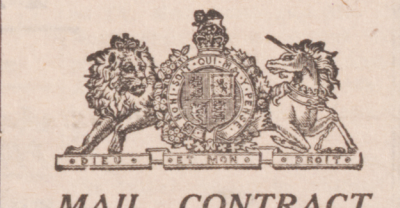

Ottawa, Sept. 17—Sir Wilfrid Laurier arrived in the city this morning from Montreal and spent the day resting quietly at his home. He looks and feels fully as well as he did before he began his strenuous platform campaign of five weeks ago. He is even more confident of a sweeping Liberal victory at the polls next Thursday than he was when he began the campaign.

Sir Wilfrid will speak at Rockland

Hon. Charles Murphy tomorrow afternoon and at night will address a meeting in Montreal. On Wednesday evening will be Sir Allan Aylesworth and Hon. Charles Murphy.

The Minister of Justice at Sir Wilfrid's request will retain his portfolio for some weeks yet, and his successor will not be named until shortly before the opening of the new parliament late in October.

Sir Wilfrid will speak in St. Clet in Soulanges county, on Tuesday afternoon, and at night will address three meetings in Montreal. On Wednesday he will speak at Chateau Richer, in Montmorency county. That will be his last meeting of the campaign. On polling day he will be in his own constituency, Quebec east, where he will vote and receive the returns at night.

What did Mr. Bourassa say about Sir Wilfrid Laurier's imperialism? Here it is in a signed letter to Le Devoir, the paper the Conservatives are freely circulating in Quebec province. Mr. Bourassa wrote it in July last:

"Mr. Laurier did not stop at the violation of the Canadian Constitution, from his own admission, by taking, without authorization, the money of the Canadian people to arm the Canadian troops and to have Canada participate in this infamous war (South African war); his cynicism carried him to the point of proclaiming—in the full light of parliament—that this war was the most just that England had ever carried on. No responsible statesmen, not even Mr. Chamberlain, had ever dared to go so far.

"Yes, the Nestor of the Imperial Conference, the Canadian Washington, found it right and good that 50,000 men should be massacred, millions of farms to be burnt and ravaged, peaceful homes to be pillaged, women to be outraged and little children to be shut up in pestilential camps, where they died like flies.

"English and Afrikaner soldiers who fell on the field for the glory of Chamberlain, women who died from shame or misery for the glorification of Laurier, children whose entrails have dried up in the concentration camps for the honor of the Empire! What do you think of the man?" (Signed)

SIR ALLAN AYLESWORTH ON BOURASSA ALLIANCE

Minister of Justice Arraigns the Nationalist Movement--The Road that will Lead to Civil War

Newmarket, Sept. 14—Sir Allan Aylesworth electrified the politicians today by calling a spade a spade! The Minister of Justice engaged in no verbal gymnastics; he employed no drapery of language. He told simply a story of national significance.

Sir Allan has just returned from Quebec, where he has been meeting the French-Canadian electors, talking with them in their own language, and studying the situation there at closer range. His arraignment of the Conservative-Nationalist alliance, as he found it to exist, and the propaganda it is disseminating, was telling. "It is the road that leads to civil war," was his serious, quietly-spoken summing up.

The great joint meeting of electors that thronged the Arena at the close of the North York nominations was profoundly impressed. The big audience was apparently very evenly divided politically, both candidates being accorded a moiety of acclaim, but the words of the Minister of Justice turned the gathering into a national demonstration. Mr. T. Herbert Lennox, M. P., who followed, could get no hearing until he emphatically declared his personal repudiation of Bourassa and his propaganda. Even with that the Conservative legislator could not escape. "Who's bringing Bourassa into Ontario to help the Conservative candidate at Sudbury?" persisted an auditor, who proclaimed himself one of the local British-born.

"What has this got to do with the issue?" pleaded Mr. Lennox. "We're here to discuss reciprocity. The Nationalist question has nothing to do with the election."

But the audience would not be satisfied. "Where do you stand regarding the Nationalists?" was the next question immediately hurled at him. "I am absolutely opposed to them and their policy," Mr. Lennox declared, securing a round of applause.

"Then why are you working with them?" shouted another voice. "I'm not," persisted Mr. Lennox. "I'm just as much opposed to them as you are. And so is the whole Conservative party," he added, amid mingled cheers and laughter.

"Then why are they working together?" another farmer put at him.

WHO IS IN CONTROL?
"What control have the Conservatives over Bourassa?" retorted Mr. Lennox warmly. "You've got no brains to talk that way. Give me a chance," he pleaded. "We are here to discuss reciprocity."

The Chairman Mr. H. S. Cane, appealed to the gathering to allow Mr. Lennox to proceed. If it was desired to ask questions they should be put in writing and handed to the speaker.

A moment later a farmer walked to the front of the hall and handed up a slip of paper. "Do you," it read, "approve of the silence of your leader, Borden, in relation to Bourassa and his proclaimed policy?"

"You better ask Laurier—" began Mr. Lennox, but he was interrupted with cries of "Answer the question."

"I'm going to answer it if you give me a chance," persisted Mr. Lennox pluckily holding his ground. He did not think it was fair for Sir Allan Aylesworth to have brought up this matter and devoted half of his address to it.

Renewed cries of "Answer the question."

"Does it make any difference whether Mr. Borden is silent or shouting?" retorted Mr. Lennox. "The men at the head of the Nationalist movement are Liberal supporters. Cries of "No."
