IS NE TEMERE DECREE BE- YOND RIGHTS OF CHURCH?

Toronto, Oct. 20.—"Is Rome prepared by setting the hierarchy against the people of Canada, to introduce all the revolutionary woes and disturbances which she has from time to time brought into France, Spain, Italy, Portugal and South America, by her unsuccessful efforts to maintain her inquisitorial domination in such matters against the sovereign will of the people?"

This is one of the questions which the Evangelical Alliance addresses to the Roman Catholic Church in their pamphlet of fourteen pages, ten thousand of which have been run off the press for circulation throughout Canada.

It sets forth the Ne Temere decree and the objections thereto, a vast amount of research having been made in the older Roman countries.

The Alliance says: "In no wise do we wish to arouse religious animosities or create discord, unless these are the outcome of an honest purpose in attaining what is right and true."

Petitions to the parliament of Canada for a uniform marriage law are enclosed for signature, with the statement that all men and women over sixteen years may be invited to sign.

"To some it appears," says the pamphlet, "that the introduction of the Ne Temere decree raises a matter of far greater importance to the people of Canada and the United States, than reciprocity. Our people need a large, enlightened and accurate vision so that correct proportion may be observed in respect to the important matters now arising which must effect lastingly the welfare of our land."

OBJECTIONS TO DECREE.

The principal clauses of the Ne Temere decree, called by the Pope the "New Marriage Law," are regarded by those Protestants who oppose it as, first, unwarrantably destroying the civil religious liberty, enacted by law, as the unalienable right of every citizen of the Dominion of Canada, and as, secondly, liable to prevent the Dominion citizens from becoming organized into an harmonious social whole. The Alliance seeks to have it declared that when "marriage status exists it can only be impeached under any statute that may be enacted by the Dominion of Canada, and that no communion, community or individual can otherwise question the legality of such marriage, discredit the parties to it, the legitimacy of the offspring, or the civil rights flowing from it," and that "any attempt to interfere with or discredit such status, or the parties who are enjoying the same, by any communion, community or individual, except in the manner prescribed by statute, should be declared illegal."

CHURCH HAS NO RIGHT.

The Alliance asks: "Can Canada be compelled to submit to the dictation of Rome in a matter of such vital importance to it as the validity of marriages? Such a charge as is now sought to be introduced is indeed an arrogant attempt to subvert the authority of our Sovereign Lord the King. It was never pretended, either in England or Canada, that the right to interfere with the marriage laws was given to any religious body. The claims of

Rome on this head are without foundation and cannot be supported. It has no more power than has any Protestant Church to interfere with the rights of the citizens of the Dominion given equally to all by the Dominion and Provincial statutes governing the laws of marriage.

CIVIL CODE MISCONSTRUED.

"But it is said," says the pamphlet, "that the civil code gives peculiar rights to the Roman Church. Its language is simple and distinct. No difficulty arises until it is sought to import into some of the words of this act, applicable to all citizens, a peculiar meaning in order to sustain the position of the Church of Rome, which is repudiated by those not members of that Church."

The appeal concludes as follows: "Let us unite in this Holy War, and as one man rise against any power that seeks to invade our wholesome marriage laws, to interfere with the sacred status obtained thereunder, and to breed strife and misery where holiness and happiness should reign. May God defend our rights."

VERDICT OF MANSLAUGHTER WAS RETURNED

Something has been said as to the conflicting evidence in this case. The evidence seemed to me all right. When you see witness after witness swearing to the exact details of the case, there is more apt to be perjury than if they disagree on details. No body of men describe even a fight and use the same details. A man looks at his own standpoint.

If a man learns that his wife has been debauched by another, he is aroused to a pitch of anger that sweeps him beyond his control and he kills the other, that is manslaughter and manslaughter that the court deals leniently with. If his passion cools and he deliberately seeks out and shoots the offender, that is murder.

In the present case the prisoner had marvelous control, for he seems to have made no effort to kill McCluskey as the latter came from the house.

The fact that the evidence of Mrs. Bragdon and McIntyre is fuller than at the preliminary examination should not count against these witnesses, for as a general thing a witness will but answer the question asked him by the lawyers.

The judge asked for a verdict in conformity with the evidence and the ends of justice would be satisfied.

