OPPOSITION IN DISTRESS OVER RECIPROCITY

(Halifax Chronicle)

While public interest centres largely around the attitude of Congress toward the reciprocity agreement, the most interesting developments in connection therewith are likely to occur at Ottawa. Evidence is accumulating that the Opposition are singularly unhappy over the good bargain which Mr. Fielding and Mr. Paterson have brought home. Our conservative contemporary printed yesterday an Ottawa despatch which is significant of the difficulties which exist in the Opposition ranks.

Thus we are informed that the "alignment upon the measure" bids fair to be along geographical rather than political lines, "that there is a general feeling among members of the Opposition that the agreement is a step away from Imperial unity and mutual preference within the Empire," and yet, "at the same time they are free to admit that from an immediate standpoint the new arrangement will appeal to many of their constituents." Again we are told by this same delightful correspondent: "The farmers and cattle-men along the West, and the dairy-men along the St. Lawrence and in the Eastern townships, are generally quoted as being pleased with the agreement."

Mr. Andrew Broder one of the Opposition veterans, is quoted as saying that "the agreement is political, rather than commercial, more politics than 'patriotism.'" Then comes this naive comment: Mr. Broder, "however, is not at present opposing the measure, but like many other members is engaged in studying the complex schedules presented and is consulting with his constituents." In other words Mr. Broder and the rest of them are trying to find out how many votes "patriotism" is going to be worth.

Finally we get an inkling of the quandary in which the Opposition find themselves in the following: "While the resolution may not be opposed or even supported on strictly party lines, it is probable that a long debate will ensue and that many members of the Opposition will both speak and vote against them." All of which goes to show that the Opposition are having troubles of their own in trying to reconcile their tariff differences. The Western member whose constituents have been clamoring for tariff reduction are reluctant to take their political lives in their hands by voting against such a substantial measure of free trade, while the Eastern members know full well how beneficial reciprocity in natural products will be to their constituents.

Whether or not they will be strong enough to curb such invertebrate opponents of reciprocity as Mr. Foster remains to be seen, but the chances are that the Opposition, as a whole, will not dare to vote against the reciprocity agreement. If they do, so much the worse for them. Meanwhile it is interesting that even their inspired correspondents cannot conceal the fact that they are sadly divided in counsel. Once more they have been outgeneraled.

ONTARIO FARMERS ENDORSE RECIPROCITY

Forest, Ont. Feb. 4.—The Forest Grange yesterday afternoon passed a resolution of appreciation of the success of the government in securing such a wide measure of reciprocity with the United States, as the members believed it would be of immense benefit to Canada as a whole.

Toronto Ont. Feb. 4.—The question of reciprocity was discussed at the annual meeting of the horse breeders association. A resolution was passed asking that the minister of agriculture use his influence to the best interests of the Canadian Horse Industry and discontinue the consummation of the treaty without first appointing a Royal Commission to investigate the whole question.

RECIPROCITY POPULAR IN CARLETON CO.

Never since confederation has there been such a golden prospect for Carleton County farmers as is held out by the new tariff agreement announced in Parliament last Thursday. Throughout Canada the message that Hon. Mr. Fielding bore was considered the most important achievement ever made for the Canadian people. For weeks a committee composed of Canadian and American experts have been arranging an agreement of reciprocity, or free trade particularly in farm products, and the concessions gained from the Americans are a surprise to every Canadian, for those who have read the full report will have noticed that our neighbors concede to Canada much more than we have given.

The new arrangement will not become law until the measure passes both Parliament and Congress. That it will pass the farmer by a most decisive majority goes without saying but there is a reason to apprehend that the measure be killed in either the House of Representatives or the U. S. Senate.

Throughout Canada, as may have been expected, the Conservative newspapers generally condemn the whole affair, for high protection is always their slogan even at the sacrifice of Canadian farmers. But the disunity of these opposition journals at such unexpected and sweeping changes, raises a bedlam of objections rashly inconsistent. More moderate Conservative papers approve of the proposed change but declare the Americans will never pass such a measure.

