ST. JOHN RIVER S. S. CO. BUYS STAR LINE PROPERTY HERE

J. R. Stone Curator Bids in Steamer Victoria--Hon. D. J. Purdy Bids in Steamer Majestic.

The property of the Star Line Steamship Company, now in liquidation, consisting of the steamers Victoria and Majestic, together with the wharf and buildings in Fredericton were sold in St. John today at public auction. The property situated in this city consisting of the wharf at the foot of Regent Street, a freight shed and combined warehouse and dwelling-house was bid in by Dr. L. A. Curry, representing the St. John River Steamship Company. The price bid was \$2,200.

The steamer Victoria was bid in by J. R. Stone of St. John, who was appointed curator when the company went into liquidation. The price bid was \$5,000. It is not known for whom Mr. Stone was acting. The steamer Majestic was bid in by Hon. D. J. Purdy of St. John, who represented another steamship company. The price bid for the Majestic was \$6,000. The price bid for the Victoria is much below her actual value. This steamer was built in 1897 and is the largest on the River St. John. She was built by the late George F. Baird at a cost of about \$20,000. The steamer Majestic was bought in Upper Canada by the Star Line Co. about seven years ago. It is probable that both steamers will remain in the St. John River service.

MRS. MARY ROCHE

DIED THIS MORNING

The death of Mrs. Mary Roche, widow of the late William Roche, occurred at three o'clock this morning at her residence, St. John Street. Death came suddenly. The deceased was in her usual state of health yesterday morning being about the house and also out of doors. At about noon she was stricken by paralysis from which she never rallied.

The deceased was seventy-one years of age and was a daughter of the late James Miskell who was a native of Cork, Ireland but who came to this country many years ago. She is survived by no near relatives.

The funeral will take place at nine o'clock Monday morning with High Mass of Requiem at St. Dunstan's Church.

LARGE VOTE IS EXPECTED TO BE POLLED MONDAY

Voters List Contains 1341 Names--Workers Are Active Today--Election Dodgers Being Circulated.

On Monday the annual civic elections will take place. The campaign has been conducted very quietly by both the Good Government and the Citizens' tickets, but it is expected that a large vote will be polled Monday. The voters' list contains 1341 names. Of that number 716 are of voters residing in No. 1 Division, and 626 of those residing in No. 2 Division. The number of voters eligible to vote Monday is greater than ever before in the history of Fredericton.

LARGE NUMBER OF VOTERS.

The polls will open at 9 a.m. Monday and will close at 4 p.m. Voters residing in No. 1 Division will vote at the City Hall, those residing in No. 2 Division at the Court House.

Returning officers and clerks were sworn in by the City Clerk this morning. They are as follows: No. 1 Division--A to K, 357 voters, William M. Todd and Lewis Perley. L to Z, 358 voters, Frank G. VanWart and Walter McKay. No. 2 Division, A to K, 308 voters, Wm. C. Burt and Eldon Merrithew. L to Z, 318 voters, Thos. C. Doherty and Thos. Rainsford.

An official ballot with eighteen names on it is to be used in the election. A voter is entitled to vote for ten persons, two in each ward, whose names are on the ballot. The names of the candidates for whom the elector does not wish to vote are to be marked out with black lead-pencil.

ACTIVITY DISPLAYED.

There was some activity among election workers today and efforts will be made by both sides to bring out every available vote. The W.C.T.U. has circulated today dodgers containing literature bearing on the election.

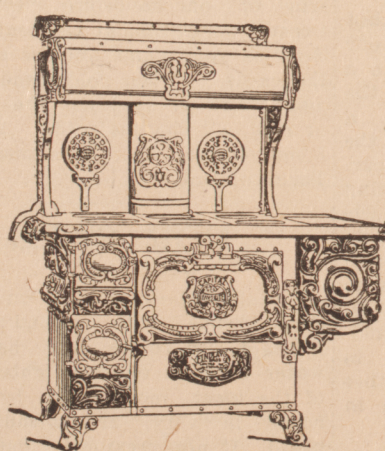
