ORGANIZATION FOR OLD HOME WEEK BEGINS

MAYOR'S ADDRESS.

His Worship, upon calling the meeting to order, expressed his satisfaction at so large an attendance. He referred to the very successful Old Home celebration which had taken place in Fredericton in 1906, continuing for three days. The fire department had largely organized that celebration. That proposed for 1912 the Board of Trade had taken steps to organize. His Worship mentioned the features of the 1906 celebration—firemen's parade and sports, polymorphian parade, fireworks, water sports, school children's parade, trades' parade, etc. The speaker stated that strong committees were necessary and he hoped and believed that they would be secured. He asked for nominations for permanent chairman.

His Worship was proposed but declined. Mr. J. T. Jennings also declined. Mr. George Y. Dibblee was appointed and accepted the appointment in a brief speech in which he said that all committees would be kept up to the mark.

FIREMEN'S CO-OPERATION.

On the suggestion of Mayor Hooper Chief Rutter of the Fredericton Fire Department, was heard. He said the firemen were attempting to furnish themselves with uniforms. The cost would be about seven hundred dollars. Without them it would be impossible to take part in a demonstration. However, if the citizens would defray the cost of the celebration the firemen would furnish the uniforms.

Chief Coombs of the St. Mary's Fire Department, stated that its members were willing to assist the Fredericton firemen.

SOCIETIES HEARD FROM.

Mr. R. B. VanDine, on behalf of the Knights of Pythias, stated that that order was ready to assist in the celebration and also might be able to place their lodge-room at the disposal of the committee as a rest-room or writing-room.

For the Ancient Order of Hibernians Mr. J. P. Farrell said that its members would not be behind those of any other in aiding in a celebration.

For the Independent Order of Odd-fellows, Mr. C. A. Sampson said that the members of the order would be loyal to their town but he regretted that he was not in a position to make any definite offer. He thought that the enthusiasm displayed augured well for the success of the Old Home Week.

His Worship suggested that something be done towards organizing a water parade and water sports.

Mr. Dibblee, the permanent chairman, suggested that a finance committee be appointed at once. It was necessary to know at once how much money would be available. He thought the merchants and hotel-keepers should be called upon to contribute and could well afford to do so.

His Worship, on motion, was empowered to appoint a committee.

BANDS OFFER SERVICES.

On behalf of the 71st Regt. Band, Mr. Clement Toner stated that that organization was ready to do its utmost in the way of free concerts to help the celebration. The band intended, if allowed the use of the Old Government House, to conduct an afternoon's and evening's entertainment there on one day of Old Home Week.

For the Fredericton Brass Band, Mr. George G. Parker said that the organization, like the other band, was ready to do its part, but it should be remembered that bands could hardly be asked to turn out each day when its members necessarily lost time from their work.

IMPORTANT SUGGESTIONS.

Publicity Agent McDade read a tentative program. Mr. J. T. Jennings spoke strongly in favor of the proposed celebration and said that optimism was the greatest necessity. The Publicity

Agent was desirous of receiving the addresses of former Fredericton people now resident elsewhere, who might be induced to attend Old Home Week.

Judge Wilson called attention to the river steamer service. It could be much improved and he hoped an effort would be made to have the steamer Victoria placed upon the river during the Old Home Week.

His Worship said he had been informed that it was only a matter of a few weeks before the Victoria would be on the Fredericton—St. John route.

Mr. P. W. Cass urged that a good trades and labor parade be a part of the celebration.

Dr. Barbour urged that floats showing the historic progress of the city be made a feature of one of the parades.

TO SECURE OPERA HOUSE.

Mr. A. R. Slipp, M.P.P., suggested that control of the Opera House be secured for the Old Home Week by the committee. The secretary was instructed to engage the Opera House for the week in question and to secure a stock company to play an engagement during that time.

The secretary was also instructed to communicate with the secretary of the School Board with a view toward organizing a parade of school children.

Judge Wilson suggested that the Municipality of York be approached with a view toward having a grant made toward the Old Home Week celebration.

Mr. A. R. Slipp, M.P.P., made some complimentary reference to Mr. McDade, the publicity agent. Co-operation and sympathy on the part of the citizens were necessary to aid him.

Mr. Clifford Creed suggested that there be a Ladies' Day as part of the celebration.

Organization was completed as given before the sub-committees to be appointed at a later date. The meeting then adjourned, the committees to meet at the call of the permanent chairman.

Guthrie told of the great work that he, as chairman of the police commission, has accomplished for the cause of temperance.

He had closed up Crangle and McAllister and had succeeded in putting Wall out of business. Such a record of achievement he felt sure would appeal to Mr. Eardley's temperance principles. Mr. Thomas thought so too, but Mr. Eardley appeared to have his doubts. He promised to give the matter serious consideration and give an answer at nine o'clock. At the appointed hour, Ald. Frank Cochrane were going to do for the city. He wanted no part of the civic game and deeply chagrined Ald. Guthrie was compelled to beat a retreat and abandon the man hunt.

On the whole it was a very strenuous day for the would-be civic boss from Wellington Ward and he accomplished—nothing.

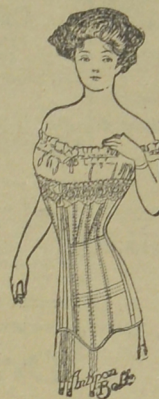
