Sir CHARLES TUPPER on Mr. CLIFFORD SIFTON

The Montreal Star of Friday, May 18, 1900, contained in its report of the debate in the House of Commons on the day previous, a speech by Sir Charles Tupper, in the course of which he delivered what The Star described as "a scathing denunciation of Hon. Mr. Sifton."

We quote here from The Montreal Star's report on that occasion:

"Sir Charles referred to how the House was startled by the gigantic scheme of giving a kingdom for a tramway to the Yukon. Most of the machines in wheels were mustered into line to vote for the deal. Where was the minister of the interior now? He would seek from the Pacific to the Atlantic for a constituency that would disgrace itself by returning him. Who was he? He came here with a brand of bankruptcy on him, and yet he lived in a style that no Prime Minister could afford."

"Cries of 'shame.'"
"Sir Charles believed that he was a fugitive from the justice of this parliament. His object in visiting the outside of the water was to avoid an investigation before the Public Accounts Committee, the results of his mal-administration. In conclusion he begged the premier, amid frequent interruptions, for his promise to refer the question to a judicial tribunal."

REV. H. E. DIBBLEE IS NEEDLESSLY ALARMED

To the Editor of The Mail,

Sir,—My attention has been drawn to the report of a speech delivered in the Court House here by Mr. Lewis H. Bliss, in course of which Mr. Bliss read extracts from a letter written by his brother-in-law the Rev. H. E. Dibblee, M.A., formerly rector of this parish (Burton) and now of Fowler, California. As it bears internal evidence of having been written for use in this campaign and is still, I believe being read at meetings held in the Conservative interests throughout the country, it is a fair subject for criticism.

The Rev gentleman starts in by saying "I hope you are going to keep Canada for the Canadians; those who know the pulse of the Americans are quite sure what they expect you to do with Canada—hand it over to them with all its resources and unexplored wealth." Mr. Dibblee fails to explain by what process Canadians are to be induced to meet these expectations of unparallelled generosity. Again he says "Look out for American gold and a special telegram from Wm. H. Taft on nomination day, perfectly absurd. The United States went annex Canada." The only American gold Canadians are likely to see they will give good value for as no doubt Mr. Dibblee does. If it be conceivable that President Taft could so far forget the dignity of his high office as to send such a telegram as Mr. Dibblee affects to believe he would be attempting to do no more in a large scale than Mr. Dibblee is trying to do in a small way and with equally bad taste.

He goes on "If the Americans who are so inordinately determined to get the country under bonds to the United States do not give any other assistance beyond their prayers, then there may be enough of National sentiment still remaining to save Canada from this peril etc." Our former rector can hardly have his one time strong faith in the efficacy of prayer, or he would scarcely tell us by inference that other influences which he mentioned are much more powerful. But perhaps he only means that American prayers are not of much account. Further he says "I am not naturally pessimistic but I shiver for the result of poor old Canada and for the continued triumph of British institutions on the northern half of this continent."

I can hardly believe that Mr. Dibblee ever wrote such an involved sentiment. The idea of an involved sentiment shivering for the triumph of British institutions etc.

The last paragraph in this letter I will quote in full as a fine example of the sound logic and brilliant rhetoric employed by many who are speaking and writing against the proposed reciprocity agreement.

"If on the other hand it is made clear to the people that they are to be put in the position of Texas and Cuba and every other country that has come under the benign (?) protection of the eagle's outstretched wings, why I believe that the spirit of our grandfathers would be aroused and Canada will continue to do business at the old stand and under the British sign-board." Comment upon this would seem superfluous, other than that the coupling of Texas and Cuba in this way would to those who are at all familiar with the status of history of each, seem most absurd.

If the Americans believe as Mr. Dibblee seems to that the mere lowering or abolition of their tariff on natural products and some few other articles would bring about annexation and if they are as anxious for it as he thinks why are they not astute enough to do it, without exclaiming a

VERVILLE AND RECIPROCITY

Alphonse Verville, labor candidate left no room for doubt in the minds of Maisonneuve as to his stand on the question of reciprocity. He came out strongly for the pact, as a measure that would mean much to the workman and to the farmer.

He stated that reciprocity would help the working man, because lower prices must come. The middlemen of the United States and Canada, the men who buy from the farmer and sell to the consumer, would be compelled by competition to pay more for their goods and sell less.

Thus the farmer and the workman would both gain as a result of the pact.

The speaker stated most emphatically that if he did not sincerely believe that reciprocity would benefit the farmers, he would not be in favor of it.

At a political meeting in Russell County, Ont., yesterday, Senator Edwards, one of the biggest lumbermen on the Ottawa River, spoke in favor of reciprocity.

Can Mr. Dibblee point to an instance in the history of the world where a change in tariffs or trade relations between two nations has caused or led up to the annexation or absorption of one by the other? He can not do it and does not he think that Canada peopled mainly by men of British breed will be the first to create a precedent?

Prof. Andrew MacPhail of McGill in ending a strong letter published in the London Spectator under date of Feb. 18th inst, says relative to this disloyalty and annexation nonsense "If disaster comes, the infamy will be to those who have been so sedulously propagating the doctrine that the seat of loyalty is not in the heart but in the pocket."

If the electors in this constituency are worthy of the tribute to their intelligence which Mr. Bliss paid them, they will best show it by treating all such hysterical absurdities as Mr. Dibblee's letter as but "food for laughter" and voting in their own and their country's interest for Col. McLean and Reciprocity on the 21st inst. I remain

TENDERS FOR DREDGING

SEALED TENDERS addressed to the undersigned and endorsed "Tenders for Dredging, Buctouche Harbor, N.B.," will be received until 4.00 p.m. on Tuesday, October 3, 1911, for dredging required at Buctouche Harbor N.B.

Tenders will not be considered unless made on the forms supplied, and signed with the actual signatures of the tenderers.

Combined specifications and form of tender can be obtained on application to the Secretary of the Department of Public Works, Ottawa. Tenders must include the towing of the plant to and from the work. Only dredges can be employed which are registered in Canada at the time of the filing of tenders. Contractors must be ready to begin work within thirty days after the date they have been notified of the acceptance of their tender.

Each tender must be accompanied by an accepted cheque on a chartered bank, made payable to the order of the Honorable the Minister of Public Works, for five per cent of the contract price which will be forfeited if the person tendering decline to enter into contract when called upon to do so or fail to complete work contracted for. If this tender be not accepted the cheque will be returned.

The Department does not bind itself to accept the lowest or any tender.
