JOE DONNELLY

IS SUSPENDED FOR INSUBORDINATION

"Rube" Benton Recalled from Chattanooga—Phelan and Crompton to Come Back

Cincinnati, July 19—Some of its plans for strengthening the Cincinnati team have been announced by the management.

Pitcher "Rube" Benton, who was bought for \$7500 from Macon, Ga., last fall and sent to Chattanooga for further seasoning this spring, will be recalled at the close of the Southern league season.
