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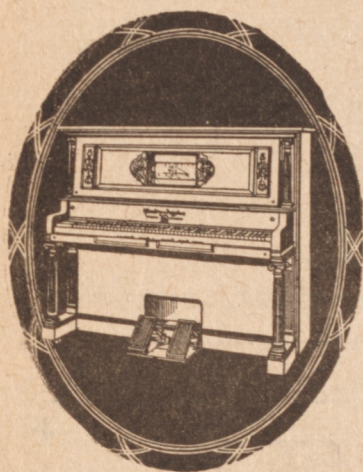

THE MISSES YOUNG**SUGGESTIONS FOR THE COOK**

Apple Rings—Beginning with the stem end, cut three unpared apples in slices, then remove the core from each one, after the pork chops have been cooking ten minutes lay on the pork the apple rings and cook the two together.

Baked Sausages with Baked Bananas—Prick with a fork one pound sausages, and parboil five minutes in boiling water. Put in a baking-pan and bake in a hot oven about twenty minutes, or until brown. Peel and cut four bananas in halves, put in pan with sausages the last ten minutes of cooking the sausages. Baste with the fat in the pan.

White Chicken Meat—To have a turkey or chicken meat white take one-half teaspoon of salt, one-half teaspoon baking soda, and one-half cup warm water. Now, with clean cloth thoroughly wash the fowl inside the day before you wish to use it and hang in a cool place. In the morning before cooking it wash out with cold water. This process draws all the blood to the inside and the meat will all be white.

Kidney Toast—Three sheep's kidneys, one ounce of butter, a little lemon, cayenne and salt, three slices of hot buttered toast. Gently stew the kidneys in a very little water till perfectly tender, when remove all

skin and gristle and pound them in a mortar with the butter till they form a smooth paste. Squeeze a little lemon into them and season highly with the cayenne and salt; spread the paste upon the toast and put the slices in the oven for a few minutes that they may be perfectly hot when served. A more economical dish may be made by substituting bullock's kidney (about half a pound for the sheep's) sufficient for three persons.

Baked Chicken—Cut a chicken into small pieces, as for stewing, wash and wipe dry; sprinkle with salt and dip each piece in melted butter, then coat with flour. Put into a beanpot, laying the larger pieces in the bottom of the pot, and putting any pieces of chicken is all in, pour over it one and one-half cups of boiling water and cover tightly with the lid. If the chicken is a young one, bake it for one and one-half hours. The juices, fat and flour will make an excellent gravy. Take out the chicken when done and arrange with the gravy on a dish, or serve direct from the beanpot, first seasoning to taste.

Dainty Sandwich—These are delicious and should be served with tea. Cut the bread very thin and remove crust. Butter the bread, then spread one side with cream cheese and chopped dates and the other side with chopped peanuts and press together.

NEEDLEWORK NOTES

When sewing a hem or straight seam pin the material to your knee and you will be sure of keeping the goods even and preventing slipping. Every few inches move the goods on and pin again.

When steaming velvet over a tea kettle insert a small funnel in the spout of the kettle. This will spread the steam over a larger surface and the work will be more quickly accomplished.

Parisian women have taken with enthusiasm to the new knitted caps of chenille, mostly in red and other bright colors, very flat and untrimmed. These are warm, light and pretty, and will be much worn this winter for skating, etc., and as travelling caps. The idea originated with a little girl who sold dolls' caps of this sort at the Paris races.

"When I have a dress to make over" said the practical woman, "I always rip it completely, clean and press it, and put it away for two seasons. Then, when I take it out again and refashion it in the latest mode, I have a dress that not my closest friends will recognize. Peoples memories last over one season, but never over two. If the material is of a very striking color, I often dye it a slightly darker shade. Then, if anybody remarks that my new garment is very like my old one, I answer, 'Yes, very like,' and no one is the wiser."

Often in padding a buttonhole edge or a design of solid embroidery the color that is afterward stitched under white padding shows through the disagreeable in a dark shade. One woman solved the problem by doing her padding in cotton as near the shade of the silk as she could get. The result was eminently satisfactory it may seem extravagant, but the extra expense was worth while.

