LIBERAL CHIEFTAIN OPENS HIS CAMPAIGN

(Continued from page one)
BENEATH CONTEMPT.

"This talk of annexation is beneath contempt and beneath the attention of a thinking people. It is funny to learn that the Conservatives are so zealous for preferential trade with Great Britain, when they opposed every step we took to secure and enlarge preferential trade with England. The Conservative party took the stand that they would not give a preference to Great Britain unless they returned it. We refused, however, to do such bargaining with the motherland. We offered and gave her a preference without a return. There are people who think the British people will give us a preference but at three different elections they have refused to do so.

WILL NOT HURT BRITISH PREFERENCE.

"We have made an agreement with the United States involving a mutual abolition of tariff on natural products. Does this act as an obstacle to a British preference? Surely not. There is nothing in the agreement which is an obstacle to it. We can enter into preferential arrangements in the matter of manufactured articles when and wherever desired.

"I say more, there is still another reason. If the American people did take objection to our giving a preference to Great Britain, we would say, 'Very well, then, take your course.'

"Remember this is not a treaty. It is only an agreement and can be abrogated at any time. There is another consideration. If the Democrats come into power and there is a reduction of tariff, it will be given to all the world. We would meet there the competition of all the world. Under the present agreement the preference is given to Canada alone. Which is the better for Canada?

"You have been told, with wails and lamentations, that in giving this agreement to the States we have opened our doors to the old world. What does such a statement mean? They say it is because of some old treaties entered into by Great Britain in barbarous days of favored-nation privileges there are some countries to which we will be compelled by this agreement to apply the same tariff terms as to the United States.

"There is, first of all, Bolivia. I don't think the name Bolivia will strike terror in your breasts. If there is a man here who knows anything about Bolivia, let him raise his hand. No one knows anything about Bolivia? We have never sold anything to Bolivia and have we

ever bought a thing from Bolivia?

"Then there is Argentina. But what did we buy from Argentina? We bought nothing mentioned in this agreement. Well, you see that the competition we have from these centres is not serious at all. It is ridiculous to say that we need to fear them at all.

"Even that, however, I took into consideration. At the imperial conference I pointed out that these old treaties might some day be an obstacle to future trade for Canada and I moved a resolution which was passed unanimously, and at any time we feel that we are being pressed by any one of these nations, his majesty's government stands ready to enter into negotiations to render us assistance."

Sir Wilfrid read the resolution moved by him, passed unanimously at the last imperial conference and adopted by the British government. "For this action I was criticized by the Tory party and press and called a traitor separatist, one with an ulterior object. I was accused of aiming to remove Canada from her British allegiance.

"We are not traitors. I do not parade my loyalty very often. But I was born under a form of liberty, and it is not on any false appeals to loyalty that I expect my fellow Canadians to be estranged from me and the policies which I advocate.

A BOND OF PEACE.

"This agreement is a bond of peace, harmony and concord between two peoples, between whom there should be a bond of mutual respect and affection. We share with our neighbors the northern hemisphere. We are sprung from the same stock. We have inherited from England practically the same institutions.

"It is not very long ago since there was a feeling of hostility between the States and Great Britain. There was a talk of Yankee treachery on the one hand and British arrogance on the other. But thank heaven such expressions are no longer heard. We have seen the dawn of a new era. Our better angels on both sides of the line have led us into better ways. We have learned in real earnest that blood is thicker than water.

"This agreement I offer you today is an advance towards that higher civilization which at one time was considered impracticable but which we see now is coming closer every day.

"The agreement is before you today and it is in line with the historic traditions of Canada that William Charlton should be chosen as the candidate first to discuss it and that historic Norfolk should be the first riding to carry the banner of victory."

CLERICS TO NOMINATE REYER

City of Mexico, Aug. 16—Another important turn will be given to the Mexican presidential campaign by the convention called to meet today at Monterey, which it is expected will nominate General Bernardo Reyes to succeed Diaz. Gen. Reyes, who is regarded by many persons as the strongest man in Mexico today and the one best fitted to solve the vital problems now facing the republic, has repeatedly stated since his return from his exile in Europe that he would not become a candidate for the presidency if by so doing he would embroil the country in civil discord. Lately, however, he has manifested a disposition to listen to the appeals of his friends and it is generally believed he will accept the nomination and contest for the presidency against Madero and Gomez. General Reyes will have the united support of the Clerical party.

SAM LANGFORD GOT BEST OF JACK O'BRIEN

New York, Aug. 16—Sam Langford, the Nova Scotian negro, with an advantage of about 10 pounds in weight, fought Philadelphia Jack O'Brien to a standstill in four and one half rounds last night, at the Twentieth Century Club. Referee Charlie White prevented a knockout, when he stepped in between the men in the middle of the fifth round and stopped the bout. O'Brien was practically out from the effects of a hard left hook on the jaw and had to be helped to his corner.

It was the old story of a clever game boxer pitted against a hard fighter, and from the start the colored heavyweight had O'Brien's measure taken. Langford's blows were of the sledge hammer order, while none of O'Brien's swings and hooks had sufficient steam behind them to bother the colored man. The pace was fast from the beginning, and O'Brien showed clever foot work, as well as scientific boxing.

The day was given over to the reception of the delegates, who represented twenty-five lodges scattered over the State. The business sessions of the gathering will occupy tomorrow and Thursday.

TO SUPPRESS PLAY PIRACY

New York Aug. 15—An international agreement to prevent play piracy was considered by the National Association of Theatrical Producing Managers at its annual meeting at the Hotel Astor. Plans for the general betterment of theatrical conditions, and particularly for meeting legislative and other opposition to theatrical interests, also were discussed by the managers.

TAFT SPEAKS AT OCEAN GROVE

Ocean Grove, N. J., Aug. 14—Before one of the largest crowds ever assembled at this resort President Taft delivered an address today under the auspices of the Ocean Grove Campmeeting Association. The President was met at the station by a committee of prominent citizens and escorted to the Auditorium where he delivered his address.

ILLINOIS FARMERS IN SESSION

Carmi, Ill., Aug. 15—Four hundred local branches of the Farmers' Educational and Co-operative Union of America were represented by delegates at the opening here today of the annual State convention of the organization. The convention opened with a picnic at the fair grounds. President C. S. Barrett making the opening address.

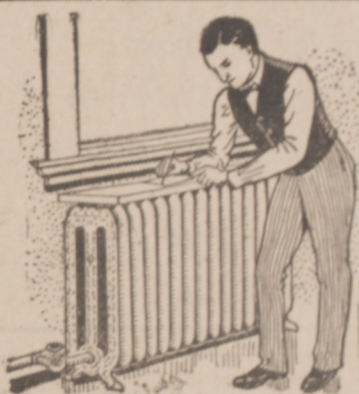
