Calgary, Alberta, Oct. 9.—E. Manu-ell, a large stock rancher of the MacLeod district yesterday concluded the sale of 2,500 head of prime beef cattle to P. Burns. THE RUSSELL CASE NEARING ITS END

Montreal, Oct. 10.—The way was quickly cleared for the final stage of the Russell case this morning when Mr. Justice Archer at the opening session of the court ruled that the evidence of Mr. David Russell, taken yesterday afternoon, in which Mr. Aime Geoffrion counsel had declared to be rebuttal to his, the plaintiff's case, was not likely to rebut any of his previous testimony. The judge added that the evidence however should have been admitted as evidence in chief.

The ruling of Judge Archer allowed of the evidence given by Mr. Cochen-thaler yesterday afternoon being admitted as part of that which he had given when under examination by his given when under examination by his counsel in chief Mr. McMaster.

Mr. Cochen-thaler one of the principal witnesses in the biggest libels ever heard in a Montreal court was again called this morning and was questioned by Mr. Geoffrion with regard to the meeting which was supposed to take place at the Windsor Hotel on October 20 last.

Mr. McMaster asked the witness what he had to say regard to a statement made by Mr. Russell in his evidence that McNamara had not spoken at this meeting by Mr. Geoffrion objected, the objection being sustained by Judge Archer who said it would be in rebuttal to Mr. Russell's testimony and therefore could not be recorded.

A few amendments to Mr. Russell's testimony regarding the amounts which he said in his evidence had been paid for transportation, legal advice in New York and the Pinkerton special investigation was allowed by the court, and preceded Mr. McMaster's argument. It was arranged by counsel that arguments should be limited to two hours. In view of this it is practically certain that the case will be taken on deliber by Judge Archer when the court rises this evening.

At the commencement of his argument which was presented in a clear and forceful manner Mr. McMaster declared that there was not the slightest doubt in the world that the lengthy reference which has been heard from some of the best men of the city had completely dispelled that Mr. David Russell was not in his proper mind. His client, Mr. McMaster said was to be principal in a law suit involving some serious features and it was only natural that he should be nervous particularly when as stated valuable papers had been taken out of his desk in his office at the Windsor Hotel.

Passing on to the entrance of the Patterson in the case, Mr. McMaster referred to the request sent by the so called Mrs. Patterson by a clerk to Mr. Russell asking that he call upon her in her own room.
