The annual meeting of the Fredericton Society of St. Andrew's was held in Castle Hall, York Street, last night Pres. A. S. McFarlane in the chair. Pres. McFarlane was re-elected head of the society and the general opinion was expressed that the society should return to the rule of permitting a president to hold office for two years, which had been in abeyance for some time. It was also decided that the celebration of St. Andrew's night should take the form of a dinner and that steps should be taken to organize some celebration of Burns' night.

The auditor's report showed the finances of the society to be in a health condition and that in addition to the ordinary expenses there had been \$90 extraordinary expenses leaving a small balance on hand.

## BURNS MEMORIAL

The Burns Memorial committee made a report on the replacing of the statue which is now considered flawless. A debt of about five hundred dollars still rests upon the memorial for money due the contractors and other. A determined effort will be made to pay this off. Up to the date two hundred dollars have been subscribed by the members of the society. A thorough canvass is to be made of all other members and it is hoped that a considerable amount can be obtained from them. It is also hoped that the celebration on "Burns night," January 25th will clear off any balance that may remain.

City Representatives Opposed to Paying more for Administration of Justice

A special committee from the Municipal Council conferred yesterday afternoon with the Administration of Justice Committee of the City Council on the matter of providing hard labor for long-term prisoners at the county jail and also concerning the contention of the municipality that the City of Fredericton should pay more towards the expenses of the Administration of Justice in city and county. No decision was reached on either question and adjournment was made until January 7th in order to obtain additional information concerning hard labor sentences. The city's representatives who were present were absolutely opposed to the city paying any greater proportion of the cost of Administration of Justice than at the present time. They were also opposed to any change in the mode of paying the expenses of coroners' inquests.

The municipality was represented by County Secretary-Treasurer Bliss, Warden Rogers, Coun. Fred Pond and Coun. McMullin. The city was represented by Mayor Thomas, City Clerk McCready, Ald. Jewett and Ald. Wilkinson. Other members of the Administration of Justice Committee were unable to be present.

## EXPENSES OF ADMINISTRATION.

His Worship Mayor Thomas, in reply to the opinion expressed by the municipal representatives that the City of Fredericton should pay a larger proportion of the expenses of the administration of justice, gave them some facts and figures concerning the attendance of pupils from the county at schools in the city, showing that the city did not receive an adequate return for the money it expended in that connection. Reference was also made by the city's representatives to the fire protection afforded the municipal building at the expense of the city and also to the fact that many wrongdoers who were arrested and sentenced in the city had their places of abode in the county.

## CORONERS' INQUESTS

The county representatives suggested that the expenses of holding inquests be borne entirely by city or county according to the place in which they might be held. Objection
