THE BOY PROBLEM WAS
A SUBJECT FOR DISCUSSION

Newcastle, Oct. 11—A large and important volume of business was transacted today at the inaugural session of the sixth annual convention of the Union of New Brunswick Municipalities. The session was held in the town hall, and there was a representative attendance of officers from various parts of the province. President A. Sterling, of York County, occupied the chair. He called the meeting to order about 2 o'clock, introducing Hon. John Morrissey who officially opened the convention. The chief commissioner extended the hearty welcome of the people of Miramichi. He regretted the absence of Premier Hazen who had been called to a higher office and was already engrossed with his new duties.

"Mr. Hazen," he said, "was a man who stood high in the opinion of the men of New Brunswick and he felt that all were pleased to see him accept a higher office."

Mr. Morrissey referred to the question of permanent roads for the province, and said it was one of first importance. He thought that an increased interest in the development of towns should be shown, and that our men of wealth should learn to appreciate the advantage of investing their money in industries.

Mayor Pedolin officially welcomed the delegates on behalf of the town council and citizens of Newcastle.

Ald. Potts and Mayor Reilly made appropriate responses.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

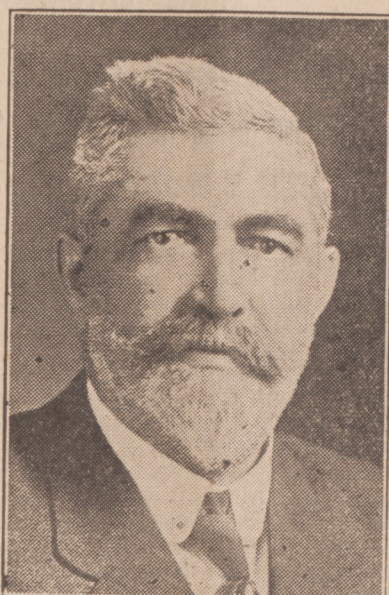
Mr. J. W. McCreedy of Fredericton presented the following report at the meeting of the Municipalities convention on Wednesday:

Mr. President and Gentlemen:—

Shortly after the Woodstock Convention in October last a copy of the resolution there passed was forwarded to each of the City, Town and County Councils of the province, inviting them to give an expression of opinion upon the desirability, or otherwise of changing our present system of taxation so as to provide that municipal assessments should be levied by a land tax, and business license, or by some other means than by the present methods.

So far as I know but three of the four Councils have seriously considered the question. The Municipality of the City and County of St. John adopted a resolution that this convention prepare and promote a Bill at the next session of the Legislature changing our assessment system to a land tax, polling tax and business license. The City Council of the City of St. John also appointed a special committee to consider the question and I believe that committee has reported favouring that the change suggested be brought about gradually by an annual reduction on improvements I have not learned of any action being taken on this report by council. The Town of Newcastle also has expressed its willingness to unite in promoting such legislation, providing that any City, Town or County in the province upon a majority vote of its ratepayers, shall have the power to abolish taxes on polls, improvements, personal property and income, or any one or more of them and to raise its revenue by means of a land tax, with or without poll tax, and with or without a system of business licenses.

The only other place, so far as I am informed, that considered the question was the Northumberland County Council which recommends that "no change be made in our system of taxation until it has been

demonstrated that some other method will extract the necessary funds from the pockets of the people in such a way as shall not excite dissatisfaction and murmurs amongst them." This resolution the report says "was adopted amid loud applause."

One of the chief objects of this Union in fact its chief aim—is the guidance and improvement of legislation upon all municipal questions and the protection of public utilities and franchises against corporate encroachments. At the last session of our Provincial Legislature a most determined assault was made for the purpose of capturing a number of our principal water powers with their concurrent rights and franchises. Most of the applications seemed to be for speculative purposes. The applicants were seeking to tie up these water powers for the money that is in them in an undeveloped state. After testing the sentiments of the members of the Assembly the Bills were withdrawn, but with the limitation that some of them would be presented at the coming session in a form more in conformity with the sentiment of the House.

