

THE BAD BOY PROBLEM

Juvenile delinquency was ably dealt with in the paper read by Mayor Thomas of Fredericton. He urged the establishment of Juvenile Courts, the appointment of a probation officer and opening of provincial home.

J. King Kelley made extended remarks on this question. He was strongly opposed to reformatories, and if he had his way he would close down these institutions. "There are" he said, "more crimes committed by authorities than by criminals themselves. It was no way to reform by treating prisoners to bread and wat er. Nothing is done to elevate

Mr. Kelley eloquently discussed the boy problem and said juvenile courts were an absolute necessity. His re marks on the matter made an excellent impression.

Coun. Cochrane made an interesting contribution to the discussion and referred to prison form idea proposed 'n St. John.
