Gregory and Williams were the shining lights of the home team, and they both played a strong, fast game.

Williams was especially conspicuous for his pretty stick handling, and he was ably supported by the rest of the team. New Glasgow sports received the greatest surprise of their lives, as they had no idea that their team could play such a splendid game against the Victorias.

The first half was very interesting and at half time, after the players had worked like Trojans, the score stood Moncton 3, New Glasgow 2.

The second half was exceedingly fast and exciting. New Glasgow scoring first and up to thirty seconds before time they had a lead of one goal, but Scott banged the puck in the New Glasgow goal, making it six to six.
