TennisFRANK PATCH FASTEST HORSE  
OF YEAR IN MARITIME PROVINCES

Leonard Wilton and Mary Cromwell Made Fastest Year-marks in Their Classes on Fredericton Track --Twenty-five New Performers, Twenty-one Reduced Records

The Acadian Recorder's annual list of new 230 performers on Maritime Province tracks is not as numerous as last year, but never before in any one season has there been such a reduction of records. Twenty-five trotters and pacers have entered the list, while 21 already in the charmed circle have reduced their records.

Frank Patch, owned by James Adams, Halifax, as last season is the fastest horse of the year. Twice at Halifax he paced in 2:13½, which was not only the fastest mile of the year, but lowered the Maritime Province stallion record, and is the fastest time ever made on a provincial track by a horse brought here without a record.

Leonard Wilton, owned by A. E. Prites, Salisbury, N.B., is the fastest pacing gelding of the season, winning a third heat at Fredericton in 2:14½.

Mary Cromwell, owned by R. A. Corbett, Halifax, was the fastest pacer mare of the year, with her third heat in 2:15½ at Fredericton, and which she later duplicated at Halifax.

P. K., now owned by A. McBride, St. Stephen, lowered the record for provincial bred pacers on a provincial track to 2:15½ at Halifax.

Oswego Boy, by Anteo Wilkes, owned by W. V. Douse, Attleboro, Mass., is the fastest new performer of the season, taking a record of 2:15½ at Halifax.

Three times during the season was Estill Boy's trotting record of 2:16½ equalled; by Stanley Mack, at Fredericton, entered by F. B. Rideout, Medford, Mass.; Walter H., owned by Jed Martin, Sydney, at Halifax, and Billy C. owned by H. L. Chipman, Point DeBute, at Chatham. Walter H. and Billy C. also share the honors of making the fastest time of a provincial bred trotter on a Maritime Province track.

Baring, owned by Frank Boutlier, Halifax, is the fastest trotter of the season on a provincial track, with a record of 2:19½ at Moncton. Baring the Great, owned by F. Murchie, St. Stephen, made a similar record, but it was on a Maine track.

Achille the Great, owned by Howard Musgrave, Halifax, lowered the three-year-old trotting record of 2:26½ made by Tom Phair nine years ago, to 2:23½ at Halifax, and Brian Queen owned by H. C. L. d'Ar, Kentville, lowered the four-year-old record of 2:24½, made by Brazilian eighteen years previous, to 2:18 at Halifax.

Mayor Reyburn officially placed the laurel wreath of victory on the brows of the players and Harry Davis said his formal farewell to his teammates in a speech in which he declared that while he would always in spirit be a friend of the Athletics, he was going to do everything in his power to defeat the Athletics for the pennant next year.

It was to have been announced by Mr. Mack tonight that Eddie Collins will succeed Davis as captain, but the fact that the announcement was not made does not alter the situation. The brilliant second sacker will captain the infield next season and Danny Murphy will take care of the outfield.

HEAVY INTEREST BOUGHT  
IN NEWARK BALL CLUB

New York, Nov. 2—Reports that the Newark Baseball Club of the Eastern League was about to change hands were denied by Manager Joe McGinity tonight, who said that one-third of the interest in the club would be disposed of within 48 hours to a person whose name he would not make public, but who would not take an active part in the club's management.

"Control of the club will remain in the hands of myself and of H. Clay Smith, my present associate," said McGinity uptown tonight. "I shall still be the manager and expect to have a winning team."

McGinity said that he did not even know William J. McManus, a retired leather manufacturer of Newark, who has been credited with an intention of purchasing the club.

Stevens, Lancaster, N.H., and has placed him in Walter Cox' hands for training. Tidy Peter trotted in 2:12 at Lexington this fall and gives promise of making a very useful horse.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-  
WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least eighty acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 40 acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