CANADIAN PACIFIC RATES NOT AFFECTED BY DIVIDEND

Montreal, Jan. 10.—In an interview tonight Mr. A. R. Creelman, K. C., general counsel for the C. P. R., and also one of the directors of the company, discussed the recent increase in dividend of the company.

"Will the increase in the dividend to ten per cent. mean that the company must submit its rates to the Railway Commission?" Mr. Creelman was asked.

"Not at all," was his answer. "The declaration of an extra dividend was made in view of the position of the land account, and of the other extraneous assets of the company. The distribution from these sources, commencing with the payment of the next quarterly dividend will be at the rate of three per cent. per annum, instead of one per cent. as heretofore."

"Does not your charter call for a revision of rates by the government as soon as your company pays ten per cent.?"

"No, such is not the case," was his reply. "Our charter says that neither parliament nor the Governor-General in Council shall reduce our rates until the railway is making ten per cent. net on the actual capital expended in the construction of the road."

"And what is the amount expended in actual construction?"

"We do not know," said Mr. Creelman. "Some time ago we took up this matter with the Supreme Court in order to have them determine what the actual expenditure was. We want to know whether it meant only the main line, or whether it included branches, terminals, etc. That case is still pending, but, as a matter of fact, the C. P. R. agreed some years ago not to claim the protection of the ten per cent. clause, and, further, we have repeatedly expressed our willingness to submit our rates to the Railway Commission to have them deal with them on their merits. In other words, in so far as our rates are concerned, we have been in the same position as any other railway in Canada. We have voluntarily submitted our rates to the Railway Commission whenever these rates have been attacked."

"And, after all," he added, "rates are determined by the business of the country and by competition. We could not arbitrarily fix rates which would be excessive." There has been, said Mr. Creelman, "a good deal of misunderstanding regarding this ten per cent. clause. But it only refers to a time when the road is making ten per cent. net on the actual capital expended on construction. And, further, we have never taken refuge behind our rates agreement, but have freely submitted our rates to the Railway Commission. So far as our rates were concerned we have been in the same position as other roads in Canada."

SAY HE SWINDLED FRENCH CANADIANS

Boston, Jan. 11.—Chief Post Office Inspector Letherman said today that the arrest of Joseph De Champlain, on his arrival at Manchester, N. H., from Montreal, on the charge of using the mails to defraud, was one of the most important in months.

Letherman says De Champlain, by selling stocks of several of his companies to the French in Canada and New England, took in about \$666,000. De Champlain was today deposed as head of the New England Investment Company, which failed some time ago. Six other corporations were involved.

De Champlain also floated a land company in Canada. He is held in \$4,000 for hearing Monday.

METHODS OF KEEPING EGGS FRESH

At a time when eggs are so expensive, it may not come amiss to know that even in old farmhouses methods were employed in the season when eggs were a plenty to keep them against the time when chickens would lay one egg a day or maybe only two or three a week.

An old farmer says that one of the favorite methods of keeping eggs was that of coating the shell with gum. Ordinary gum arabic was used which was melted slowly over the fire and applied to the eggs with the help of a soft brush. When set they were packed in dry charcoal and stored in ordinary deal boxes.

To preserve newly laid eggs for three months the better treatment is often employed in country places where a sudden influx of summer visitors puts a severe strain on the resources of a small village or seaside place.

Only fresh butter may be used, however, and barely sufficient used to coat the eggs. Too much butter would probably taint the contents and destroy the creaminess which is a characteristic of freshly laid eggs.

An old-fashioned method is that of smearing the eggs all over with glycerin, the idea in this case as in the two former methods, being to exclude the air as much as possible and preserve them as efficiently as if they had been tinued.

The simplest method of all, and one employed by a city family, is to obtain as many eggs as are needed for winter use in late autumn, pack them on end in the packing cases which a cool place in the cellar, and they hold each egg separate, put them in will keep fresh till late spring.
