FIRST DAY AT EXHIBITION
SHOWED LARGE ATTENDANCE

Turnstiles Registered 2,349 Persons---Wet Weather Interferes with Attendance Today---Today's Racing Postponed---Judging in Cattle, Dairy Products and Agricultural Products---Fair now in full Swing

With disagreeable weather not favoring a large attendance, the turnstiles at the Exhibition Grounds yesterday registered 2,349 admissions, which is an exceedingly good figure. All day the buildings and grounds were crowded with pleasure seekers, particularly in the evening. The outside attractions were well patronized but they and other parts of the Exhibition were seriously handicapped early in the evening by the failure of the city lighting service on the circuit which supplies the Exhibition Grounds and adjacent streets. A short circuit at Victoria Hospital is supposed to be the cause of the trouble which later in the evening was remedied.

The judging of Dairy Products was completed this morning and the judging of Cattle and Agricultural Products was begun. In the latter division Mr. D. Innes of Tobique, won the sweepstakes with an exhibition of selected grain of all kinds and took the majority of prizes offered in the various classes. Mr. Wm. Palmer of Scotch Lake, and Mr. G. E. Fisher of Chatham, also had good exhibits. Mr. S. J. Moore of Truro, who, with Mr. Fuller, was one of the judges, stated this morning that he had never seen a better grain exhibit.

RACES POSTPONED.

The first day's racing of the Exhibition Meet was to be this afternoon but on account of the rain was postponed until tomorrow. The unfavorable weather will probably have the effect of cutting down today's attendance at the exhibition. The pupils of the public schools of the city were given one session today in order to have the afternoon free to attend the Exhibition. It is probable that they will also be given a half session on Thursday.

AMUSEMENT HALL.

Yesterday it was found impossible to put on the outdoor attractions, but today it is intended to have performances by both the Flying Dordens and the Aeroplanes Ladies. The Diving Girls, an outside attraction under the direct management of the Exhibition, gave performances yesterday. In the Amusement Hall

the vaudeville artists secured through the Park Booking Circuit, performed before a crowded house last night. The performers sent to the Fredericton Exhibition by the Park Booking Circuit, including the six Flying Dordens and the three Aeroplanes Ladies, number thirty-nine and are under the direction of Mr. Myerhoff of New York. The company performing in the Amusement Hall is one of the strongest of its kind that has ever visited this section. It includes the Columbia Sextette of women musicians, Edmund Martin's Dog Bandits, an animal act that has never been equalled in Fredericton; Mr. and Mrs. Harry Thorne and Company in a sketch and four other acts. The Train Robbery by the Dog Bandits is an especially good feature.

On Wednesday there will be an entire change of program in the Amusement Hall, the company putting on a first-class minstrel show.

TODAY AT THE FAIR

The judging of the dairy products was completed yesterday by Mr. Harvey Mitchell of Keswick and Mr. L. C. Daigle of Moncton. At nine o'clock this morning the cattle judging began the Holsteins being the first class judged. The judges are, Beef-cattle and Sheep, J. D. Gibson, Deafeld, Ont.; Dairy-cattle and Swine, H. Glendening, Orillia, Ont. At one o'clock the Houlton Band paraded to the grounds. This afternoon the open air performances were given by the flying Dordens and the Aeroplanes Ladies. At 3.00 p. m. the Amusement Hall performance began and at 3.30 p. m. the Houlton Band gave a concert. A parade of horses is to take place in the Show-ring at 4.30.

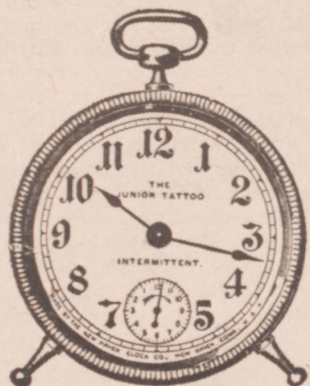
EVENING PROGRAM

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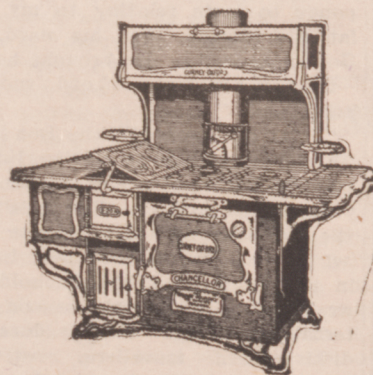
