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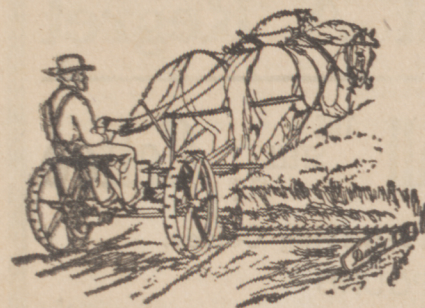

MARATHONS WON 12 TO 9 IN POORLY PLAYED GAME

Heavy Hitting, Errors and Rain Combined To Make Wretched Exhibition--New Fredericton Players Bat Well--Further Changes in Local Team Likely.

There were seven innings of horrible baseball at Scully's Grove yesterday with the St. John Marathons winning 12 to 9. The game went still farther than the others to show that the Fredericton team needs pruning and discipline. The fans who viewed the game came away with the impression that Joe Farrell was not giving his best work to the team. A play of his in the first inning was sufficient to account for this impression. Big Bill Duval relieved Tift in the box and gave a sorry exhibition not as a pitcher but in another way walking off the diamond when Umpire Blair's decision on balls and strikes did not agree with his own opinion. Fredericton will not support a team with incidents like those mentioned happening in games. The executive will probably deal with both players mentioned and steps that may be taken will certainly receive the support of the sporting public.

THE NEW MEN

The new players who reached Fredericton the preceding night were in the game and as might be expected came in for criticism and lots of it. A certain section of the rooters along the third-base line made no allowances for the new men's misplays and yelled continuously for local men to be put in. Sullivan who has been ill for some weeks had an off day. His fielding was all right but at the bat he could do nothing with Turbell's shots. George Finnemore replaced him after a few innings. The other new men, Bob Conley and Callahan had three errors between them but with the stick showed that they were the right men in the right place. Bob Conley had a nice two-bagger and Callahan in four times at bat tallied a single, a three-bagger and a home-run, the first clean home-run on the home grounds this season. Those who saw the new men work out yesterday morning thought their playing was all right and it is likely they will shake down to their regular pace before long.

PITCHERS IN DEMAND

Tift, Duval and Bates were all called upon to pitch for the locals and were all batted Bates doing the best of the trio. The Fredericton team needs a strengthened box staff and it would not be surprising if new pitchers came on the scene shortly.

MARATHONS STRONGER

The Marathons were a much stronger aggregation than when they first played here this season and will be right in the league-race before the season ends. They batted hard yesterday and with the exception of a couple of weak spots were strong in the field. Turbell was batted hard by the locals, fourteen hits in seven innings being his record.

A GOOD START

The local team made a good start. The Marathons failed to get a man beyond second in the first inning, while Fredericton scored five runs in their half of the period finding Turbell for six hits. Everything was lovely until the Greeks landed on Tift for four hits in the second inning and, errors and a queer stunt by Farrell let in five runs. After that the game was a tight mare. A heavy thunder storm came up and did not improve matters. The game was delayed on account of the rain and was finally called in the eighth. Fredericton tried pitcher after pitcher. Murray was sick and left the game. Griffin twisted an ankle and had to retire. When the game ended Pat Duggan was catching, Finnemore playing first base, and Hughes covering the second bag. Tift went to the field and pulled off some good plays. His throw to the plate in time to catch Joe Donnelly in the sixth was the feature of the game. On third Callahan in the seventh made a left-handed stop of Turbell's sizzling drive but spoiled the effect by making a useless heave to first which put the ball into the crowd.

DIAMOND DUST
The home team plays an exhibition game at Houlton today. Griffin, Hughes, Duval and Finnemore did not go with the team. Tift and Murray are expected to be the battery. The Fredericton team dropped a place in the league standing as a result of yesterday's game. Calais is now the leader. The local team will shake down into its stride again however.

LADY BINGEN WON FROM RAMONA AT HILLSGROVE

Potter, Ramona's Seventeen-Years-Old Driver Made Big Hit With the Crowd.

Hills Grove, R. I., July 5.—Some great racing was seen here yesterday afternoon, both events going into extra heats, with plenty of excitement in close finishes.

The 2:17 class, pacing, furnished the best racing of the day in the contest between Lady Bingen, a swift little black mare, and Potter's Ramona, which won five heats. The crowd seemed to want young Potter, who is only 17 years old, to win, but after he had taken two heats, Lady Bingen showed that she had the speed in the final and won rather easily, much to the disappointment of the race-goers. The crowd gave young Potter a hand after winning the second and fourth heats, the first time it has been done this season. The youngster got all there was out of his horse and made some great finishes, but did not have speed enough to get Lady Bingen in the final mile, when she worked out a big 1.1, too long to overcome.

Lady Bingen won the first heat, but was beaten out by a nose in the second by Ramona when the big mare came from behind. In the third it was again Lady Bingen, but Potter got the fourth. He looked good to take the fifth also, but the dope was upset.

The 2:18 class, trotting, went four heats and was captured by Baden, although it looked as if John F. Gibson would have an easy time of it judging by the way he breezed in the first heat. Rodney got the stallion away in front in the second heat and the mile was easy for him. He had the race well in hand after, although John F. Gibson came from behind at a fast clip and challenged his lead in the fourth heat.

In the second heat of this race Baden finished second, but was placed last by the judges for a foul. Packer from the outside cut in on the entire bunch and took the pole at the first turn.
