He . would seek from the Pacific to the Atlantic for a constituency that would disgrace itself by return'n; him. Who was he? He • came here with a brand of bankruptcy on him, and yet he lived in a style that no Prime Minister could afford.

His object in visiting the otherside of the water was to avoid an investigation before the Public Accounts Committee, the results of his mal-administration.
