HON. RODOLPHE LEMIEUX
ON RECENT ELECTION

(Montreal Herald.)

Some of the causes which led to the defeat of the Liberal government were given in the first public utterance made by a member of the late ministry when Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux addressed last evening a meeting of the St. Louis Club.

"As we are en famille," he declared, "I will speak very frankly; the Liberal party is one of principle and reform and, as such, cannot be expected to remain permanently in power. I want to tell those, however, who imagine that the party is in mourning over its defeat that they are entirely mistaken for I honestly believe that, as a matter of fact, the majority of Liberals get more pleasure out of opposition than out of power. It was on an economic measure that we were defeated. We considered that our policy with regard to it was for the benefit of the masses and preferred to go down to defeat supporting them rather than to receive the adulations of the classes: in a word, it is my belief that Sir Wilfrid Laurier is greater in defeat than in victory.

PREJUDICE CAUSED IT.

"His government carried six of the nine provinces in Confederation and its defeat was due to the prejudice that out-ran reason in Ontario. The people there were led to believe that annexation hovered in the wake of reciprocity, and even those who started the cry without believing it ended by firmly believing it themselves. Although this certainly contributed to the Liberal defeat there were, however, other causes. I myself saw pamphlets which were distributed throughout the Province of Ontario, holding Sir Wilfrid, as premier, directly responsible for the Ne Temere decree. Several incidents, in fact, have taken place which appeared to interfere with the validity of marriage and this also played a very important part in the recent elections so far as the Province of Ontario was concerned.

BLAMES FATHER VAUGHN.

"Still another cause, in my opinion was the presence of Sir Wilfrid Laurier at the Eucharistic Congress in this city last year, as, again, were the unwise and imprudent sermons of Father Vaughn. I am not going to discuss the pros and cons of the controversy, but simply to state causes and facts as they occurred. This distinguished preacher on many occasions had said exactly the same things in exactly the same manner as he had done in Canada, in other places without producing any apparent effect. But it was another thing for Father Vaughn to come to this mixed community and tell Protestants that theirs was a soulless religion—that, in fact, there was only one religion.

"I hold that all religious beliefs and even religious prejudices when honestly held should be respected. If we do not respect the religious beliefs and prejudices of our neighbors, our society will fall, and our home life will also be wrecked to a certain extent.

"Out of the thirteen divisions in Ontario that returned Liberal candidates, six, at least, did so with a Roman Catholic vote.

RACE CRY AGAINST PREMIER.

"While Sir Wilfrid Laurier, however, was considered in Ontario to be the direct representative of the Pope,

he was denounced in the French Province of Quebec as pro-English and absolutely indifferent to the rights and aspirations of the French-Canadian people. A French paper in Montreal even went so far as to declare that, while Laurier's address delivered in Notre Dame Church had been fairly good, it could yet have been delivered in any Protestant church in the land.

"At the same time, if there is one thing that rejoices every Liberal heart it is that Sir Wilfrid has consented to lead the opposition. Nor must we imagine that everything is couleur de rose in the Conservative camp. There was a time when Messrs. Monk, Pelletier and Nantel declared that Mr. Borden was not their leader. The present premier, however, with the gift of offices at his command, was a different man to R. L. Borden, leader of the opposition, and these gentlemen accepted unconditionally and with alacrity, the portfolios that he doled out to them.

TRIBUTE TO MR. BORDEN.

"I feel it my duty on this occasion to pay my tribute to the broad-minded, patriotic and cultured gentleman at the head of the government and feel that both parties have reason to congratulate themselves that they were respectively led by two such honest and high-minded men as Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the Right Hon. Robert Laird Borden.

"I am absolutely opposed to the principle of the proposed tariff commission as directly contrary to constitutional principles. The government of the day is responsible for it and it should stand or fall by its fiscal policy. I am also solidly against a cash contribution to the Imperial navy, and in this I believe that I speak for all Liberals. I am in favor of a Canadian navy, whose first duty would be to protect our Canadian shipyards, our Canadian shores and whenever the British supremacy upon the sea is threatened, it can fly to its defence.

The president of the St. Louis club presided and the other speakers included Messrs. Oscar Gladu, ex-M.P. for Yamaska; Godfrey Langlois, M. L.A. for St. Louis, and Mr. Peter Bercevitich.

A letter was read from Mr. Robert Bickerdike, M.P. for St. Lawrence Division, regretting his inability to be present, owing to a death in his family.

