## INCREASES DIVIDEND

Canadian Car & Foundry directors have declared a dividend of 4 per cent. on the common stock for the year ending September 30th.

The dividend is payable December 15th to holders of November 15th. The stock is quoted around 75.

## INTERESTING BANKING DECISION

Toronto, Nov. 2—Local banking circles are well pleased with the decision announced today in the Privy Council which has allowed the appeal of the Receiver-General of New Brunswick from the decision of the Supreme Court in the case of Rex vs. Lovitt, which directed that deposit receipts need only be cashed at the branches where they are given. "This is a far-reaching judgment," declared James Bicknell, K. C. The action was originally brought by the Receiver-General of New Brunswick against the executors of Geo. H. Lovitt, a shipowner of Yarmouth, N. S., who died in November, 1909, leaving an estate of \$449,983.88. Of this sum over \$90,000 was in deposit with the Bank of British North America at St. John, N. B. The Government of New Brunswick claimed to be entitled to succession duties on the \$90,000. The Supreme Court reversed the decision of the New Brunswick courts, but has itself been reversed by the Privy Council, which restores the decision on the lower courts and holds the government of New Brunswick entitled to the duties.

## CARVING A MELON

H. H., of Montreal, is a shareholder in that dazzling Porcupine property known as Moneta.

Moneta, of Porcupine, is cutting a melon. Shareholders, who bought Moneta shares at thirty cents, have been offered one additional share at 12½ cents for each six shares now held. This, I suppose, is to reward them for purchasing at 30 cents per share originally, and holding on. The price of Moneta is now about fifteen cents in the market. Apparently not many Moneta shareholders are making application to participate in the melon cutting. They may fear what will happen to the stock afterwards. As one of them queries: Is it melon or lemon? Who can say?—Toronto Saturday Night.

## STEEL CO'S. OCT. OUTPUT

Montreal, Nov. 3—Mr. J. H. Plummer, president of the Dominion Steel Company, states the approaching completion of the new wire and nail mills is a matter of the greatest importance to the company's future. The company expects to be selling these products as early as the next spring. The process represent everything from raw material of iron ore to a package of half-inch wire nails. The October output of the company was very satisfactory, being 24,356 tons pig iron; 23,675 tons steel ingots; 15,587 tons rails and 6,817 tons of rods.

## 300 P. C. DIVIDEND

Toronto, Nov. 2—Directors of Temiskaming and Hudson Bay Mining Company have declared another dividend of 300 per cent. This makes the thirty-fifth dividend paid by the company. It will be payable November 13. Books of company will be closed to transfers from November 8 to November 11 inclusive.

## BUYING LOCOMOTIVES

The Canadian Locomotive Company have received orders from the Canadian Northern Railway and also from the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway for new motive power. The Canadian Northern has ordered 25 freight locomotives of the "consolidation" type, with superheat. Each of these engines in working order will weigh 188,000 pounds. The same company has ordered five large switching engines.

The Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway have placed orders for four of the "consolidation" type freight locomotives with superheat. These engines in working order will weigh 206,000 pounds each.

## THE MARKET FOR HOLLINGER

It is no exaggeration to say that the Hollinger interests could make a merry whirl in the market for that stock if they were so disposed. However, that does not appear to be their policy, as no doubt they fear the string of "wild-cat" venture that would tail on to any such campaign. Since the London mining house, now

fortunately not a factor in Canadian mining affairs, made the big market in Hollinger, there has been no desire of the directors for further fireworks display. They have allowed the stock to find its own marked level without assistance of any kind, and in view of that attitude it must be said that the stock has acted remarkably well.

## GETS NEWS FROM PAPERS

(Montreal Star)  
 "I frequently receive information about C. P. R. matters from the newspapers," was the only remark Sir Thomas Shaughnessy cared to make today, when asked by The Star whether there was any truth in the rumor that a \$20,000,000 new stock issue by the C. P. R. is impending.

## HON. W. T. WHITE MADE FINE SPEECH

Lansdowne, Ont., Nov. 2—Hon. W. T. White, minister of finance, made here tonight his initial speech since becoming a member of the Borden ministry. It was on the occasion of the opening of his campaign for election to the Commons for the County of Leeds, where George Taylor resigned to make way for him.