THE AXE FALLS

St. John Globe—Hon. Mr. Monk was not long in learning of the conditions under which dredging operations are being carried in Carleton, for the dredges that were laid off a few days ago were put back to work again this morning. The lay off of three or four days was, however, long enough to enable the patronage committee of the Conservative party to set to work an entirely new crew of inspectors. The men who were engaged at this work under Liberal rule were all paid off.

LAYMEN'S MISSIONARY CONVENTION AT ST. JOHN

On November 20th, 21st and 22nd, a great Laymen's Missionary Convention is to be held in St. John at which delegates from all over the Province of New Brunswick will attend.

Some of the greatest missionary workers and speakers in the world will be at this convention including Sir Andrew Fraser of which the following is a sketch:

"Sir Andrew's father, Rev. A. G. Fraser, D. D. was an eminent minister of the Scottish Presbyterian Church, while his mother was the daughter of another clergyman of the same denomination, Rev. J. Shaw. Such being his parentage it is easy enough to understand his taking an active and intelligent interest in church work. He was educated at the Edinburgh Academy and Edinburgh University, obtaining at the latter the degree of M. A. in course, and that of L. L. D. honorarily. In his 23rd year, he in 1871, entered the Indian Civil Service, and remained actively engaged therein until 1908, when he returned to Scotland, taking up his residence at Auchinleish, in Perthshire.

His activities in the Indian Service covered a wide sphere. He was a member of the historical Hemp Drugs Commission, which investigated the grave evils resulting from the general use of numerous vile drugs and whose report resulted in the enactment of drastic remedial laws of the greatest importance. For two years he was Land Revenue officer, an appointment which brought him directly into touch with all the local governing bodies in the country and also with those holding Government concessions. The Government revenues increased materially during his administration, and incidentally many injustices and petty hardships imposed upon the poorer classes of natives disappeared. In recognition of these services he was created C. S. I. For sometime he held the important office of President of the Police Commission, using his influence to keep down the illicit sale and use of opium and other harmful drugs, and making a determined effort to put a stop to child murder and kindred heathenish practices, which in a few remote places had contrived to survive in spite of the law. From 1903 till 1908, he had the honor of holding one of the most dignified and influential appointments under the Government of India, that of Lieutenant-Governor of Bengal, and the year he received his commission to this office he was created K. C. S. I.

TURN OF THE TIDE IN WALL STREET

From the low price in Wall Street at the end of September the recovery was sheer and sudden, as might have been expected after an uninterrupted decline of such violence. The recovery amounted to as much as eight or ten points in the few active stocks favored by the bear element, and a large short interest was, so to speak, locked in. It was then a question of how the short interest would be utilized. The banking interests, who had bought a great many stocks to arrest the decline, and who were in control of the market again, might utilize the short interest to bring about a further recovery in prices, or they might be content on the level of the first recovery to resell their stocks. In that case, they would simply merchandise stocks to the short interest. That was the course evidently followed, so that in the time that has intervened the short interest existing at the end of September must have been greatly diminished. Last week the professional leading trading element swung over to the bull side of the stock market, which in itself would suggest the gradual disappearance of a large bear account among professional speculators.—New York Post.

CORNERSTONE LAID FOR HERALD BUILDING

Montreal, Oct. 19.—The corner stone of the new building of the Montreal Herald on Craig Street was laid this morning, by His Worship Mayor Guerin, in the presence of a large gathering of prominent citizens. The occasion being the inauguration of a new era in the life of this newspaper was also of somewhat unique historical interest for it commemorated the precise completion of the first one hundred years of the Herald's existence, a record attained by only one other newspaper in Canada.

The proceedings were opened by Mr. James S. Brierly, president of the Company, speeches were delivered by his worship, the mayor, Principal Patterson of McGill University, Senator Dandurand and other prominent representatives of different portions of the community.

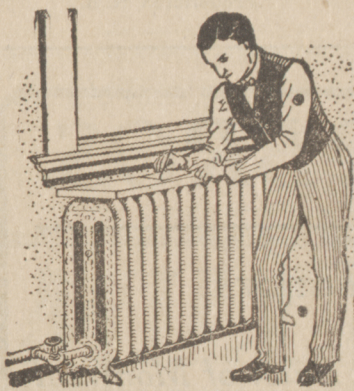