From the beginning of the Laurier administration the tendency has been steadily to tariff reduction, the general tariff having already been reduced more than one-third, while the "ninety million market" for Canadian products has brought it still further down.

When the new agreement becomes law the people of Carleton County will secure admission duty free into the United States of all the products of the farm.

CURLING EXPERIENCING GREAT BOOM THIS WINTER

It is pleasing to note the interest that is being taken in curling here this winter. The local curlers are in earnest and are determined that the good old game shall be kept to the front.

Thus far they have won all their games played this year defeating the St. Andrews and Thistle Clubs of St. John East, and the Carleton Club of St. John West. On Tuesday or Wednesday next they go to St. John four rinks to again try conclusions with these clubs upon their own ice, and it is fully expected that they will return with at least two victories more to add to their list and this seems probable if some of the best players can manage to get away.

INTERESTING MATCH

On the Monday evening after their return one of the most interesting matches that has taken place for years will be played in the rink here. Three rinks of old members of the club men who have been curling for 20 years or more will play against an equal number of rinks composed of the younger members, and a "hot old game" is looked for. The old members have some fine old curlers amongst their number, men who have and can play keen curling and who have brought home many a victory for the home club, men who can play curling anywhere in Canada and give a good account of themselves, men like J. S. Nell, T. G. Loggie, R. S. Barker, J. H. Hawthorn, T. L. Fowler, R. F. Randolph and others.

If the younger members can defeat the combination they are deserving of much credit and it will show that the game has still a great hold upon the intelligent and able bodied young men of this city who prefer good clean sport to some other kinds that cannot be classed that way.

It is to be hoped that a return match will be played no matter who wins the first one. Much interest is being taken in the game by all citizens both male and female and it will be a great surprise if the rink is not pretty well filled on the occasion of this match. The game should never be allowed to go down.

CARLETON CO. FRUIT GROWERS ORGANIZE

Woodstock, N.B., Feb. 3.—This afternoon a number of gentlemen representing the fruit growing and allied industries of Carleton county met and organized the Carleton County Fruit Growers' Association. They elected officers:

President—S. A. Thomas, of Lindsay, fruit grower.

Vice-presidents—Sheriff John D. Tompkins, of Florenceville, and Harry Cochrane, Victoria county, fruit grower and shipper.

Treasurer—Jarvis J. Bull, managing director of the Maritime Co-operative company, Woodstock.

Secretary—Edwin Tappan Adney, representing the Sharp fruit interests.

Additional members of the executive board, Coles W. Dugan, Woodstock, shipper of apples, and Judson Briggs, Lindsey, fruit grower.

The objects of the association are the collection of information regarding the fruit improving industry and its dissemination in quarters, where it will not only encourage the home grower, but cause the intending settler or investor to perceive the superior advantages of Carleton county, the only present commercial apple section of New Brunswick.

The promotion of exhibitions of fruit at such times and where it will serve to illustrate the present production and resources of Carleton county.

The promotion of fruit growing in the county by encouraging the formation of co-operative fruit growing, packing and marketing associations.

The circulation of information among the members and others concerning the proper varieties of fruit to plant, methods of cultivation, etc., most suitable to our climate and local conditions.

Promotion of the interests of existing allied industries in the country that depend in whole or in part upon the fruit growing industry.

The meeting was enthusiastic and adjourned until Feb. 10 for preparation of a constitution and by-laws.

It was shown at the meeting that Carleton County produced the first barrel of apples grown in New Brunswick for market; that the county's export of apples for thirty-five years past was 350,000 barrels.

Vigorous protests were made at the attempts of outside foreign influences to change the name of the native apple, the "New Brunswick," to that of a foreign much inferior variety the "Duchess of Oldenburg."

The immediate cause for organizing is the seeming neglect of Carleton county and northern New Brunswick of the late activities of the horticultural department of the local government, and to demand recognition as the only present commercial apple section of the province.
