Joe Callaghan and "Bobber" Conley
Mentioned in Boston Journal---
Signed With Chicago White Sox

Joe Callaghan and "Bobber" Conley, who have been with Fredericton in the N. B. & Maine League two seasons according to the Boston Journal, go to the Chicago White Sox.

The Journal of Thursday prints large photos of these players and has the following in regard to the baseball careers:

"Two Dorchester boys, Joe Callaghan and "Bobber" Conley, have been signed by the Chicago White Sox. These boys played with the Fredericton team, champions of the New Brunswick League, the past season. Conley covered third, while his chum played first and second.

"Both boys have had considerable experience in baseball. Conley started his early career with the Dorchester High nine. He played two years at Schoharie, N. Y., in a summer league. He has played with Fredericton two years. He hit for .293 last season. Conley is twenty-one years old, weighs 172 and is 5 feet 10 inches in height.

"Callaghan originally came from Dorchester, but made his scholastic reputation with Cushing Academy in 1909-10. In 1911, he was taken south with the Boston Nationalists, and after a tryout was sent to York of the Tristate circuit. From there went to Fredericton, where he has played two years. He batted for .320 last season. He is twenty-three years old, weighs 168 pounds, and is 5 feet 11 inches tall."

INTERCOLLEGIATE HOCKEY
LEAGUE REORGANIZED

Four Team League With Double Schedule---King's, Mt. Allison, Acadia and U. N. B. Entered---Proposal to Form Six-Team League in Two Sections Turned Down---Prospects for Year are Good

St. John, Dec. 21--At a meeting of representatives from Acadia, Mt. Allison, U.N.B. and King's College held in the Royal Hotel last evening, the arrangements for the intercollegiate hockey league for 1913 were discussed and a tentative schedule drawn up.

The representatives present at the meeting were: Machym, U.N.B.; Parker, King's; West, Mt. A., and Currey, Acadia.

The representative for Mt. Allison not being authorized to take any definite action, the schedule drawn up and the other arrangements will become effective when agreed to by the athletic body at the Sackville University.

AGAINST OTHER SCHEME.

According to the plans, the league will be a four-team one, the feeling of the representatives being strongly against reverting to the former scheme of having only three teams entered. A representative of St. Francis Xavier College was also present at the meeting with a view to arranging to have a two-section league, the one section including Mt. Allison, Acadia and U.N.B., the other St. F. X., Dalhousie and King's, but the plans were not favorably considered by the meeting and accordingly it was practically arranged for the four-team league with Mr. A., Acadia, King's and U.N.B.

SCHEDULE.

According to the schedule drafted, there will be twelve games; the first game of the series to be played January 28th at Sackville between Mt. A. and King's.

January 28--Mt. Allison vs King's at Sackville.

January 30--U.N.B. vs King's at Fredericton.

February 4--Mt. Allison vs Acadia at Sackville.

February 6--U.N.B. vs Acadia at Fredericton.

February 14--Acadia vs U.N.B. at Wolfville.

February 19--King's vs Mt. Allison at Windsor.

February 21--Acadia vs Mt. Allison at Wolfville.

February 25--King's vs Acadia at Windsor.

February 25--Mt. Allison vs U.N.B. at Sackville.

February 28--Acadia vs King's at Wolfville.

February 28--U.N.B. vs Mt. Allison at Fredericton.

FOREST FIRE FIGHTERS

During the coming winter the officers in charge of the Brazeau and Athabaska divisions of the Rocky Mountains forest reserve propose to make "administrative site" surveys at different points on the Reserves. Upon these sites it is proposed to erect ranger and lookout stations which will be no farther apart than one day's trip by pack train, along the primary trail system of the Brazeau Reserve. It is the intention to erect, this winter, at least three or four log cabins for the rangers. A telephone system is also being planned whereby these Ranger Stations will be connected by telephone to the forest supervisor's office. This office is centrally located and telephone lines will run in from all directions, much in the manner of the spokes of a wheel with the central office as the hub.

This region is one of the richest coal regions in Canada and the future development of these coal fields will be amazing. FREDDIE WELSH
HAILED AS ONE
OF WORLD'S BEST

Now Talk of Sending Him Against
Willie Ritchie in Near Future for
Title

Freddie Welsh is the real champion lightweight of Great Britain and "our possessions overseas." Incidentally, Freddie is the first champion of the sort for some years and should receive full credit for the same. He won the title by outpointing Hughey Mehegan, the acknowledged champion of Australia, in London night before last. Mehegan is by no means a dub fighter. From all accounts, he is extremely fast and scientific, conserves his energy well and has worked hard for his position in the Antipodes. He was to have been brought to America a year or so ago, but preferred to make the trip around the world from the other direction. He had the merit of game-ness, and as soon as he struck London challenged all and sundry of his poundage. For some time he was unable to get matches for the very good reason that he was feared and Matt Wells made a great hit when he finally agreed to take on the visitor. Welsh lost on a foul, which appears to have been unintentional, and since then Mehegan has had little to do. He fought two bouts with a second-rater, but made the complaint so frequent with American and colonial boxers who visit the other side, to wit, that he had to box two-minute rounds when he had been accustomed to three-minute rounds. His opponent worked himself blue in the face in the short sessions and whenever Mehegan got ready to cut loose he heard the bell ring. Welsh is almost certain to be sent against Willie Ritchie in a year or so, and it should be a rattling good match if held on the Pacific Coast. Even if they meet in New York it may be a good scrap, because the English and other foreign boxers do not appear to have learned the true inwardness of doing the McGorly-Gibbons stunt.

DUNDEE BEAT MORGAN

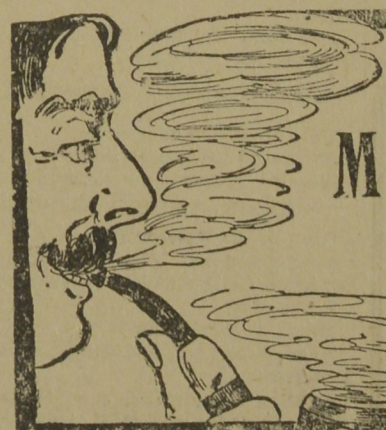
New York, N.Y., Dec. 19--Johnny Dundee, the local featherweight out-pointed Eddie Morgan of England in a 10-round bout tonight at the 44th street sporting club. Dundee carried the fight to Morgan in every round and won through sheer aggressiveness. It was a scientific battle, one of the best seen here between featherweights. Morgan showed cleverness for the first five rounds, but thereafter it was all Dundee. The latter was able to keep up the fast pace which he started, but Morgan slowed up. The Englishman scored the only real hard blow of the contest, a right to the jaw in the early part of the fight.

COLLEGE CHESS EAMS MEET

New York, Dec. 21--Play in the annual intercollegiate four-board chess tournament between Harvard, Yale, Princeton and Columbia is scheduled to begin at the Murray Hill Hotel tomorrow afternoon and will continue over Monday and Tuesday. This will be the twenty-first annual tournament of the league. Of the twenty tournaments already held Harvard leads with nine victories to eight for Columbia.

CONVICT FACES ARSON TRIAL

Jackson, Mich., Dec. 10--Joseph Davison, one of the ringleaders in the recent rebellion of the convicts in the Michigan State Prison here, was arranged in court today to stand trial on a charge of arson. Davison is alleged to have set fire to the sal warehouse at the prison as a part of the plot of the convicts to escape.



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
