While any gift of money will be gladly received they now especially ask donations for their loan closet from the general public.

## EARL AND LADY GREY GIVEN HEARTY SEND-OFF

Ottawa, Oct. 11—Their Excellencies Earl and Countess Grey with Ladies Sybil and Evelyn Grey left the capital at 5 o'clock this afternoon amid general signs of enthusiasm tinged with regret.

The sendoff was a fitting one and there was considerable emotion on the part of their Excellencies during the final moments. The past and present cabinets were represented at the station and all the flowers of social intellectual and commercial life at Ottawa. The governor general's foot guards were the guards of honor. The party was escorted to the station by the Princess Louise Guards in a carriage drawn by two spans of horses with postillions in gay uniforms and the salute of nineteen guns was fired Nepean point. Their Excellencies were met at the depot by Hon. Robt. L. Borden and Mayor Hopewell, and bouquets were presented to Lady Grey, while the viceregal car was a mass of flowers. The premier called for cheers for the departing party and everybody sang "Auld Lang Syne" led vociferously by a party of boy scouts whom the governor general inspected for the last time before the special pulled out.

## YOUNGER McNAMARA IS TO BE TRIED FIRST

Los Angeles, Calif., Oct. 11.—Jas. B. McNamara, the younger brother of John J. McNamara, secretary of the International Association of Bridge and Structural Iron Workers, will be tried first for the murder of the men in the explosion of the Los Angeles Times building a year ago. This announcement was made before the opening of court today. District Attorney Frederick, who declared that should the defence exercise its privilege of having the brothers tried separately, elected to begin by placing James McNamara in the prisoner's box.
