COUN. PERLEY  
SAYS NON-RESIDENT  
IS NOT WANTED

Luther B. Smith Mentioned as Com-promise Tory Candidate in Sun-bury

The political situation in Sunbury County displays more interesting features as the time for the calling of a convention draws nearer, several members of the Conservative party who believe that the seat in the local house can be obtained without a contest clamoring for recognition and nomination. The most prominent feature of the situation at present is the voicing by Coun. George A. Perley of Margerville of the opinion of a large section of the Sunbury Conservatives that the county should not be represented by a non-resident.

## COUN. PERLEY'S STATEMENT

The Telegraph today had the following concerning Coun. Perley:—"George A. Perley, of Margerville, who has been freely mentioned as a possible candidate for the County of Sunbury to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Hon. J. D. Hazen, in the provincial legislature, after spending a few days in the city, left last evening for Fredericton. Mr. Perley has been for 28 years a member of the municipal council, seven of which he has been warden of the county.

"He said that he was opposed to the nomination of a non-resident. The county had been represented by outsiders at different periods and the stigma should be wiped out. He had been approached by his friends to become a candidate and under the circumstances would not feel disinclined to do so."

## OTHER CLAIMANTS

Coun. Perley is not alone in his desire to be nominated for Sunbury Coun. Taylor of Blissville, Alex. Burnett of Oromocto and Murray Patterson of Lincoln are all willing to accept the burden of political life and have strong support. It is rumored also that Luther B. Smith who was defeated by Col. H. H. McLean in the recent Dominion general election may be named as a compromise candidate in the event of there being a deadlock.

Coun. Perley's utterance as given before is of importance coming as it does from a man of weight and influence in party and community. It will not be well received by the wing of the party represented by Parker Glasier, M. P., who is supporting the candidature of Lewis H. Bliss of St. Mary's, his brother-in-law. In the past the councillor and Mr. Glasier have not seen eye-for-eye in various matters and in the present case are likely to clash again.

In addition to the claimants named Messrs. R. B. Hanson and P. A. Gutherie of this city are pressing their claims for the nomination.

At the police court this afternoon Stewart and Peter Bailey were remanded until Wednesday morning and the other two boys were discharged.

DEPUTY SHERIFF  
WINTER ARRESTED  
HUDLIN YESTERDAY

Sunbury County Colored Man now in Jail at Burton--Will Have to Face Serious Charges

John Amos Hudlin a colored resident of Lakeville Corner, Sunbury County, was arrested at his home yesterday afternoon by Deputy Sheriff Winter of this city and this morning was lodged in the Sunbury County jail at Burton. Hudlin has the reputation of being a troublesome customer, but when brought to Oromocto this morning on the steamer Hampstead was quiet. Sheriff Winter went to Lakeville Corner yesterday afternoon, leaving Fredericton by steamer at three o'clock. He is expected to return this evening.

## SERIOUS CHARGES

Hudlin will have to face serious charges. Last week he drove Harry W. Currie of Royal Road and a colored man named Henry Wheary off his premises with a shot-gun. Currie had purchased a quantity of Hudlin's hay which had been sold under an execution issued to Wheary by Sheriff Holden. Currie took a hay-press owned by A. Bridges to Hudlin's place with the intention of pressing the hay. After being driven off the premises by Hudlin they left the hay-press in a neighboring field. Shortly afterward the hay that had been sold under execution and the press were burned and Hudlin is thought to be responsible for the fire. The property destroyed was worth upwards of one hundred dollars.

## OUTCOME OF LITIGATION

The trouble is the outcome of litigation between Hudlin and Wheary, the latter having brought proceedings against Hudlin some time ago to account for part of an estate of which Wheary was executor. Hudlin is subject to attacks of insanity and it is thought his recent actions were due to one of such attacks.

FOUR YOUNG BOYS  
FACE THEFT CHARGE  
IN POLICE COURT

Need of Reform School Emphasized by Case--One Boy Confessed Implicating the Others

Another case of juvenile crime has come to light in the city and four young boys will have to face a charge of theft. The boys are Ray Stewart, Peter Bailey, Paul Bailey and Jack Lyons. All are young. Stewart a colored boy is the oldest of the quartet and seems to have been the leader. Theft of goods from Mr. Albert E. Eardley whose grocery store is at the corner of King and St. John streets is charged. The goods were stolen early last Saturday night from the doorway of the store. Young Stewart acknowledged his part in the theft to Chief Hawthorn after at first denying it and implicated the others. Mr. Eardley has lost so heavily through theft that he has decided to prosecute in the present case. The boys are being examined before Police Magistrate Marsh this afternoon. Stewart also confessed to Chief Hawthorn that he had entered a place of business on Queen Street by means of a side-window but stated that he had not been able to steal anything on account of the room which he entered being locked. Suspicion was directed to Stewart in this instance by a muddy footprint which tallied with the size and appearance of his boot.

The present case coming as it does after a series of crimes by young boys emphasizes the need of a reform and industrial school for youthful lawbreakers.
