SUPREME COURT OPENED NOVEMBER SITTINGS TODAY

November sittings of the Supreme Court opened this morning in the Supreme Court Chamber. Several common motions were made.

There were present Chief Justice Barker and Judges White, Barry and McKeown.

Messrs. Titus J. Carter and Arthur R. Slipp, having presented His Majesty's commission appointing them his counsel, were called within the bar.

In the case of Thos. K. Parr vs Edward Denning et al, J. D. Phinney, K.C., moved for non-payment of taxed costs under a rule made at September sittings and read the affidavit of J. D. Phinney. Rule absolute for attachment was granted.

In the case of Carolina A. G. Carr vs The Canadian Pacific Railway Co., F. R. Taylor moved for leave to enter on the appeal paper of this sittings and for time to file notices, and read the affidavit of Fred DeVine and E. R. Taylor. Leave was granted and the time extended to January 2nd next to file notices.

In the case of Philip Markey vs George R. Sloat et al, J. W. McCready moved for leave to enter and time to file notices of motion, and read the affidavit of J. W. McCready. Leave to enter was granted and the time to file notices extended to January 2nd next.

Ex parte Paul Doyle, J. G. Byrne moved for a rule absolute for a certiorari and a rule nisi to quash an order for a vote on the grounds that there was no solemn declaration proving the genuineness of the signatures to the petition, that it was not shown that the justice was in the county, that the petition does not show upon its face that it was signed by at least one-quarter of the ratepayers of the parish. PROF. STYLES ADDRESSED NATURAL HISTORY SOCIETY ON ITALY AND ITS PEOPLE

The November meeting of the Fredericton Natural History Society was held last night in the Assembly Hall of the Normal School, and was quite largely attended by members and students. It was addressed by Prof. Styles of the University, who took as his subject "Sicily and Its People."

Prof. Styles began his address by comment upon his trip across the Atlantic by way of the Azores, many incident of which he treated in a humorous way. He sketched Gibraltar as he saw it on the black-board; but for a more realistic view he referred his audience to pictures by the insurance companies. The trip across the Mediterranean to Naples he enlivened for us by the incident of Campbell's Island, a new island which appeared one night above the surface. Some "John Bull" in his yacht, spied it, and promptly took possession of it in the name of Great Britain. But France and Italy both claimed it and international difficulties were also "looming" when nature took it back to the depths again. The speaker interestingly described the appearance of Italy from the sea, and touched upon Italian scenery and climate. The chief part of his address, however, was devoted to the customs and mode of life of the people among whom he sojourned for two years in Messina, repeating the calls of the vendors of different articles on the streets, &c., and ended with a laughable description of an Italian courtship.

A vote of thanks, moved by Dr. Foster and seconded by George A. Inch, was voted to the Professor.

BRUTAL HUSBAND CUL- TY OF MANSLAUGHTER

Toronto, Ont., Nov. 14—Edward Wilkins, charged with the murder of his wife, was found guilty of manslaughter, last night, the evidence showing that the woman died of heart failure.

The death was probably hastened by Wilkie's brutal assaults. When asked by the Judge if he had anything to say, Wilkie answered that he was sorry to say that it was not his fault that his wife died. Wilkie was so little interested in his trial, that he dozed in the dock during the taking of evidence.

Discussion on the matter of hard-labor sentences showed that the committees were opposed to the organization of a chain-gang such as exists in St. John and the city representatives doubted if sufficient return could be obtained from prisoners working on the streets. It was finally decided to have County Secretary Bliss correspond with County Secretary J. King Kelley of the Municipality of the City and County of St. John concerning the matter of hard-labor in jails. Mr. Kelley and Coun. F. M. Cochran of St. Martin's recently returned from an extensive tour during which they investigated this matter.

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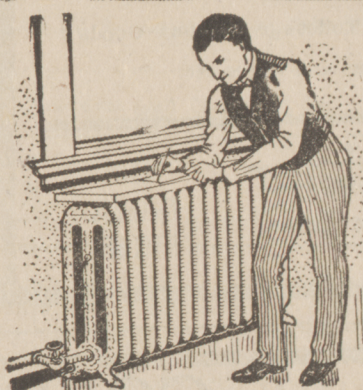
