AN UNDERGROUND CANVASS

The Conservative party has every reason to be ashamed of the underground canvasses by which it obtained power. At the Liberal Convention recently held in Leeds and Grenville, Ontario, this matter was discussed. One of the delegates, Dr. John Dunn, spoke frankly of the situation. He is reported to have said:

"He was a Roman Catholic himself but he recognized that the question of the ne temere marriage decree had been the principal stock-in-trade of the Conservative campaigners in Leeds. It was misunderstood by many Protestants, and had been misrepresented to others. Such a campaign as has been waged lent neither strength nor dignity to the Conservative party. It was unworthy and calculated to stir up religious hatred."

"And whatever the differences of opinion on this decree, every man knows that Sir Wilfrid Laurier had no more to do with it than you or I. Why penalize the greatest of Canadians, the best man who ever appeared in our lives, anyway, by such unjust and unworthy tactics?"

These utterances were greeted with cheers, but it may be said this is the utterance of a Catholic Liberal. What do Protestant Liberals say? Well, here is the report of the Convention in answer:

Rev. Frank Chisholm, Methodist minister at Phillipsville, followed in a spirited address. He recognized the truth of Dr. Dunn's charge against the Conservative campaigners in Leeds.

"I yield to no man in my Protestantism," he declared, "but I blush for the appeals made in this riding on grounds of religious prejudice against a great Canadian who has spent his life in public service, seeking to unite in true and patriotic Canadianism all creeds and classes."

There is not the slightest doubt that the ne temere canvass was worked to the limit in York and other Protestant constituencies during the recent election and was the means of securing hundreds of votes for the Tory cause. Having sowed the wind of discord the men who profited by this insidious canvass now stand to reap the whirlwind. The clerical party of Quebec, the party largely responsible for the Manitoba school trouble of 1896, which drove the late Hon. N. Clarke Wallace out of the Tory government, are strongly represented in the Borden cabinet and are pretty sure to be heard from sooner or later. Already we have Archbishop Langevin, in a speech delivered at a Quebec banquet, calling attention to the alleged disadvantages of the Catholics of Winnipeg and Brandon. It is a safe bet that His Grace will, at an early day, take advantage of his pull with the Borden government and seek to have removed the grievances which he complains of. In any move of this kind he is quite certain to have the hearty support of the Nationalists of Quebec, while the Ontario wing of the party, which profited by the ne temere decree, will be pretty sure to kick up a row. It does not require the gift of second sight to see turbulent times ahead for Premier Borden.

It is said that a committee of the New Brunswick Temperance Federation is engaged in drawing up a prohibition bill and will submit the same to the legislature and ask for its enactment. The bill will contain among other things, very strict provisions regarding the importation of liquor for private consumption. There is scarcely much likelihood of the bill passing the legislature, at at present constituted, even if it should get before that body.

It now transpires that the local Tories who were ambitious to serve their country in the capacity of dredging contractors, were unable to raise the necessary wherewithal. They succeeded, however, in obtaining an option on a dredge, but a St. John syndicate captured the outfit away from them.

The election of Mr. Bonar Law, M. P., a former New Brunswick, to succeed Mr. Balfour as the leader of the Unionist party in Great Britain, bears out in a measure a recent prediction by Earl Grey, that the centre of gravity of the Empire would shortly shift to Canada.

Mr. N. W. Rowell, the new Liberal leader in Ontario, has laid down a progressive policy which has been commended even by many Conservative newspapers. The new leader is now planning a three weeks campaign tour of the province.

Mr. Arthur Hawkes of Toronto, who engineered the "British-born" campaign for the Tories, has already received his reward from the Borden government. He has been appointed special immigration commissioner at home and abroad.

An Ottawa despatch to The Standard says that Mr. H. A. Powell, K. C., of St. John, has been recommended as a member of the Canadian International Waterways Commission.

A Winnipeg despatch says that Archbishop Langevin, on his arrival at St. Boniface, gave out a contradiction to the despatch from Montreal of November 7th, which stated that Monsignor Stagni, apostolic delegate, had forbidden His Grace to discuss the school question in the Province of Quebec. He said that he had made free mention of the disadvantages of the Catholics of Winnipeg and Brandon at a banquet following the consecration of Bishop Mathieu in the presence of the delegate and the episcopate of the Province of Quebec. His Grace said the despatch was the mean invention of mean politicians.

The returns from the late Dominion election, although still incomplete, show that the Conservatives received a total of 626,248 votes and the Liberals received 595,938, an apparent majority for the Conservatives of 30,310. The Liberals secured three seats by acclamation, which in the last contested election gave them a majority of 2,910. The popular majority of the Conservatives, roughly speaking, was about 28,000, which is very little more than the party obtained in the City of Toronto. Outside of the Province of Ontario the two parties broke even in the recent election.

ADVISED CONSULS TO QUIT NANKING

Nanking, Nov. 13.—The commanders of both the British and German war vessels here visited Nanking today and advised the foreign consuls and their staffs to withdraw as the warships could not protect the consulates.

Thirteen Chinese gunboats arrived this afternoon. They are not flying any flag but the officers stated that they would run up the Republican one later. The cruiser and three gunboats have moved up the canal ostensibly with the purpose of shelling the rebel position.

CHINA'S HOPE ON THE FENCE.

Peking, Nov. 13.—Yuan Shi Kai, the last prop of the throne has reached Peking at last. He came today accompanied by 2,000 troops and was warmly greeted by the administration. In honor of his arrival an edict was issued appointing him commander of the troops in the vicinity of the capital. Great efforts are being made to induce him to accept the premiership but he has given no definite answer as yet.

The national assembly today discussed the question of the immediate opening of parliament but decided that would be inadvisable. The matter was referred to a committee, which will consult with Yuan Shi Kai.

The opinion is held at the legation that there are serious complications in store for China and greater sufferings than she has yet endured. The prospects of foreign intervention by other powers than Russia and Japan are beginning to be discussed. Winter is expected to terminate the massed movement of troops but there will be greater death through famine. The people in the central section are already supplementing their feed with the bark of trees.

The government continues gathering Manchurian recruits at Peking, but soon will be unable to meet the payments.

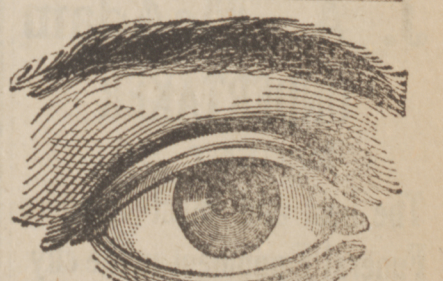
