanimously adopted, and three rousing cheers for the retiring leader, Hon. A. G. MacKay whom Mr. Graham described as one of the most brilliant, logical and able public men who had ever sat in the Legislature.

On the motion of Messrs. J. McDermott and J. C. Elliott, M.P.P., a resolution was passed declaring that the gathering that "the house of the interests" party.

NEWS FORECAST FOR THE COMING WEEK

Washington, D.C., Nov. 4.—Governors and legislatures will be chosen in a few of the States next Tuesday and there will be some local elections of decided importance. Governors are to be elected in five States—Kentucky, Maryland, Massachusetts, Mississippi and Rhode Island. The Democrats are certain of Mississippi and appear almost equally confident of winning Kentucky, Massachusetts, Rhode Island may be classed as doubtful with the chances favoring the Republicans in the two New England States and the Democrats in Maryland. Of almost equal interest with the State elections are the contests in Philadelphia and New York. In the first named city it is a contest to overthrow the Republican "ring" while in New York it is a repetition of the old, old fight to down Tammany Hall.

President Taft will leave Hot Springs Va., for Cincinnati where he will vote at the local elections the following day. Wednesday will be spent in Louisville and from there he will go to Frankfort and Hodgenville to participate in the dedication of the Lincoln Farm Memorial. Saturday he will pay hurried visits to Nashville, Sewanee and Chattanooga before returning to Washington.

The 100th anniversary of the battle of Tippecanoe, fought near Lafayette, Ind., will be celebrated Tuesday with exercises on the battlefield. Governor Marshall, Senator Kern and other public men will speak.

King George and Queen Mary and the members of their suites are scheduled to sail from Portsmouth, Thursday, to attend the great Durbar at Delhi, India, in December. The royal party will make the trip in the new Peninsula and Oriental liner Medina, which will be escorted by the cruiser Defence.

A special election is to be held Thursday in the tenth congressional district of Tennessee to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Gen. George W. Gordon. The election of Hugh McKellar, the Democratic candidate is regarded as assured.

The case of Harry Ulrich indicted for assault as a result of the attack made on Booker T. Washington the negro educator, in New York last March is on the docket for trial in that city on Monday.

The formal inauguration of Dr. Elmer Ellsworth Brown as Chancellor of New York University will take place Thursday and will be made the occasion for a great gathering of representatives of the foremost educational institutions of America.

The annual meeting of the American Society for the Judicial Settlement of International Disputes will begin in Cincinnati Tuesday and will have President Taft as one of the speakers. Another notable convention of the week will be the annual meeting of the national organization of the United Daughters of the Confederacy. The meeting will be held in Richmond Va.

TAMMANY IS THE ISSUE IN NEW YORK

New York, Nov. 4.—A sheriff, four judges of the State Supreme Court and members of the general assembly are to be elected in New York County next Tuesday. The lively character of the campaign that closed today, combined with an unusually heavy registration, indicates an extraordinary amount of interest for an off-year election.

The principal reasons why the public and the politicians regard the campaign as of more than the usual off-year importance are to be found in the intensified bitterness of the old fight against Tammany under the rule of "Boss" Murphy and the professed return to the Democratic fold of William R. Hearst, who has declared war against Murphy.

The charge that Murphy is striving at this time to nationalize his control of politics has given the fight more than a State-wide interest. Murphy now dominates the Empire State situation, from the governorship down. It is generally understood that Leader Murphy intends to be a power in the next Democratic national convention. He realizes that a substantial victory this fall will go far towards enabling him to control the New York delegation to the national convention, and incidentally the nomination of a President, for it is generally believed that New York will be in a position where its ninety delegates, thrown to one side or the other, will decide who shall be the nominee.

William R. Hearst evidently sizes up the situation in about the same way as does Mr. Murphy. He has therefore taken time by the forelock with the intention of first defeating Murphy and then becoming a candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination. Fusion against Tammany is the plan adopted to bring about Murphy's defeat. The fusion movement is supported by representatives of the Republican party, the Independence League, the Union, and other so-called "reform" organizations. PRESS TRIBUTES TO NEW LIBERAL LEADER

(Toronto Globe) From the way in which Mr. N. W. Rowell's name, as leader of the Liberal party in the Ontario Legislature, has been received by the journals on both sides of politics it is quite evident that no mistake has been made in his selection. The comments on the Liberal side are perfectly and enthusiastically unanimous.

