In the introduction to this pam-

phlet, somewhat rhetorically named

'The Siege of Ottawa," Mr. G. F.

Chipman writes: "It will be a great satisfaction to the farmers to know that their demands have been partially granted in the reciprocity arrangements that have been made with the United States . . . There is only one way to secure the demands made at Ottawa. That is by strengthening the organization and convincing every man of the justice of those demands." People who sit at home in their apartments in the great cities and wonder why any action was taken by Canada to haster the day of closer trade relations with the United States should ponder these words, consider the strength of the case put forward in this pamphlet, and measure the power and influence of the new element in Canadian politics which these men represented; after which they should compare the extent of the demands accorded to these farmers with the extent of those which were equally strongly urged but up to the present have not been granted at all.

There was a good deal of misrepresentation and belittling of the farmers' delegation among those newspapers which are strongly opposed to the reduction of any existing tariffs. The pamphlet just issued is useful as a handy reply to these detractors. It has long been a cherished belief of the "special interests" that the farmer could not organize for anything practical, and that he was rather less to he "onsidered as a political force than the trade unions. Among people with such preconceptions the stories easily gained currency that the delegation was financed by American railway men and was a mere ool in the hands of certain anti-Canadian plotters. No intelligent man who reads the speeches recorded in this pamphlet even if he do not agree with them, can continue in the belief that the mon who made them were mere tools: nor will he be likely any longer to under-estimate the strength and area of the politicaleconomic movement which here found its first great vocal expression. The membership of the three prairie associations alone, which were represent ed by nearly all their officers and several hundred, men bers, and were absolutely unanimous, is given as 30,000 farmers. They had in this movement the entire co-operation of the old and powerful Dominion Grange of Ontario, while unorganized delegations from Quebec and other provinces backed up their demands. These men asked not merely for

the present agreement, but also for reciprocal free trade in agricultural implements and machinery, upor of articles, and for sundry other concessions even more bitterly opposed by vested interests. They were intensely British, and very largely Canadian in origin from the older provinces.
