## DR. L. A. CURREY WRITES ON RIVER-STEAMER SITUATION

States St. John River S. S. Co. did not Receive Fair Treatment from City Council--Refuses Point Blank to Change Dates of Sailing of Steamer--His Company will Fight Crystal Stream S. S. Co. in Courts

Dr. L. A. Currey, manager and president of the St. John River S. S. Co., has written the following letter in reply to one of Mr. H. S. Campbell, secretary of the Fredericton Board of Trade, calling his attention to the inconvenience caused by both steamers on the St. John-Fredericton route leaving and arriving on the same days. Dr. Currey's announcement is of interest to the people of Fredericton and lower St. John Valley and indicates prolonged litigation between the St. John River S. S. Co. and Crystal Stream S. S. Co.

Dear Sirs:—Yours of the 23rd inst., re steamboat service, duly received and contents noted.

Four years ago the late Star Line Steamship Company took the "Majestic" off the Fredericton route and put her on the lower end of the river in opposition to the "Elaine," leaving only a tri-weekly service between St. John and Fredericton. At the invitation and solicitation of the Fredericton City Council, the Fredericton Board of Trade and the people along the river, the "Elaine" was placed on the St. John-Fredericton route on the alternate days with the S. S. "Victoria," and was so continued until the present year.

### AGREEMENT MADE.

The Star Line went into liquidation and its assets were offered by the curator for sale at public auction. Mr. D. J. Purdy purchased at said auction the S. S. "Majestic," our company purchased the Star Line wharves at Fredericton and no sale whatever was made of the S. S. "Victoria" at that time. The day of the sale and shortly thereafter Mr. Purdy came to my office and entered into an agreement whereby he would offer no opposition to us on the St. John-Fredericton route or interfere with our wharf terminals and we were to offer no opposition to him on the Washademoak Lake route or interfere with his terminals. As no person or company seemed desirous of purchasing the "Victoria," I was requested to meet a special committee of the Fredericton City Council with reference to the purchase of the "Victoria," which I did. This committee guaranteed to me that if our company would buy the "Victoria" and place her on the route on the alternate days with the "Elaine" and also keep the "Hamstead" on the route she has been on for a number of years that the City Council would not permit any opposition boat to dock at the city wharves nor would they give them the use of their steamboat warehouse. With an assurance of no opposition as aforesaid and the above named understanding from the City Council and a promise of a subsidy from the Dominion government (which we never received) for carrying mails and in order to give a daily service, our company purchased the S. S. "Victoria." To our surprise, Mr. Purdy broke this agreement and put the "Majestic" on in opposition to our steamers and to our amazement and contrary to its undertaking as aforesaid, the city fathers did provide the S. S. "Majestic" not only with wharfage, but with their steamboat warehouse. Notwithstanding our company's disappointment for the reason aforesaid, we continued the three steamers on their said respective routes until the 20th inst., when we laid up the S. S. "Victoria." In consequence of said opposition and the farmers' shipping their potatoes, etc., by scow and tug-boat, there did not seem to be business enough to warrant us in keeping all the said steamers on their said routes and for that reason, as well as financial ones, the directors decided to remove the "Victoria."

### CHANGE OF DAYS.

Now as to change of days. Inasmuch as Mr. Purdy had no legal right or business whatever to interfere with our route and as our company was operating the St. John-Fredericton route for several years past, and as our boats were the superior ones and gave ample accommodation, we fail to see why we should change the day of running of the "Elaine." Had our expectations and agreements as before mentioned been carried out, we would have been enabled to have kept up the daily service as pre-arranged as aforesaid until the end of the season, and inasmuch as Frederictonians and others who agreed with me, no' only verbally but in writing to give us their whole patronage in case we provided the service above mentioned, and for the other reasons above specified, our company felt compelled to adopt the course above mentioned.