At the outset he expressed appreciation of Mr. Taylor's act. Continuing he said in part:

"When as the result of the election, reciprocity was laid at rest and I returned to my desk, I had no thought whatever of entering the field of active politics. It was at this time that I was honored by receiving from Mr. Borden an invitation to join his cabinet, which I conceived it my duty to accept.

"No doubt Mr. Borden had in mind that in appointing me he would recognize the support given him by tens of thousands of Liberals throughout Canada, which contributed so greatly to his success. But I also believe that he thought I might have special qualifications for the important position which he assigned to me, and as to this I can only say that if I fail his expectations it will not be for lack of effort on my part."

Proceeding, Mr. White expressed his sympathy with the farming community. He said he had discontinued his financial connection and was free to serve the country, unfettered and untrammelled by any interest, as regards public ownership, and he looked forward to a development on its part commensurate with the growth of Canada.

He went on to speak of the national outlook based on the industrial expansion in progress. Dealing with the tariff he enumerated his policy and said:

"I have always believed in a policy of reasonable protection for Canada, including protection for the farmer, especially is such protection desirable for him during the constructive stage of a nation's development. Now we are in the midst of these prosperous conditions and I need not point out how careful we should be in taking any step or doing any act that might tend to change these conditions.

"Trade questions are exceedingly intricate and complex. They require the most careful study. Changes in the tariff in times such as these should not be lightly considered. Assurance of stability is required to give confidence to our manufacturers, our commercial men and our farmers.

"I think I am safe in saying that there is in contemplation no immediate change without the most careful enquiry, without the just consideration of the claims of all who may be interested, producer and consumer alike.

"I do not mean to say that the tariff must remain as something fixed, stereotyped or crystallized. The interests of the community, as a whole must always be before us. It will be the duty of the government to take such measures as may be necessary to remedy any inequitable or unjust advantage enjoyed by trusts and combines.

"In other words my conception is that while stability of the tariff should be a chief consideration in times of such prosperity as we now enjoy, we must make it the subject of constant study in order that as necessity arises it may be modified to meet the changing conditions of a constantly changing country."

## MARCHIONESS OF DONEGAL ARDENT IMPERIALIST

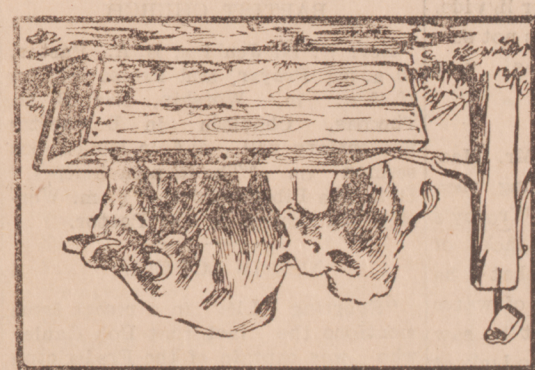
A Toronto paper has the following with the regard to the Marchioness of Donegal, formerly Miss Violet Twining of this city, now on her way to India.

"Among the passengers sailing on the Empress of India last week was the Marchioness of Donegal who was a visitor in the city for a few days, and who is on her way to India to attend the Durbar, where she will be one of the seventy peers and peeresses of Great Britain chosen by the King to be guests of the government at that ceremonial. ## GERMANY EXPECTS TO WIN IN MARYLAND

Baltimore, Md., Nov. 4—The voters of Maryland next Tuesday will elect State officers, including a governor, controller and attorney general. Under ordinary circumstances the Democrats would be certain of victory, but conditions are somewhat unusual this year, and the Republicans believe they have more than a fighting chance to win. Their candidate for governor is Phillips Lee Goldsborough, who has been collector of internal revenue for this district. The Democratic nominee is Arthur Pue Gorman, Jr., who aspires to lead the Democrats of Maryland as his father led them for many years. Both Gorman and Goldsborough were nominated by district primary.

The anti-Gorman Democrats, among them Governor Crothers, ex-Governor Warfield, Senator Rayner and other of the old Conservative party leaders, supported State Senator Blair Lee for the nomination for governor. Gorman's nomination, according to their allegations, resulted from sharp practices at the primaries. The approach of election day has not served to heal the split between the rival factions and the Republicans believe that many of the Conservative Democrats will vote for Goldsborough.