If this Union is to maintain its influence for municipal good and protection, the scrutiny of Bills presented to the Legislature cannot be to closely followed up. Indeed there is plenty of work in this line to occupy the time and attention of a skilled expert while the assembly is in session. As Secretary I have given up a good deal of time in watching legislation during the last three or four years, with I think some measure of success. I have found however, that the notices of legislation as published in alleged compliance with the rules of the Assembly are not to be relied upon, nor are the applicants very particular whether or not the proposed legislation is advertised in all the municipalities interested. Experience has taught me that the more unsuspicious the notice, the more carefully should the Bill to follow be looked into. I am convinced that it should be made compulsory upon all applicants for legislation, and especially so when such legislation seeks the privilege to use and control any public right, utility or water power to file with the Secretary or some other officer of all the municipalities affected, a copy of the proposed Bill at least ten days before its introduction

into the House, and that the standing Rules Committee should insist upon proof of such notice before permitting any such Bill to be introduced. This would avoid surprises and give opportunity for any municipality to point out any objections to their representatives in the Assembly and to properly review the proposed legislation.

The eleventh annual convention of the Union of Canadian Municipalities met this year at the city of Quebec on the three last days of August and was attended by representatives from Halifax to Calgary, Prince Edward Island and British Columbia being the only Provinces not represented. This Province was represented by Chamberlain Lingley of St. John, Mayor Reilly of Moncton and your Secretary. This great municipal school has for its purposes objects similar to our own, the difference being that while our efforts are chiefly confined to his own province the Canadian Union endeavours to keep a watchful care over municipal life and the preservation of public rights throughout the whole Dominion. The subjects discussed included "Town Planning" by Hon. H. B. F. MacFarland of Washington, "Child Welfare in the city" by Dr. W. H. Atherton, Secretary of the City Improvement League of Montreal, "The special functions of Capital Cities" introduced by the City Clerk of Quebec, who emphasized the fact the capital city of the Dominion or of a Province should be an example in every way to other Municipalities. A resolution recommending that the Federal and Provincial Governments should devote more attention and assistance toward making our capital cities attractive and beautiful was after some discussion, referred to the Executive with power to act and to report if necessary.

Mayor Rutherford of Westmont explained the profitable destruction of garbage by incineration producing electric power in his city and Mr. Alex. Currie C. E. explained the construction of re-inforced concrete pipe as applied to water mains. Another subject discussed was country roads and highways. As, however, all these discussions are fully reported in the proceedings of the convention further comment is unnecessary here. Altogether the convention experienced a most instructive and enjoyable session the members returning home, I believe, inspired to do better and bolder work for the good of their respective communities.

I herewith submit a statement of the receipts and expenditures for the current year.

THE BAD BOY PROBLEM

Juvenile delinquency was ably dealt with in the paper read by Mayor Thomas of Fredericton. He urged the establishment of Juvenile Courts, the appointment of a probation officer and opening of provincial home.

J. King Kelley made extended remarks on this question. He was strongly opposed to reformatories, and if he had his way he would close down these institutions. "There are," he said, "more crimes committed by authorities than by criminals themselves. It was no way to reform by treating prisoners to bread and water. Nothing is done to elevate a man."

Mr. Kelley eloquently discussed the boy problem and said juvenile courts were an absolute necessity. His remarks on the matter made an excellent impression.

Coun. Cochrane made an interesting contribution to the discussion, and referred to prison farm idea proposed in St. John.

Ald. Wallace, Mayor Pendolin, Ald. Potts and Coun. Sidall further discussed the question and it was subsequently referred to a committee composed of (Continued from page five.)

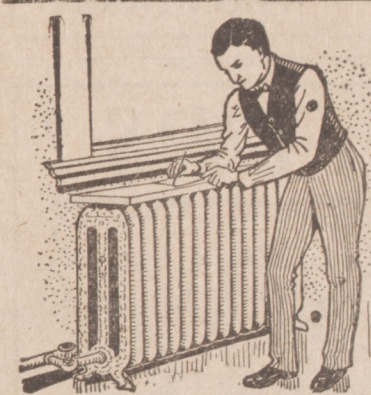