The Brantford Expositor promises him "the united endorsement of the Liberal party all over the Province." The St. Catharines Journal says "Mr. Rowell represents the most progressive type of Liberalism, and he should inspire his followers with new hopes and firmer resolves." The London Advertiser says he "may be depended on the take advanced ground on all questions affecting the moral and material welfare of the people of Ontario." The St. Thomas Journal says he "is entitled to no half-hearted support from Ontario Liberals, and will be able to rally to his support a large element from the Conservative Ranks." The Chatham News, says "young men who are looking for a man to lead them on the pathway of greater things will find such a man in Mr. Rowell." The Lindsay Post says he "will make an ideal leader, and with a broad, progressive policy the Liberals enter the approaching conflict under most favorable conditions." The Ingersoll Chronicle says he "is a man who can safely be entrusted to guide the destinies of the Liberal party in this Province." The Galt Reformer "predicts great things under Mr. Rowell's leadership, and look forward with the greatest confidence to the future."

Kind things have been said about the new leader in the true sporting spirit by some Conservative journals. The Toronto World says Mr. Rowell is "young and clean and brave and able and eloquent, with a reputation for keenness and shrewdness which he will have a full scope in the political field to justify." The Hamilton Spectator, "in the interest of good government in Ontario," expresses gratification at the return of the Liberal convention, and its belief that "with Whitney in power and the fortunes of the Liberal party in such capable hands as those of Hon. Mackenzie King and Mr. Rowell the people of Ontario will get more of it than would otherwise be the case." The Kingston Standard describes Mr. Rowell as "a splendid platform speaker, an enthusiastic worker, a loyal Liberal, and a clean gentleman against whose character and person not a word can be said," and expresses the opinion that "public life will be the better for the presence of such a man." Mr. Rowell must needs be a strong man to measure up to such appreciations, but Liberals have no misgivings on that point.

RIVER TRAFFIC

Zt. John Globe:—During the past few days the traffic on the river has been exceptionally heavy. All the steamers are carrying large freights both up and down the river. The majority of the cargoes coming down from the country consist of general produce, and that going up of winter supplies. If the weather keeps as cold as it has been during the past few days, navigation will close much sooner this year than last. The shipping men about Indiantown predict navigation to close this year about the 22nd of this month. Last year the steamer Elaine made her last trip up river on Nov. 25th, returning to Indiantown on the 26th.

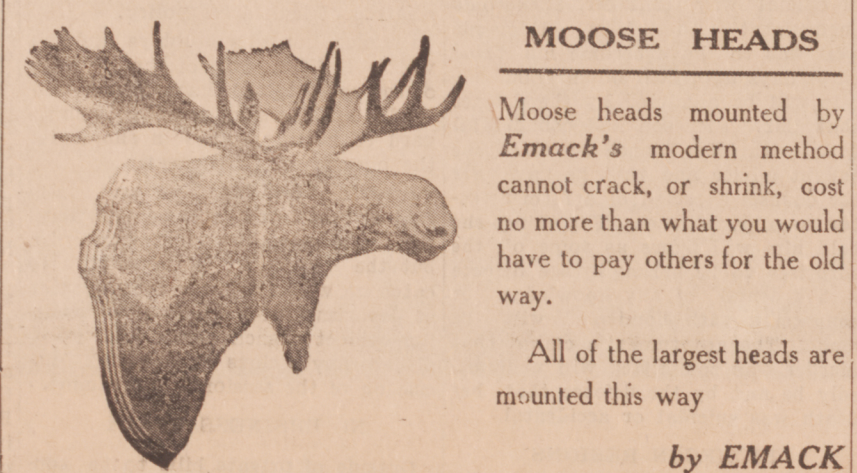
WHERE THE WOMAN VOTE COUNTS
