CLAUDE MCGINNIS
NEW PROFESSOR
AT UNIVERSITY

Graduate of Massachusetts Institute of Technology Succeeds to Chair of Electrical Engineering

The last vacancy on the faculty of the University of New Brunswick caused by the resignation of Prof. Cartmel, has been filled by the appointment of Mr. Claude S. McGinnis to the chair of Physics and electrical engineering. He holds the degree of B.S. from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, one of the foremost technical schools in the United States, and this year took the degree of Ph.D. from the University of Pennsylvania. He served as instructor in both institutions and they have given him a very high recommendation.

The new professor is a native of Greenville, Ill., and is thirty years of age and married. He will enter upon his duties on September 1st. The University will begin the next academic year on Sept. 16th with three new Professors. Prof. Stiles succeeds Prof. Stone in the chair of Engineering, Prof. Vapvaal, takes the chair of modern languages and Prof. McGinnis succeeds Prof. Cartmel as above stated.

REV. DR. CAMPBELL
DELIVERED LECTURE
ON SCOTTISH LIFE

Last evening Dr. Campbell of St. John, who has lately been called to an important position at Mt. Allison lectured on "Scottish Life." Referring to the ancient tradition that the Garden of Eden was located in Scotland, the doctor selected Oban as his first choice with its lovely views of Iona in the distance. Inverness and its charming valley was the doctor's second choice for the Garden of Eden. He stoutly proclaimed the enduring loyalty of Scotchmen to the empire. During the Boer war the Boer fighters were most afraid of the "men that were half women," by which they evidently meant the Highlanders in their kilts. The doctor paid a very eloquent tribute to Robert Burns, who enriched the life of Scotland and the world with his "bonnie sangs."

OTHER LECTURES.

Next Wednesday evening Dr. Bailey will lecture on "Tuberculosis." On Thursday evening Judge Carlton will lecture on "Irish Wit and Humor."

DEATH AT THREE TREE CREEK.

Mrs. John Boone died this morning at the home of her brother-in-law, Mr. Charles Mott, of Three Tree Creek. The deceased was in her ninety-fourth year. Death was due to the infirmities of old age. She is survived by three sons, Henry, John and Frederick, and by four sisters, Mrs. J. Locke DeWitt, Mrs. Hannah Mott, Miss Sally Boone and Miss Mary Boone.

CASES ADJOURNED.

There was a heavy rush of business at the police court this morning and several cases had to be adjourned. One against a citizen for trespassing in the Old Burying Ground was adjourned until Tuesday. An S. P. C. A. case from St. Mary's, a furious driving case and a Board of Health case were all adjourned.

SCOTT ACT CASES.

LARGE ST. JOHN INDUSTRY
MAY REMOVE TO THIS CITY

T. S. Simms Co., Manufacturers of Brooms and Brushes Unable to Obtain Land in St. John for Expansion---Free Site and Tax and Water Exemption Asked

Mr. Lewis W. Simms of St. John, president of the T. S. Simms Co., Ltd. St. John, is in the city today conferring with the city's representatives with regard to the inducements which could be offered by Fredericton to have the company remove its extensive factory for the making of brooms and brushes to this city. The Simms Company asks free site and exemption from the payment of taxes and water rates for a period of ten years. Mr. Simms talked this morning with Mayor Thomas and Ald. Calder, chairman of the Finance Committee. His proposition was thoroughly talked over and consideration promised.

The factory of the T. S. Simms Co. is situated on Union Street, St. John. The company is desirous of expanding but cannot secure land adjacent to its present factory-site, nor can it secure a site in St. John or vicinity which would be suitably situated available land being some distance from that part of the city where the operatives live. At the present time about 250 hands are employed in the factory and if the company carries out its intention of expanding that number will be largely increased.

IMPORTANT INDUSTRY

Such an industry as that of the T. S. Simms Co. would prove of tremendous value to Fredericton. It is estimated that about one hundred of the company's operatives would remove from St. John with the industry. The buildings required by the company would cost in the neighborhood of \$75,000 with machinery valued at as much more. The land required by the company as a site and to furnish room for expansion is five acres. The city's representatives are fully alive to the importance of this matter and steps will be taken at once to inform the Simms Company what can be done for it.

FREDERICTON WELL SITUATED.

Mr. Simms, in company with his foreman, was in Fredericton about a month ago looking over the ground. The matter of removal from St. John has been carefully considered and the advantages offered by various towns examined. It has been found that

Fredericton is as favorably situated in every way as any other city. The company, it is understood, has received offers from Ontario towns, but prefers to remain in the Maritime Provinces. Dr. F. W. Barbour of this city, has been acting in the interests of Mr. Simms for some weeks obtaining information concerning conditions here.
