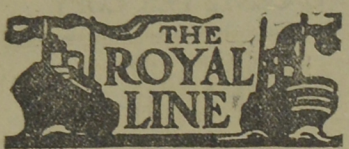

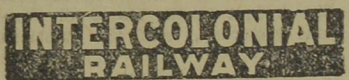

The Election for one Alderman for Queen's Ward in the City of Fredericton for the current year will be held on Monday the 27th day of May inst. # WILL RECEIVE WARM WELCOME

Preparations are on the way for the reception of the representative party of manufacturers and business men from Great Britain, who will arrive in Canada at the beginning of next month and make a tour of the Dominion in order to gain an idea of its resources and the opportunities that exist for commercial expansion and the establishment of branch industries. The tour which was organized by the Financial News of London has the approval and support of the Dominion Government. Hon. George E. Foster, the Minister of Trade and Commerce, is showing deep interest in the undertaking, as he realizes that the visit of such a representative party of business men to Canada cannot fail to be of benefit to the Dominion.

The party which will number between fifty and sixty, including representatives of leading manufacturing and business corporations of Great Britain, will sail from Liverpool on May 31st on the C. P. R. Empress of Britain, and will arrive at Quebec on June 6th. Arrangements are being made for an official welcome at the Ancient Capital. After spending the day at Quebec the party will proceed by special train on its tour of the Dominion, first visiting the chief industrial centres of the Maritime Provinces including the great steel works and coal areas at Sydney. According to present arrangements the party is scheduled to arrive in Montreal early on the morning of Saturday, June 15th, and will spend the day here before proceeding west. On their return the visitors will spend several more days in this city before sailing for home on July 20th. The visitors are to be given a cordial reception in Montreal both by the civic authorities and the various commercial organizations.

Mayor Lavallee yesterday morning received Mr. John Boyd, special Canadian representative of the Financial News when the forthcoming arrival of the party in Montreal was discussed, and the Mayor promised that the visitors would receive a most cordial welcome to the commercial metropolis. The matter was officially brought before the City Council at its meeting yesterday afternoon, when a letter was submitted from Hon. George E. Foster, Minister of Trade and Commerce, addressed to the Mayor notifying him of the forthcoming visit of the party. Mr. Foster in his letter said in part: "I am writing you this to say that my department is interested in and mainly responsible for the visit, and I would like to bespeak your earnest co-operation in the matter. The object is not to have a round of festivities or expend very much time on ceremony and banquets. The object is to bring these gentlemen face to face with the most compact and pertinent information possible, with reference to the resources of Canada and the possibilities for development along the lines of industries of which they are captains and in which they are experts I would like to have you make such arrangements as would give them during their stay with you the very best information and enable them to become acquainted with your representative interests and resources."

"I have thought it better to write the Mayor of each city and ask him to co-operate with the Board of Trade so as best to carry out the purpose of the visit. "If we can show these gentlemen favorable openings for the establishment of industries, and can enlist their capital, experience and skill, we shall have done a good thing for Canada and for our visitors."

The matter was referred to the civic Reception Committee for action. The Canadian Manufacturers Association, Montreal branch has already taken the matter up officially and steps are under way to extend to the visitors every hospitality during their stay in Montreal. The Montreal Board of Trade, the Chambre de Commerce, and other business organizations of the city will also, it is expected, join in the welcome to the visitors and afford them every facility for obtaining knowledge of the commercial opportunities that exist in Canada. Arrangements are also being made by all the leading cities and towns in the Dominion to give the visitors a fitting reception.

Regarding the tour and its objects Mr. Boyd, who is making arrangements for the arrival of the party in Canada yesterday said: "The tour will undoubtedly be a great success, and will, without question, result in market benefit to Canada. Mr. Foster, who has done and is doing such great work both for Canada and the Empire in the way of encouraging trade expansion is deeply interested in the success of the undertaking, and its accomplishment is largely due to his personal encouragement and support. The tour is undertaken not to serve the interests of any particular organization or individual, but in order to give prominent manufacturers and business men of Great Britain an opportunity of seeing for themselves the wonderful resources of

the Dominion and the opening for trade and industry. When it is stated that the business and manufacturing corporations which will be represented in the party embody aggregate capitalization of two hundred and fifty million dollars, some idea of the importance of the party may be had."

"The visitors for the most part will be either the chairman or managing director of half a hundred of the leading industries of Great Britain from steel works to biscuit factories, with every other branch of industry represented. When the complete list of the party is published, it will be seen how important and representative the delegation will be. The itinerary of the tour will practically cover every important point of Canada, except Prince Rupert, which time will not permit of the party visiting. The party will go from coast to coast, from Sydney, N. S., to Victoria, B. C., seeing all there is to be seen and observing all along the route what openings there are for the development of British trade and the location of British industries in Canada. The tour will occupy 42 days and arrangements have been so perfected that the visitors will be able to see all of Canada that is worth seeing without wasting a minute."

labor. Freight rates are 150 per cent. too high. The U. F. A. would change all that. Its plans is co-operation all the way through—co-operation in coal depots, farm implement depots, elevators, lumber yards, stock yards. The U. F. A. would act as buying agent and selling agent. The reforms the U. F. A. proposes go into every little detail of the farmer's business, but getting cheaper freight rates, and a lower tariff and cutting out the middleman so that the farmers will intercept all the legitimate profits between him and his market are the large immediate problems. One of the very first things the U. F. A. is reaching for is the British Columbia trade in farm products, which amount to ten million dollars and goes mostly to the United States. Alberta buys British Columbia lumber. Why shouldn't British Columbia buy Alberta's farm stuff? The answer rests with the railways.

### LIBERTY BUT NOT LICENSE

With all this zeal with Liberty there is no license in the west. The wild and woolly days are forgotten or pushed into the back ground. Law and order are now more respected than they are in the east—on the principle no doubt that what is newer is dearer, like the rents of apartment houses in Toronto. 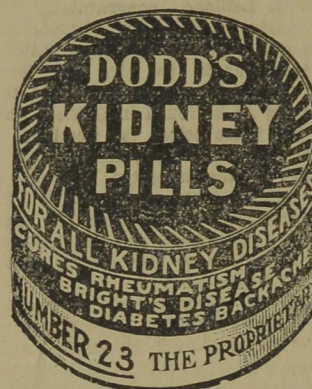