### WILL NOT CHANGE.

Now, as to our company changing the day of sailings of the "Elaine," I beg to inform you that I am authorized by the directors to state that we will not make any change in the day of sailings of the "Elaine" whatever, irrespective of what Mr. Purdy may do in the premises. More than that, our company declines to treat with Mr. Purdy with reference to the matter in any way whatever. We have two equity suits pending against him as well as two common law suits and it is the intention of our company to make him pay damages for the breach of his contract. Our company has made every effort to give the City of Fredericton and the people along the river the best possible steamboat service and the company feel that they have not been fairly treated for the reasons above stated. Had all the agreements and undertakings above mentioned been carried out, and had the people not extended patronage to the steamer "Majestic," none of these questions would have arisen as our company was prepared to carry out their agreement and undertaking with the City of Fredericton to the letter. to which such a letter properly should be addressed. The letter bore a post office stamp, showing it had been mailed in the Back Bay. The resignation was signed in the handwriting of Rev. Mr. Richeson and bore date of Nov. 1.

Some days ago Rev. Mr. Richeson, after he had been arrested on the charge of murder, addressed a short letter to the members of Immanuel Baptist church, asking them to withhold judgment in his case until the grand jury should act. No action, it is said, was taken at the business meeting of the church, held a night or two after that letter was received. Conditions changed rapidly after the first letter was written by the minister. At that time he had not been indicted by the grand jury, nor had he had an examination in the municipal court. Tuesday the grand jury indicted him on a charge of murder, and following the finding of the indictment Rev. Mr. Richeson wrote out his resignation as pastor of the church.

The fact that the envelope containing the letter of resignation bears the Back Bay postmark, indicates that the letter was carried out of the jail by some one who visited the minister.

### THE STOCK MARKET

(By direct private wire to J. C. Mackintosh & Co., Fredericton.)

New York, N.Y., Nov. 4.—The opening was moderately active and prices were a shade above Friday's close. Stock was supplied at the higher level however, although traders as a rule thought the market would be kept strong during the session or at least made strong at the close so that a favorable impression might be produced on the public over Sunday.

Trading opened at 145½, an advance of ½ but lost it on next couple of sales. Bullish manipulation, although not conducted by the interests which for a year have made Reading their specialty, was in strong hands.

Union Pacific was strong. Short interest in the stock appeared to be large. A reaction occurred after opening, but by the end of the first half-hour or so the stocks were again moving up under the leadership of Reading and Erie issues, with room traders buying either for quick turn or bull side, or for covering of shorts. Everybody had a bull tip on Reading and the fact that the house whose buying had started the movement was selling, tended to make the street all the more bullish, because the apparently good selling was so well taken. Some traders said there was a Trick-Widener combination to advance the stock. After selling up to 59½ within ½ of the highest of the week, Steel reacted to 58½, but met with good support there and rallied with other leaders. Erie and Canadian Pacific were strong and the bullish sentiment on the stock of the former road appeared to be decidedly on the increase.

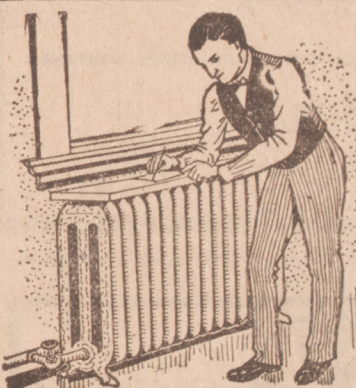

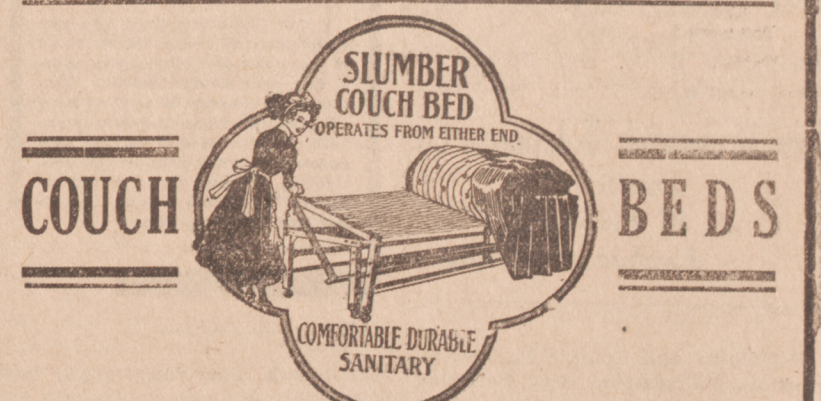
