### POPE THOUGHT TO HAVE FLED THE COUNTRY

Montreal, Que., Jan. 20.—There now seems but little doubt that W. F. Pope, the missing Bromptonville merchant, was not foully murdered on the lonely road near Sherbrooke, but left only a carefully planned stage setting behind to indicate he had been done to death, in order to cover his escape from the country. The real mystery in the case now centres not in the finding of the mangled body at first looked for, but as to whether Pope had for so mysteriously leaving the country. There has been no solution of this yet advanced.

### FOUR HUNDRED MINERS WERE ENTOMBED

Warsaw, Jan. 20.—Four hundred miners were entombed and forty killed by an explosion in the Casimir Coal Mine at Sosnowice on the Russo-Prussian frontier. Fire broke out following the explosion, but 360 men cut their way through and came out alive. Negligence in providing proper safety facilities is believed to be responsible for the disaster.

### W. C. T. U.

In an article lately published in a well known weekly journal Sir Vezey Strong, the new Lord Mayor of London, writes:

"It is not quite correct to say, as has been said recently, that I have been a total abstainer all my life, but as I became officially connected with the temperance movement at the age of fourteen, I suppose I may, for all practical purposes, be counted as a life long abstainer; certainly I do not think it will be charged against me that I could have been very seriously addicted to intoxicants at that early age."

"I have been asked why I became a total abstainer. Well a boy's reasoning faculties are not very well developed at the age of fourteen, so it would be better to ask why I have remained an abstainer for so many years since that time."

"The reason is simply that I have become convinced that wine or beer or spirits of any other form of alcohol in common use is unnecessary, useless and in many cases actually harmful."

"I do not think that I need emphasize its harmfulness; that is only too pitifully well known in every corner of the earth."

"One has often heard it said that alcohol is of great benefit as a stimulant; it is certainly a stimulation, but its lack of benefit is now, I think, beyond doubt. For many years this was the last stronghold of the defenders of alcoholic treatment; that stimulants were necessary to those in ill-health, and that alcohol was, therefore, of great medicinal value."

"This view was so widely accepted that I can remember the time when, in the other hospitals—St. Bartholomew's for example an incoming patient was asked whether he took stout or ale. Alcoholic stimulant was, in fact, regarded as part of the patient's diet."

"Now it seemed to one or two audacious laymen, myself included, that this theory of the curative value of alcohol was open to grave doubt, and it was decided to institute a careful and strictly scientific test as to the possibilities of a general hospital, where all sorts of diseases might be treated, being run on temperance lines."

"With this object in view, a hospital was started in quite a small way. That was nearly forty years ago and today the London Temperance Hospital is a well known and recognized institution."

"In all those years, so far as my knowledge goes, not one ounce of brandy or beer or wine of any description has entered the hospital, either for the use of the patients or of the staff."

"In some emergency the doctor might say: Well, this man has no chance of living as things are; if we administer a little alcohol he may pull through. Alcohol would then be given, and even then it would be administered in the form of rectified spirits of wine, a form not known to or easily recognized by the patient."

"This precaution was taken because of the curious determination of people who have been given alcohol in a recognizable form during illness to continue taking it after they have recovered. This, in fact, is a very grave reason why doctors should not recommend patients to take alcoholic stimulants."

"Whisky saved my life," they will say. Or "Brandy saved my life." And when they have quite recovered they will continue to save their lives day after day, when their lives are not in the slightest danger."

### MADE MILLIONS IN WESTERN LANDS

Montreal, Jan. 18.—B. Hall Brown, manager of the Prudential Trust Co., who has just returned from Winnipeg, says the Western city is talking of a large pile of money made by a daring operator who purchased a few years since, one million acres of what was called the land to the north of the capital. He paid a dollar and a quarter per acre, and sold out with a profit of over two millions, and so great has the development been ever that the loan companies are now loaning twelve dollars an acre upon a tract of country which was considered even by the clever men of the C. P. R. as being almost worthless a few years since.

Major John L. Bittenger, ex-Counsel General of the United States, at Montreal, who has just passed away in St. Joseph, Mo., stated the last time he was here that he was the last man who had conversed at any great length with J. W. Booth, before he killed President Lincoln, at Ford's Theatre.

Major Bittenger had some time before befriended Booth, who was stranded in St. Joseph, Mo., and two days before the assassination, the Major, who had gone to Washington, was surprised to see the actor coming in to a bar-room where the Western newspaper man was waiting for a friend. Booth recognized the Westerner and invited him to have a drink which was accepted. They talked together some minutes and, shaking hands, separated. Booth was booted and wore spurs, appearing as if he had just ridden into the city from the country. The next day Major Bittenger left for the West, and while en route, he learned of the dreadful tragedy at Ford's Theatre.

### COTTON SITUATION LOOKING SERIOUS

Boston, Jan. 19.—Millions of spindles in the cotton mills of the United States will be idle one quarter of the time from today until the market conditions improve, if a recommendation made this afternoon by the Arkwright Club, at a meeting in this city, is accepted generally. The Arkwright Club is an organization of the treasurers of mills in Massachusetts, New Hampshire and Maine, many of which have their head offices in Boston and represents more than 10,000,000 spindles.

Of the 28,000,000 spindles in the United States, 15,000,000 are in New England. The attendance at the meeting was the largest in ten years. Several telegrams from mill owners in Georgia, North Carolina and South Carolina were read, telling of the arrangements being made to curtail the output. In South Carolina it was stated, the mills will reduce the running time by five weeks.

The cotton mills of the country curtailed extensively last year because of the high cost of cotton, and an indifferent demand for goods. The same reasons are given by the Boston treasurers for their vote today.

The cotton mills of New England employ nearly 200,000 operatives, many of them French-Canadians.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head

of a family, or any male over 18

years old, may homestead a quarter

section of available Dominion land in

Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta.

The applicant must appear in person

at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-

Agency for the district. Entry by

proxy may be made at any agency, on

certain conditions, by father, mother,

son, daughter, brother or sister of

intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon

and cultivation of the land in each of

three years. A homesteader may live

within nine miles of his homestead

on a farm of at least 80 acres solely

owned and occupied by him or by his

father, mother, son, daughter, brother

or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader

in good standing may pre-empt a

quarter-section alongside his home-

stead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—

Must reside upon the homestead

pre-emption six months in each of six

years from date of homestead entry

(including the time required to earn

homestead patent) and cultivate fifty

acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted

his homestead right and cannot obtain

a pre-emption, may enter for a

purchased homestead in certain dis-

tricts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—

Must reside six months in each of

three years, cultivate fifty acres and

erect a house worth \$300.00.
