SWEEPING CHANGES

MADE IN HOCKEY
RULES BY N. H. A.

Team will consist of but Six Men--
Rover's Position Has Been Abolished

Montreal, Oct. 11--Sweeping changes in the regulations under which hockey has been played by the teams in the National Hockey Association were made tonight at a meeting of the magnates of that organization. The number of men constituting a team is to be reduced from seven to six, the position of rover being abolished.

Fresh players will be permitted to be substituted at any period during the game.

WOLGAST TO GET

\$22,000 FOR BOUT

New York, October 10--Ad Wolgast, the champion lightweight of the world, and Matt Wells, the English champion, met in a ten round bout here on October 28. Announcement that the bout had been arranged several days ago, followed by a calling off of the bout because of an insufficient guarantee for Wolgast, was remade last night by George McDonald manager for Wells.

McDonald announced that Wolgast had been guaranteed \$22,000 to be placed in his hands before the fight, and an agreement had been signed yesterday for the fighters to meet, weighing in at 133 pounds at 3 o'clock on the day of the fight. In a preliminary bout Wolgast, champion, will receive 40 per cent. of the gate receipts, and a like percentage will go to Wells.

McDonald added that the large sums were made possible by a sale of moving picture rights for \$25,000. Wells, he said, would also receive \$10,000 guarantee in addition to the percentage.

ALL-STARS CAME BACK HARD AT ATHLETICS

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New York, Oct. 11--A rough estimate of the gross receipts when the Giants and Athletics play the first world's series game at the Polo grounds here next Saturday, providing weather conditions are favorable, is as follows: Four hundred boxes at \$25 each, \$10,000; 16,000 lower grandstand seats at \$2 each, \$32,000; 10,000 upper grandstand seats at \$3 each, \$30,000; 5,000 grandstand admissions at \$2 each, \$10,000; 15,000 open stand seats at \$1 each, \$15,000; gross receipts, \$97,000.

Of this total the National Commission's 10 per cent will be \$9,700; club owners' share, 30 per cent., \$29,100; players' share, 60 per cent., \$58,200. A guess places the entire gross receipts for the series, provided seven games are played, at more than \$300,000.

Baltimore, Md., Oct. 10--The wedding of Miss Violet Lockwood, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Lockwood of New York, and James Iver McCallum, of Washington, D. Mr. McCallum's first wife, who divorced him about a year ago, was Miss Mary Sherman, adopted daughter of the late John Sherman, the Ohio statesman.

EASTERN LEAGUE

MEETING WILL BE
HELD SATURDAY

Demand for Redress of Stringent Regulations to be Made--Chapin of Rochester to be Censured

New York, Oct. 10--President Barrow of the Eastern League has issued a notice to the eight club owners of his circuit to be present at a special meeting of the league to be held in New York next Saturday. The meeting will be held in the Victoria Hotel, and has been called for one o'clock. The purpose of the meeting is not known, but it is thought that Barrow will outline some new demands the Eastern League will make to the National Commission towards obtaining redress from the existing stringent regulations governing the big minor leagues. It is also thought that President Chapin of the Rochester club will be censured for his unsportsmanlike action in ending the post-season series between Rochester and the All-Stars. Chapin's act aroused the enmity of several of his fellow magnates, who say that had Chapin acted fairly the full schedule would have been played out and the series would have been a financial and artistic success.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-
WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties--Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least eighty acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties--Must reside upon the homestead or (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties--Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate a quarter section a house worth \$300.00.
