DELEGATES TO SYNOD NUMBER ABOUT ONE HUNDRED AND FIFTY

Sessions will be Held in Parish Church Repairs to Christchurch Cathedral not Being Sufficiently Advanced to Make it Possible to use Building--Delegates and Their Billets

The Diocesan Synod will open its annual session here at 8.30 Monday evening and indications are that the delegates, both clergy and laymen will number about one hundred and fifty. A partial list of delegates and their billets follows. It had been hoped to have the repairs at Christchurch Cathedral sufficiently advanced to use a portion of that church for synod services but in spite of the efforts of Contractor Moses Mitnell to advance the work it will be impossible to have the Cathedral ready for even partial occupancy. The walls of the building when the church is heated show a tendency to "sweat" making it unfit for occupation. All services will be held in the Parish church.

Rev. Canon Powell president of King's College, Windsor, N.S., who will preach the Synod sermon on Tuesday evening will preach in St. Luke's Church, St. John tomorrow arriving here Monday morning. Canon Powell will also conduct the "quiet hours" for the visiting delegates.

IMPORTANT MATTERS

Among the important matters which are to be considered by the synod is the question of reorganization of the Sunday School work. A motion of Rev. Father Conners to exclude divorced persons from holding office in the church is also to be considered.

PURCHASE SMITH-McMULKEN DREDGE

Critics of "Dredging-ring" of Past Take Steps to Get Some Government Pap

A syndicate of York and Sunbury Tories has completed arrangements for the purchase of the Smith-McMulken dredge which operated during the past season in Sunbury and Queens Counties. The transfer of the dredge, it is understood, took place on Thursday, the price being in the neighborhood of \$30,000. Slipp & Hanson of this city, acted on the part of the purchasers and it is understood that Mr. R. B. Hanson of that firm, will visit Ottawa in the near future and endeavor to obtain contracts for the dredge to work upon next summer.

IT IS DIFFERENT NOW.

While in opposition, the Tories, through their newspaper, howled loud and long concerning the "dredgers" who, they claimed, were obtaining exorbitant prices for dredging from the Department of Public Works. Present indications are that the very people who inspired such attacks upon Liberals are themselves endeavoring to obtain their earliest opportunity to obtain a share of the "pap" which the Dominion government already is arranging to distribute.

The patriots who so short a time ago screamed about the "grafters" and "dredging rings" are now preparing to get right after any graft that may be in sight. The action as far as the dredge, which was largely owned by Mr. R. B. Smith of Oromocto, is concerned, is exactly on a par with that of the St. John Tories, who organized a company a short time ago for the purpose of controlling dredging operations in and about St. John Harbor.
