SAYS J. B. McNAMARA BLEW UP TIMES

Los Angeles, July 20.—Judge Walter Bordwell yesterday dismissed the contempt proceedings brought against Mrs. Ortie McNamara for her refusal to testify before the Grand Jury in the Los Angeles Times explosion case, in which her husband and John J. and James B. McNamara are under indictment for murder on the ground that the affidavit was insufficient.

The defence, hailing this action as a victory protecting witnesses from being questioned before the Grand Jury, made public for the first time a certified transcript of Ortie McNamara's testimony before the Grand Jury.

The copy was offered as part of the defence's objection to the attempt to compel Mrs. McNamara to talk to the Grand Jury, but it was not needed, because Judge Bordwell acted without waiting for a negative argument.

W. Joseph Ford, assistant district attorney, protested, and said the prosecution either would appeal or would file a new affidavit on the subject.

McNamara, according to the transcript of his testimony, told the Grand Jury that he talked with James B. McNamara during a hunting trip near Conover, Wis., last November, and that McNamara told him he blew up The Times Office. He first knew McNamara as J. B. Price, and later as Frank Sullivan.

He said he had known John J. McNamara five years, and was in his office in the American Central build-

ing, Indianapolis, when the arrangements for J. B. McNamara's trip west, which preceded The Times explosion, were made.

He said that at that time McNamara had one dozen infernal machines. He heard John J. McNamara tell his brother to meet a man named Clancy who would tell him what was to be done.

"KILLED A LOT OF PEOPLE." McNamara testified that they talked of his dynamiting the "Hyle and Patterson job" at Superior, Mich. He said that a suit case containing ten quarts of nitro-glycerine was given him, and that he dynamited that job and others.

McNamara also said that several weeks after he read about The Times explosion, he went to Indianapolis to see J. J. McNamara and McNamara said:

"Then fellows are raising hell out there and they have killed a lot of people, too."

McNamara further testified that he blew up the Llewellyn Iron Works. He said he was sent by John J. McNamara who gave him money. He received \$535 from John J. McNamara. He also testified that infernal machines were manufactured by James B. McNamara.

McNamara's evidence involves O. A. Tveitmore, one of the prominent labor leaders in California, his statements indicating that Tveitmore had some general knowledge of what was going on, although he does not assert that Tveitmore knew the details of the plot he alleges the McNamaras hatched.

HOUSE OF LORDS HAS PASSED THE VETO BILL

London, July 20.—The House of Lords passed the third reading of the parliament bill, otherwise known as the veto bill, without division today after only three hours' debate. The revolt of the insurgent peers failed to materialize. All the threats of the extremist lords to throw out the bill at this stage and precipitate a crisis proved a bluff. One solitary peer, Baron Stanmore, raised his voice to demand a vote. He found no supporters in his role of Horatius at the bridge.

Lord Morley of Blackburn, for the government, and Lord Lansdowne, leader of the opposition, repeated some familiar arguments for and against the measure. Lord Halsbury, leader of the extremists, threatened fight if the House of Commons rejects the amendments.

The future of the measure may be predicted tonight with reasonable certainty. Premier Asquith in the House of Commons on Monday will move the rejection of the lords' amendment en bloc. This done, the prime minister will announce that, if the lords persist, there will be no course open for him but to tender the King certain advice which will ensure the passage of the bill. CANADA TIED FOR FAMOUS KOLAPORE TROPHY

Bisley Camps, July 20.—The Kolapore cup was shot for today, and won by the Mother Country. The Canadian team scored 252 at the 300 range. The individual scores were: Morris 31, Bibby 34, W. Morris 34, Russell 30, Trainor 33, Clifford 33, Mortimer 31, Freeborn 26.

The team totals for the Mother Country were 243; India, 233; Guernsey, 242; South Africa, 237; New Zealand, 244.

ENGLAND NOT MORIBUND SAYS ASQUITH

London, July 19.—The King sent a message of farewell to the luncheon to the representatives of the Dominions given by the Parliamentary Committee, yesterday, conveying the hope that they and their ladies had enjoyed their visit to the Mother Land. He expressed pleasure at having seen them at Buckingham Palace, adding his wishes for a safe and pleasant journey home.

Premier Asquith said he thought that as the result of their survey of various parts of the United Kingdom the visitors would carry away, two abiding impressions. "First, that whatever the pessimists and cynics have said to the contrary, this Mother Country, the home centre of the Empire, is not yet moribund. (Cheers) Wherever you have been you have seen abounding evidence of vitality and progress—I do not wish to speak of politics—in all the social, industrial and other walks of our common life, and, next, but not least important, you will all go to your various dominions and the colonies of the King feeling that there is identity of ideals and aims between the different parts of the Empire, quite independent of all political parties, which constitutes the abiding safeguard of Empire co-operation, with sympathy, freedom and unity. Local patriotism and imperial unity are said to be the characteristic feature conditions of our Empire. Some people think it an accident; some think it a miracle. It is enough for you and me, good, true and loyal subjects of the King, to recognize in it, as everyone must feel, the best solution which the political genius of mankind has yet provided."

Mr. Balfour, leader of the Opposition, in his speech, said: "I associate myself absolutely with the Premier in what he has said in optimistic vein, in a vein of true optimism, with regard to the vigor and vitality of every part of the Empire. We are not a decadent Empire, and we in this country are not a decadent part of the Empire. (Cheers) We in this country, the Mother Land, are personally ready to bear all the weight, all the responsibility, belonging to our position, and we know there is an eager, growing sentiment in every part of the Empire that we should not bear that burden alone." (Cheers).

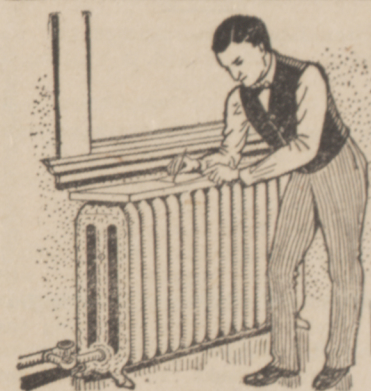
