PLEA FOR SUFFRAGE

Louisville, Ky., Oct. 19—Delegates to the thirty-third annual convention of the National American Woman's Suffrage Association took Louisville by storm today. The women have come from every section of the country, prepared to give "the cause" the most notable impetus since the inception of the equal franchise movement. The hostesses of the city are taxed to provide accommodations for the visitors and many of them are being entertained in private homes.

The programme for the five days' session is pronounced the best ever prepared for a convention of the association. There will be reports from each of the delegations representing their respective States. These reports will embody a narration of the progress made during the past year, the plans of campaign found most effective in the different localities and an exchange of ideas through debate.

It is in the number and prominence of the speakers, however, that the present convention promises to eclipse all of its predecessors. Handing the list is the Rev. Anna Howard Shaw of Philadelphia, the president of the national organization and the most prominent advocate of equal rights since the days of Elizabeth Cady Stanton and Susan B. Anthony. Others who will be heard at the several sessions include Miss Jane Adams of Chicago, Miss Mary Johnson, the Virginia novelist; Mrs. T. P. O'Connor wife of the noted Irish journalist and member of Parliament Mrs. Desha Breckenridge, the Kentucky suffrage leader; Miss M. Carey Thomas, president of Bryn Mawr College; Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, the English suffrage leader, and Mrs. Caroline Bartlett Crane of Michigan. Though a convention of women and in the cause of women, the fair sex do not intend to monopolize the programme. Dr. Harvey M. Wiley, the pure food expert, will be among the speakers, also Mayor Brand Whitlock of Toledo and Omar Garwood of the Colorado Equal Rights Aid Association. Senator La Follette of Wisconsin has advised the association that he will be here to deliver an address if his other engagements permit.

A NEGRO PRISONER EXTRADICTED BY FORCE

Detroit, Mich., Oct. 19.—Extradition laws were set at naught yesterday by the marshal of Algonac Village, on the St. Clair River thirty-five miles from Detroit, when he forced a prisoner captured in Canada into a boat and brought him to American soil.

After shooting and seriously wounding a patrolman in Detroit, on Sunday night, Joseph Moulton, a negro, made his escape and finally reached Port Lambton, Ont. There he was recognized by the authorities, who were reluctant to attempt an arrest because of the reputation of the negro as a gun man. Marshal Grey was hurriedly summoned from Algonac. He located Moulton in a grocery store, where he was eating a lunch.

"We want you," said Grey, striding up to the negro. "All right," replied the fugitive, "but I won't leave Canada." "Oh yes you will," declared the marshal, and he hustled Moulton into a boat and took him to the American side.

WESTERN CITIES ARE DISAPPOINTED

Winnipeg, Man., Oct. 19—A feeling of disappointment is prevalent in the cities and towns of the west, arising from the low rate of population accorded them by the census. Regina alone is throwing bouquets at herself her thirty thousand count boosting her ahead of the provincial rivals. Saskatchewan and Moosejaw feel that they have been hardly fairly dealt with being placed lower on the list than Regina.

Calgary and Edmonton are strong in their reiteration of the accuracy of the figures, while other towns in the west also discredit their respective enumerations. Practically all affirm that the census in their particular district was taken in an inefficient manner.

Vancouver claims 30,000 while the smaller towns Paskatoon claims an increase of 5,000 more, Port Arthur 3,000 and others in like manner affirm that the figures credited to them should be swelled by an addition of 25 per cent.

BLOWING COLD OVER BORDEN'S CABINET

(Montreal Herald)
 The Toronto Telegram has declared war on the Borden Cabinet. It calls for the defeat of Mr. White and Mr. Cochrane, wherever they may be candidates, as a protest against what is politely called Mr. Borden's surrender to clericalism and corporatism "on the occasion of the first betrayal of the people." The Telegram is afraid that if there is any delay about "strangling the worst enemies of the Premiership" the result will be to "give these enemies time to strangle the whole Conservative party."

Of course the victory of Mr. Bourassa over the Ghosts in the choice of the Quebec ministers does not fill the Telegram with joy overflowing. The presence of Mr. Monk, Mr. Pelletier and Mr. Nantel in the Cabinet means for it the triumph of clericalism, that is to say of what has recently come to be called "Papal Quebec." The Telegram figures that Mr. Borden need not have assented to this invasion except that it fitted a better with his decision that the voice of Ontario was speaking "in the accents of Sir William Mackenzie, J.W. Flavelle & Co."

It is going to be very interesting to see whether the threat to oppose, and if possible defeat Mr. White and Mr. Cochrane is going to be carried into effect. Possibly they will be candidates where the Telegram's circulation is not very large, for it is essentially a Toronto newspaper. But there are other agencies closely enough associated with the promotion of some of its favorite views to make trouble if they want to. One is entitled to doubt whether there is very much steam behind the protest. If there were the call ought to be for the defeat of the whole Ontario contingent, including Mr. Foster whose election will be right at home in Toronto. Take the case of Hon. Sam Hughes. There is hardly a room for doubt that "Mackenzie, Flavelle & Co." were as friendly to him as to any of the others and what gave him his chance was the decision to take in the three Nationalists. As counterweight against that the Hon. Sam found his opportunity if he did wrong to commit the Orange Order to a partnership with Mr. Bourassa, as by accepting office he did as far as he could, why not take a shy at him as well as at Mr. White and Mr. Cochrane?

WELLESLEY'S NEW PRESIDENT

Wellesley, Mass., Oct. 19—In the presence of a great assembly of educators and scholars, Miss Ellen Fitz Pendleton today received the keys and charter of Wellesley College, and by her acceptance of those symbols became the president of that well known institution for the higher education of women. The exercises of Miss Pendleton's induction into the presidency were held in Houghton Memorial Chapel this morning and were of a very impressive character. Following a prayer by Bishop Lawrence there were addresses by Miss A. Katherine Bingham of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, who spoke in behalf of the students; Miss Frances Scudder Williams of Connecticut, representing the alumnae and Miss A. C. Chapon, representing the faculty. Following Luncheon in College Hall the students and invited guests again repaired to the chapel to listen to congratulatory addresses from President Lowell of Harvard University, President Faunce of Brown University and several other noted educators.

Miss Pendleton, who succeeds Miss Caroline Hazard as president of Wellesley, is forty-seven years old and a native of Rhode Island. She graduated from Wellesley with a bachelor of arts degree in 1886 and two years later she was appointed an instructor in the department of mathematics. In 1889 and 1890 she had leave of absence [to devote to special study abroad. Upon her return she continued as an instructor until 1897, when she was chosen secretary of the college. Since 1901 she has been dean of the college and during a part of the time has served as acting president of the institution.
