## COUNTY COUNCIL CONCLUDED BUSINESS FRIDAY AFTERNOON

St. Mary's Councillors Disagreed Concerning Appointment of Parish Officers-- Routine Business Completed and Committees Appointed.

The York County Council concluded its January meeting, the longest that has been held in some years, yesterday afternoon, when the routine business, which remained untransacted, was disposed of at short session. The afternoon proceedings were enlivened by a dispute between Councillors Smith and Fred Pond of St. Mary's Parish, concerning the choice of parish officers, a dispute which was settled only by the vote of the council as a whole. Coun. Colter submitted the Public Accounts Committee's report and several important committees were appointed.

The council resumed business at 3 p. m. Friday. On motion of Coun. Everett, seconded by Coun. Reynolds, Warden Rogers was re-appointed trustee of Victoria Public Hospital.

### TROUBLE IN ST. MARY'S.

The appointment of parish officers for the Parish of St. Mary's was taken up.

Coun. Smith said that his colleague, Coun. Fred Pond, and himself had failed to agree on the appointment of the officers of his parish. He had tried to reach an agreement with Coun. Pond, but failed. The only thing left for him to do was to refer the matter to the council.

Coun. Pond said that never before had any trouble concerning the appointment of the officers of St. Mary's Parish. It had always been understood that he was to appoint the officers at his own end of the parish. He wished to re-appoint the present officers.

Coun. Smith nominated J. V. Matthews as collector. He said he desired a change on account of complaints that had been made to him.

Coun. Pond said that he wanted one of the two officers from Gibson. He also objected to the fact that a man had been canvassing the councillors on the matter recently. He nominated the present collector, Wm. Jaffrey, for reappointment to the office.

A ballot was taken and Wm. Jaffrey was elected by a vote of 13 to 10.

Coun. Fred Pond and Coun. Smith agreed upon the other officer and no ballot was taken.

Coun. C. W. Pond inquired concerning the old safe belonging to the county, and was informed that the safe was in the county market, but was not suitable for use.

On motion of Coun. Reynolds, the warden was voted the usual fee.

### NEW POLLING PLACES.

On the motion of Coun. Essensa, seconded by Coun. Everett, a polling place was established at Hammond's store, Kingsclear.

On the motion of Coun. Everett, seconded by Coun. Essensa, the polling place for Polling District No. 1, Parish of Kingsclear, was ordered to be at or near the Temperance Hall.

On the motion of Coun. Timmins, a vote of thanks was extended to

the reporters for their attendance at the sessions of the council.

Coun. Fred Pond moved a resolution requesting the secretary treasurer to prepare for presentation to the legislature, to provide for two representatives from the town of Marysville on that town becoming a separate parish. Carried.

## TORIES ARE WORRIED OVER SENATE VACANCY

Ottawa, Jan. 20—The first reading was given in parliament today to E. N. Lewis' bill to require a load line to limit cargoes on the Grand Lakes.

Conditions in the Kingston penitentiary were again brought to the attention of parliament by Mr. Edwards, of Frontenac, who recently complained that discharged convicts were sent away with insufficient clothing. He stated that the great coats of the penitentiary guards cost only \$2.50 each, and that there was not a sufficient provision of medicine.

Sir Allen Aylesworth said that he believed the convicts got all the medicine they required and the reason the great coats cost so little was because they were made by convicts.

A. L. Fraser, Conservative, of P.E. I., complained that there was a vacancy in the island's representation in the senate which had existed since the death of Senator Ferguson, two years ago. He said, as the representation of the province in the Commons had seriously declined it was desirable in the interests of the island that the representation in the Upper House should be maintained. In addition to the vacancy caused by the physical disability of Senator Robertson, who was unable to come to Ottawa. He urged that the vacancy should be filled without delay.

## ARCHEOLOGISTS MADE VALUABLE DISCOVERY

New York, Jan. 20.—A special cable to the Tribune from London says: A discovery of vast importance in Biblical History is reported from Berlin by the Daily Telegraph. It appears that Professor Kalsner, who has been carrying out the excavation of the site of the Israelitish Capital in Samaria, has unearthed a hundred clay tablets, covered with inscriptions which are believed to form a portion of the Archives of King Ahab, a contemporary of the Prophet Elijah. These inscriptions, which merely in quantity constitute the most remarkable archaeological find, that has been made in Palestine, are not cut into the tablets, but are written in old Hebrew characters with the intensely black ink found on the Egyptian papyri between one thousand and two thousand years before Christ.

One of them is a letter to A. Ahab from the King of Assyria, who, Dr. Yapuda believes, was either Assurbanipal or his son Salmeneser, II. Another tablet contains a detailed inventory of the furniture in the royal palace, but further particulars of the find have not yet become known. Nevertheless, it is evidently destined to provide confirmation of certain phrases of old testament history, which some of the modern critics have been in the habit of treating as altogether mythical.

spoken to anyone about an Ontario Mail Order House. Also no evidence was offered that Mr. Gunter had at any time persuaded people to buy goods outside of the City, therefore no justification appeared for the charges being publicly made.

Your Commission deplores the fact that so much advertising has been given to an outside concern through this investigation, and that unfair statements about our own merchants have been given circulation.

The evidence shows that Alderman Hooper, who made the charges, had no substantial reason therefor and in the opinion of the Commission the charges were not made in the interest of the citizens and ought not to have been made.

### ALD. HOOPER'S STATEMENT.

Ald. Hooper, speaking to the motion to adopt the report of the Commission, said that the verdict of the Commission was not a surprise to him.
