TOWN OF MARYSVILLE  
WILL PRESS CLAIM  
AGAINST COUNTY

Special Auditor Employed by Marysville Finds Balance of \$2,900 Due That Town.

The claim of the Town of Marysville against the Municipality of York for over-assessment, will again come to the front at an early date, and Marysville will make a claim on the Warden of York for payment of about \$2,900, which it is contended, has been wrongly paid by the Town of Marysville into the county treasury. The Town Council of Marysville will meet on Friday night to consider the matter.

## COMMITTEE'S REPORT.

At the semi-annual meeting of the York County Council held here in January, Coun. Sterling of Stanley, presented the report of the special committee appointed to consider the claim of the Town of Marysville. The report stated that the committee had gone carefully into the matter and had found that Marysville had no claim against the county. Ald. Daniel Pickard of Marysville, however, who was a member of the committee, refused to sign the report. The claim of the Town of Marysville, which was considered by the committee, was in two sections, first that Marysville had been over-assessed on \$3,200 of temporary loan debentures issued in 1896, second that Marysville had been over-assessed for interest on debentures and for county contingencies.

Ald. Pickard's views were concurred in by the Marysville Council.

## SPECIAL AUDITOR EMPLOYED.

Within a comparatively short time Mr. George Armstrong of St. Marys, an expert accountant, was employed by the Town of Marysville to go over the accounts. His report which will be made public shortly, shows a balance of \$2,900 in favor of Marysville.

County Secretary Bliss is out of the city at present and no statement from him concerning the matter could be obtained.

MARITIME EXPRESS  
CRASHED INTO LOCAL  
TRAIN AT DERBY JCT.

One Killed and Several Injured in Train Wreck on The I. C. R. This Morning.

A shocking accident occurred on the I. C. R. at Derby Junction this morning resulting in the death of one man and the injury of several others.

Reports to hand are somewhat meagre but it is known that a collision occurred between the Maritime Express from the north and the local train which runs on the Indian-town branch between Derby Junction and Blackville. It seems that the switch had been left open and the Maritime coming along at full speed was thrown upon the siding, where the local was standing.

The two trains came together with terrible force and the passenger coach of the local is said to have been completely demolished.

A man named McDougall, belonging to Indiantown was killed and another named Atkinson son of the station agent at Derby received serious injuries.

The Loggieville express on the Fredericton branch is today reported three hours late on account of the accident.

The local I. C. R. officials state that they have received no official word of the accident. The account of the death of one man and injuries to others is confirmed.

AGRICULTURE  
COMMITTEE WANTS  
GAME LAWS CHANGED

Adopts Resolution to Permit Farmers to Kill Game Found Destroying Crops.

On the motion of Mr. James Lowell, M.P.P., for St. John County, the Agricultural Committee of the House of Assembly this morning adopted a resolution favoring the amendment of the Game Laws so as to permit farmers to kill moose or deer which may be found destroying crops. This resolution will be sent to the House for consideration. Speaking in support of the resolution, Mr. Lowell gave instances of great damage being done growing crops by moose and deer and referred to the injustice done the farmers by the provisions of the Game Laws which prevent the killing of the animals mentioned except as game in the hunting season. He argued that provision could be made for the farmers, who might be compelled to kill moose or deer to protect their crops, to make declaration to that effect under oath.

## MR. TURNEY'S ADDRESS.

Mr. W. B. Dickson, M.P.P., of Albert, was in the chair. The greater part of the time was taken up by Mr. A. G. Turney, Provincial Horticulturist, who gave a resume of the work of his department during the past year and outlined the work for the coming year. That work he said, would come under the head of demonstration in orcharding, orchard surveys, the establishment of illustration orchards and work in connection with a fruit growers' association.

On motion, the scheme as outlined was adopted. It was also announced that during the coming year the Agricultural Department would devote particular attention to the importation of Short-horns, the development of poultry-raising and agricultural education.
