nected with or dependent upon the lumber industry in this province can  
oppose the taking off of the duty on rough lumber."

## QUESTIONS NEEDING ANSWERS

If reciprocity in farm products is going to lead to our Canadian mar-  
kets being flooded with farm products from the United States, how is it  
that every farmers' organization and agricultural paper in Canada is in  
favor of reciprocity?

If United States farmers have such a large surplus of farm products  
that they could drive us out of our home markets under free trade, how is  
it that they are not clamoring for free trade with Canada?

If free trade with Canada be such benefit to the farmers of the United  
States, how is it that every farmers' organization in the United States  
and every leading agricultural paper across the border is opposing reci-  
procity?

If Great Britain is the best market for all our products how is it that  
while we have free trade with Great Britain our trade with that country  
amounted to \$1,092,000,000 during the past five years, while we did \$1,-  
570,000,000 business with the United States over a high tariff wall?

We must do our own thinking in this fight, trust our farmers' organi-  
zations and stand by the Canadian Council of Agriculture.

### TORY BIG GUNS

AT HAYESVILLE

To the Editor of The Mail:

Dear Sir:—A political meeting bill-  
ed for Hayesville on the fifteenth  
inst., in the interests of O. S. Croc-  
ket, proved to be almost a failure.  
as Dr. Morehouse and Mr. Pinder of  
Nackawick, failed to put in an ap-  
pearance and for substitutes sent J.  
A. Young from Taymouth, and a  
boy student named Jewett, from  
Fredericton.

They must have forgotten to post  
the latter before he started, as the  
principal part of his speech was in  
favor of the Liberal party. He told  
how the country had prospered under  
Liberal rule, what a great thing the  
building of the Transcontinental was  
for the country and how this would  
prove to be the greatest road in the  
world. His remarks caused some of  
the strongest Conservatives in the  
audience to drop their heads, espe-  
cially the chairman.

The next speaker, John A. Young,  
ex-farmer and ex-lumberman, went  
on to tell how much higher the prices  
were here than in the United States.  
Mr. Young might have been a little  
more careful in his statements had  
he known there were persons in the  
audience just returned from there and  
they knew his statements were ab-  
solutely incorrect. He tried to make  
the farmers believe they did not  
raise any hay fit for the Boston mar-  
ket, but that the Cuban market  
would accept almost any kind of pro-  
duce.

Mr. Young was a little more rea-  
sonable in his remarks concerning  
beef than was Mr. McLeod in his  
speech at Parkers Ridge on the  
eighth inst. Mr. McLeod went so far  
as to say that it would be worth  
five times as much to the farmer to  
keep his hay and raise his beef. Then  
inside of five minutes he said we  
couldn't compete with the west for  
beef, for they could ship it here and  
sell it much cheaper than farmers  
could raise it here. So Mr. McLeod's  
argument was rather thin.

Mr. Young's speech did not have  
much effect on the intelligent electors  
of Hayesville, as they are used by  
now to his little stories. And any-  
way they do not put much faith in  
Mr. Young since he drafted the plan  
for the infamous Bush Wharf.

The meeting broke up amid cheers  
for the King and Dr. Atherton and  
altogether it must have had a very  
depressing effect on the spirits of  
John A. and the boy student.

SCORED BY GLEANER

On Feb. 21st the Fredericton Glean-  
er in discussing Mr. Scott's interview  
took a fall out of him in the fol-  
lowing fashion.

"Mr. Wm. J. Scott, of the Scott  
Lumber Co., has given out an inter-  
view in which he proclaims himself  
strongly in favor of Reciprocity with  
the United States. He furthermore  
says he has been a Conservative all  
of his life, and that if Reciprocity is  
the issue in the next election the  
Conservatives need not count on his  
support. Mr. Scott has a perfect  
right to hold and express any opin-  
ion he pleases on the subject of Rec-  
iprocity, or any other subject; but  
those of the public who may be in-  
terested in his view are also free to  
look a little further than the surface.  
Mr. Scott has been endeavoring for  
some months past to dispose of his  
interest in a milling property to some  
Americans; and if he can assist these  
prospective buyers to the belief that  
Reciprocity, which he thinks will  
pass, must increase the value of mill-  
ing properties and timber limits com-  
paratively near the United States  
boundary, so much the better for the  
personal ends of Mr. Scott."

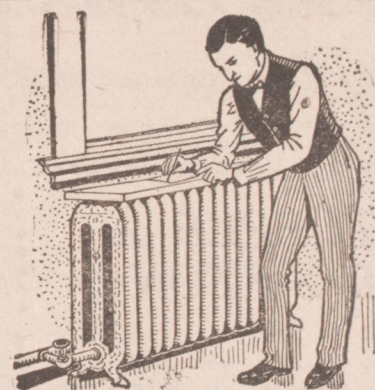
