

ANOTHER POSTPONEMENT IN HERBERT CASE

Montreal, Q., Nov. 13—There has been another postponement in the hearing to decide whether or not Marc Anne Cloutre is the legal wife of Eugene Herbert or whether the Ne Temere decree can be legally sustained in separating man and wife. After a brief session, this morning, the case was put over for proof and hearing next Monday morning. At this morning's session, Herbert's lawyers objected to going on with the hearing on the ground that they had not been able to subpoena certain witnesses including the defendant Mrs. Herbert and her mother, Mrs. Herbert's lawyers offered to bring the woman into court, if the hearing was allowed to go on and that Mrs. Herbert's mother was in Vermont, she could not be summoned.

Judge Archer ruled that as the record in the case was still before Judge Ocharbonneau on motion of the defendant, to strike out certain preliminary evidence and as a week's delay would not seriously prejudice the case, he would grant a week's postponement.

NATIONAL COMMISSION MEETS

Cincinnati, O., Nov. 14—Major league baseball owners and patrons will be particularly interested in the meeting of the National Commission which began here today and will probably continue over until Thursday or Friday. The most important matter to come before the baseball supreme court, consisting of President Hermann of the Cincinnati club and Presidents Johnson and Lynch of the American and National leagues respectively, is the recent ticket scandal in connection with the world's series games. That the Bush-Johnson controversy over the ticket sale will be brought up for discussion is regarded as certain, but persons well informed as to the situation are inclined to believe that the matter will be disposed of without entering into a formal investigation of the charges of collusion between the New York club and the scalpers. At the same time it is thought likely the National Commission will take steps to bring about a radical change in the present system of determining the world's championship so as to obviate any future repetition of the scandal that followed the series this year.

CONSERVATIVES IN TORONTO ARE AT LOGGERHEADS

Toronto, Nov. 11—The Conservatives of Toronto will soon come out into the open in one of the most interesting struggles that has ever occupied the attention of the party in this city. Noted for years for harmony in deliberation and object, the local ranks have, during the past six weeks, been sadly strained over problems that have to do with future representation in the Legislature. On election day however, it may be taken for granted that they will be a solid unit behind the candidates who, by that time, will have been sorted out from the many who are now seeking nomination preferences.

On Monday night the Conservatives of North Toronto met in nomination convention to be followed on Tuesday night, by East Toronto, Thursday night by West Toronto, and Friday night, South Toronto. By next Saturday, therefore, most of the mist will have cleared away, and bickerings will have been laid on the shelf. For a year, there have been underground murmurs in connection with patronage, which did not threaten to become serious, however, and probably would not have, had not larger issues arisen which served to fan the discontent into a flame.

NE TEMERE TROUBLE

The Orange element has become very much worked up over the Ne Temere decree, which has become on bilingual schools. Orangemen are calling upon Sir James Whitney to take steps to ensure that English shall be the only language for the schools of Ontario. True Sir James appointed a special commissioner to look into this subject; but his report has not been forthcoming, and an election has been sprung on in the meantime.

THE WHITE APPOINTMENT

Then the resentment of the rank and file of Toronto's ward politicians against the selection of Mr. W. T. White as Minister of Finance was kept buzzing around Sir James' ears, for it was believed that his recommendation of Mr. White had more influence with Mr. Borden than the advice of other interests behind the new nominee.

MR. FOY DRIVEN OUT

Immediately a movement was set on foot to punish Sir James Whitney through some of his members. The first man attacked is the Hon. J. J. Foy, Attorney-General, who has practically been driven out of South Toronto, where it is believed E. W. J. Owen, for some years president of the Central Conservative Association will be given seat "A" at the convention without opposition. For seat "B," which has been represented by Mr. G. H. Gooderham, Dr. Ebdard will be a competitor. It is probable, however, that Mr. Gooderham will be renominated.

IN NORTH TORONTO

The Hon. Mr. Foy will run in North Toronto, probably in seat "A." Before this is done, however, there will be a struggle of the workers, who are behind Thomas Hook, president of Ward three Conservative Association.

IN EAST TORONTO

In East Toronto the Hon. Dr.

Pyne will not likely meet with much opposition for seat "A," but for seat "B," Mr. Thomas Whitesides, the late member, may have to try conclusions with Joe Thompson.

AFTER CRAWFORD'S SCALP

In West Toronto the boys are after the Hon. Thomas Crawford's scalp. They say that Mr. Crawford has been in the Legislature for a great many years; has got all the favors coming to the ordinary member, including the Speakership and that he should retire and give some of the younger men a chance. Mr. Crawford, however, thinks that he has not yet outlived his usefulness, and again seeks nomination.
