

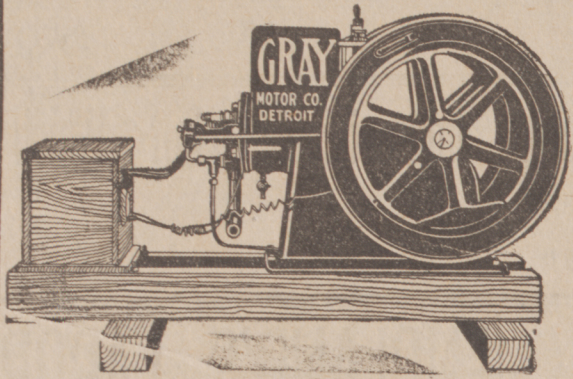

TENDER

TENDERS, addressed to the undersigned, at Ottawa, and marked on the envelope "Tender for Ten Foot Lanterns," will be received up to twelve o'clock noon of the FIFTH DAY OF SEPTEMBER, 1911, for supplying Four Third Order Ten Foot Iron Lanterns for Lighthouses, to be made according to plans and specifications prepared by this Department.

Plans and specifications of the lanterns required can be obtained from the Purchasing Agent, Department of Marine and Fisheries, Ottawa, and from the Agencies at St. John and Halifax.

The tender must be for the lanterns delivered free of all charges on board cars at points of shipment, and must indicate when the tenderers will undertake to complete the work. There are no special tender forms for this work.

Each tender must be accompanied by an accepted cheque on a chartered Canadian Bank for the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) made payable to the Deputy Minister of Marine and Fisheries which will be forfeited if the party whose tender is accepted declines to enter into a contract or fails to deliver the lanterns in accordance with the drawings and specifications. Cheques will be returned to unsuccessful tenderers.

The Department does not bind itself to accept the lowest or any tender.

CRADLE OF METHODISM
IS TO BE RESTORED

Pictou, Ont., Aug. 15.—Yesterday was a memorable day for Methodism in Canada. There was a unique demonstration to mark the taking over for future preservation of the historic chapel, on Hay Bay, the first church built in Upper Canada. It was erected in the summer of 1892 under the direction of Wm. Loose, pioneer Methodist minister in Canada, the first itinerant Methodist preacher. It was enlarged and rebuilt in 1894 and used until 1896, since when it has fallen into disuse. The last general conference however, voted to have this cradle of Methodism brought back and preserved as a relic.

The service was characteristically an "Old time meeting." The walls fair echoed with the old time tunes, all in the old fashioned metres. There were many there whose grand parents were of the original flock.

REVOLVER EXPLODED

KILLING A CHILD

Lowell, Mass., Aug. 15.—Little Anna Quinn, 14 years old, was instantly killed yesterday by the explosion of a revolver in the hands of her playmate, Thelma Berg, 12 years old, after the weapon had failed to discharge when the Quinn girl had placed it at the heart of her chum and fired.

The two children found the revolver in a drawer. The Quinn girl playfully held it against Thelma's heart. The trigger was pulled but the weapon failed to explode. Then Thelma took the revolver and placed it close to the Quinn girl's head and fired. This time the weapon exploded and the Quinn girl dropped dead at the feet of her friend. The Berg child was absolved of all blame by the police.

LAURIER OPENS CAMPAIGN

Ottawa, Ont., Aug. 15.—With confidence that the result will be favorable to the cause for which Liberalism stands in the present contest, Sir Wilfrid Laurier journeyed to Simcoe today to deliver his first platform address in what promises to be the hottest political fight Canada has seen since the days of Sir John Macdonald and the National Policy. From now until the date of the election every politician, from the Prime Minister of the Dominion to the humble canvasser, will continue actively at work. Political conventions and campaign meetings will be held in every part of the country, and reciprocity with the United States will be the staple subject of discussion. Sir Wilfrid Laurier plans to cover the eastern Provinces thoroughly. He will spend the coming week in the Province of Quebec, to which he will devote particular attention in an effort to stem the Nationalist movement, which is regarded as the greatest danger to the Maritime Provinces and will then return for the wind-up of the campaign in Ontario.

TOGO TO VISIT BOSTON

Boston, Mass., Aug. 15.—Boston is in readiness to receive Admiral Togo who reaches the city this evening to begin a visit that will continue until Friday afternoon, when he will depart for Buffalo and Niagara Falls. The city has made no elaborate preparations for the entertainment of the distinguished visitor, for the reason that he comes more or less as the guest of the Government and during his stay will be in the hands of the Navy Yard officers and Rear Admiral Bowles of the Fore River Shipbuilding Company.

DISASTROUS FIRE

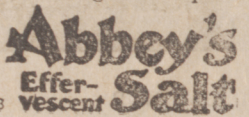
AT CINCINNATI
