## YORK COUNTY

### WOMAN APPLIES FOR DIVORCE IN RENO

Helen G. Hagerman Plaintiff, Manzer A. Hagerman Respondent—Suit Undeferred

A suit for divorce which is of interest to York County people has been instituted in the State of Nevada and will soon come up for hearing. The plaintiff is Helen G. Hagerman, formerly Miss McKee of Keswick Ridge and the respondent is Manzer A. Hagerman, formerly of Queensbury but for some time past an inmate of the Provincial Hospital at Fairville. He conducted a store at Bear Island for some years and is well known here and throughout the county. The case will not be defended.

### DETAILS OF CASE

A despatch from Reno gives the following details of the case:—Reno, Nevada, Dec. 2—A divorce case of considerable interest will shortly come before the second Judicial District Court of the State of Nevada and for the County of Washoe at Reno. Helen G. Hagerman is the plaintiff and Manzer A. Hagerman, the respondent. They were married in 1905. Shortly after they were married the plaintiff alleges that the defendant became an habitual drunkard. His reason became affected necessitating his confinement in the Provincial Hospital for the Insane at Fairville, N. B., where he still is. The plaintiff further alleges that the defendant neglected to provide her with the necessities of life when such neglect was not the result of poverty on his part, and also failed to contribute his share towards the support of his family. There are three children by the marriage.

The plaintiff has resided in Reno for six months, the time required to enable her to obtain a divorce under the laws of this state. The defendant was served with a copy of the summons and complaint at St. John, N. B., on Nov 15th last by the American Vice Deputy Consul. W. A. Massey, of Reno, is acting for the plaintiff. The case will be undeferred.

This divorce will not be recognized by the laws of New Brunswick, as the husband resides in that province.

### CANON ELLEGOOD,

#### NATIVE OF PRINCE

#### WILLIAM, DIED SUNDAY

The death of Rev. Canon Ellegood one of the oldest and most distinguished graduates of the University of New Brunswick occurred in Montreal yesterday morning. The deceased had been in poor health for some time and death had been expected for some days. The late Canon Ellegood was a native of Prince William, York County, and has relatives still living in that place.

### ACTIVE CAREER

Canon Ellegood's career was one of actively enthusiastic work in the ministry right up to the time of his last illness.

Born, March, 1824, he received his education at the University of New Brunswick, then King's College, where he graduated with the degree of B. A. in 1849. Upon his ordination, first as deacon in 1848 and as a priest in the following year, he was appointed junior assistant at Christ Church Cathedral, Montreal.

His first charge was St. Ann's chapel, Grifintown, and there he remained during the year of the immigrant ship fever and as a consequence suffered for years from the poisonous virus with which his system had become infected. A year later he aided in the fight against the pestilential outbreak of cholera which followed the ship fever. His church was burned to the ground shortly after, but was rebuilt through an appeal to the people of wealthier parishes and remained St. Stephen's.

### RECTOR OF ST. JAMES

In 1864 St. James the Apostle church was built and he became the first rector, and has since remained with that church.

The late Canon Ellegood was the oldest clergyman in the diocese of Montreal, and the only left who saw the birth of its synod in 1859. He was also the oldest military chaplain in the British service, having been appointed chaplain of the Victoria Rifles, when that regiment was organized over fifty years ago. Until the present year he had preached to men of that corps at every annual church parade.

## FATHER STATES

### SON DIED FROM EFFECT OF KICK

Israel J. Goodine Passed away at Victoria Hospital at Noon—Father may ask for Investigation

The death of Israel J. Goodine took place in Victoria Public Hospital at noon today as the result of internal trouble. The young man had been in the hospital for several weeks and had been operated on for abscess of the bowels three times. Last week his condition became such that no hope of his recovery was held out and he sank gradually. The deceased was twenty-two years of age, son of Mr. and Mrs. Alex. Goodine of Upper Kingsclear and is survived by his parents, five brothers and five sisters. The funeral will take place tomorrow morning. High Mass of Requiem will be celebrated at St. Anne's Church, French Village, by Rev. Father Cormier. Interment will be made at that place.

### FATHER'S STATEMENT.

Mr. Alex. Goodine, father of the deceased, stated this morning that it was his firm belief that his son's death was due to injuries he received on the evening of June 24th last in a fight at Smith & Hammond's store in Kingsclear. On that occasion he was kicked about the lower part of the body and sustained so severe injuries that he was in bed for several weeks. His father stated today that since being hurt in the summer his son had never recovered. Mr. Goodine stated also that if he could get assurance from a doctor that the abscess which caused death was the result of the injuries his son received in the fight he would ask the authorities to take up the matter.

### IMPORTANT CHANGES

It was announced in the Roman Catholic Churches that Friday next which will be the Feast of the Immaculate Conception of the Virgin Mary will not be observed as a fast day as it is to be kept in the diocese as a feast of the first class and meat may be eaten. The day is also the personal feast of the diocese. In the future meat may be eaten on holidays of obligation even if they fall on Friday.

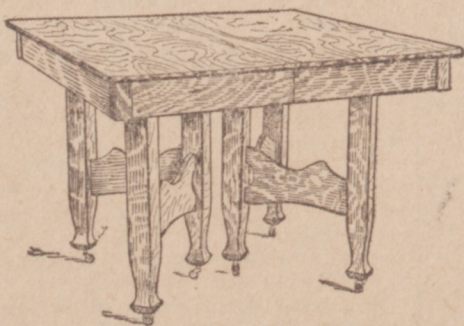

## MOOSE TO BE

### MOUNTED LIFE-SIZE FOR ELKS' LODGE

Fine Specimens of Heads Received Today—Receipts from Licenses up to Average

The head, hide and bones of a moose killed in the hunting territory of Guide James Somerville, during the biggest game season which closed on December 1st, arrived at Emack's this morning to be mounted life-size. The animal was killed by Mr. E. H. Murray of Altoona, Pa., who intends the life-sized mounting to be a 'gift to the Elks' Lodge of Altoona of which he is a member.

Another fine head received today came from Guide John Doran's territory on the Lepreau and is to be mounted for its owner L. L. Andrews of Newark, N. J., It has a spread of sixty inches with twenty-two points.

One of the finest mooseheads seen here this season also arrived this morning from Guide Doran's camps on the Lepreau. It has a spread of fifty-eight inches and twenty-two points. It was secured by Mr. Doran's seventeen-year-old son, Frank, a few days ago.

The big game season according to the statements of both taxidermists and guides was much better than had been expected. Moose and caribou were plentiful in the greater part of the province and the total number of heads killed will probably be up to the average. Deputy Surveyor General Loggie stated today that returns from the game license vendors were incomplete and probably would be until the New Year. The receipts from game licenses in 1910 was upwards of \$41,000 and it is expected that those of 1911 will almost equal that amount. Some days ago upwards of \$3,000 was paid in at the Crown Land office by one vendor. Col. Loggie stated also that the total number of head of game killed would be equal to that reported in 1910.

### SHOOTING ACCIDENT

Walter Parent a guide employed by Mr. John Doran at Lepreau, was the victim of a serious shooting accident a short time ago. A Savage rifle which he was handling accidentally discharged and the bullet passed through the ball of his left foot. Being a soft nose bullet of small calibre it made an ugly and painful wound. He is now at Lepreau under the doctor's care.

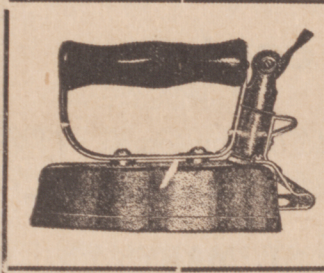