MANUAL TRAINING EXPERTS MEET

Cincinnati, O., Nov. 2—Teachers and advocates of manual training in the public schools and colleges of the country gathered here in force today at the opening of the fifth annual convention of the National Society for the Promotion of Industrial Training. The sessions will last three days and will be devoted to the consideration of the subject of industrial education in all its phases. Prominent among those on the programme are Dr. Carroll G. Pease of Milwaukee, president of the National Education Association; Charles A. Bookwalter, of the Indianapolis National Trade School; John Goldin of the United Textile Workers of America, and Edwin G. Cooley former superintendent of the Chicago public schools.

DEAD IN THE WEST

The Recorder of Riceville, Iowa, contains the following account of the death of a former New Brunswick lady:

The death of Mrs. Bridges ends the life of a woman greatly loved and admired in this community.

Because of her large sympathy and eagerness to be helpful, she was always ready to shoulder responsibilities and assume the burdens of her friends and associates. It can be truly said of her that her life spent itself in the service of others. Utterly unselfish, never stopping to realize her limitations as to strength of mind or body, she would often continue in her efforts long after she was exhausted and should have rested. It's no wonder then that her friends and the community where she has lived so many years are grief-stricken. Her acts of loving service, the kind words she spoke, the cheery smile, and above all her genuine sympathy, have touched the hearts of many and today their grief is real for they have lost that which is a life-time in the making—a friend proven.

Born June 28, 1840 she was married to Albert W. Bridges on April 18, 1860 and for more than fifty-one years these two have lived absolutely devoted to one another. And the saddest part in contemplating this mournful event is that her husband is left to finish life's journey alone with only the memory of her love and sympathy.

Her long life of splendid endeavor is more remarkable when we realize how frail she has been for years. Nevertheless she has lived cheerfully, patiently enduring the aches and pains with an abiding faith that all was for the best; until Thursday morning October 12, the end came like a gentle sleep, the sleep that knows no awakening.

The funeral services were held Saturday morning at the home conducted by Rev. Pease and Rev. James; thence by train to the beautiful Lakeside cemetery, Minneapolis Minnesota where the burial took place in the family lot, made sacred by being the resting place of a dear little daughter, their only child.

ways to a bond of abiding friendship between them. I trust that the anniversary of 100 years of peace will be commemorated in the two countries with a deep and solemn sense of national responsibility, and that each will accomplish its destiny under the splendid inspiration of enduring and increasing friendship and good will."

Mr. Borden pledged himself to carry out all the promises made by himself while in opposition. He proposed to extend that reform of the civil service which, he said, the late administration carried out in part.

"So far as trade relations are concerned, we believe that the true idea of reciprocity can be found within the vast dominions of this empire. With its wonderful variety of natural and other products which can be exchanged to the mutual advantage of all."

Following Mr. Borden came speeches by the members of the cabinet who were present.

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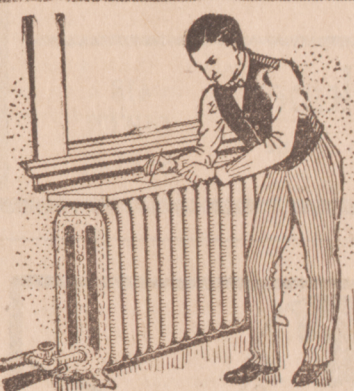

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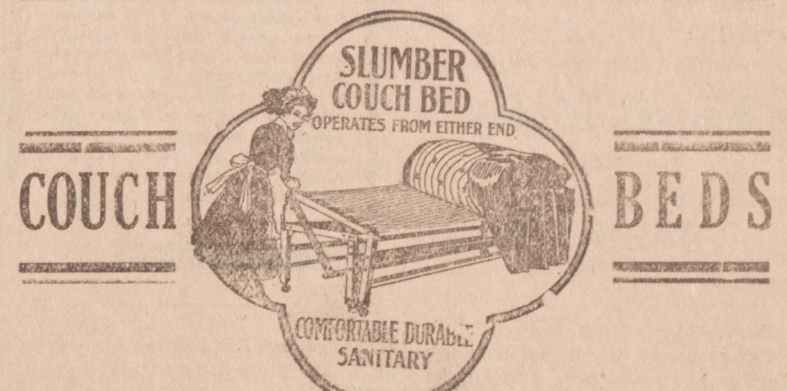
