MONCTON PROS TRIMMED HALIFAX IN OWN RINK

Score 9 to 3—Imported Upper Canadian Players Starred in Game—5,000 People saw Contest—Big Surprise to Halifax Fans.

Halifax, N. S., Feb. 3.—Five thousand hockey fans from all parts of the Maritime Provinces, the greatest crowd that has ever witnessed a hockey game in Halifax, packed the Arena rink tonight and witnessed the greatest hockey game ever played in this city, in which the Moncton Victorias defeated the local players by a score of 9 to 3, and tied with Halifax in the struggle for the professional championship of the Maritime Provinces.

The result of the game was the greatest surprise ever sprung in hockey circles in the Maritime Provinces as it was thought the game would be fairly even and Halifax fans backed their team heavily to win.

In the first half Halifax had slightly the best of the play, scoring three goals to Moncton's two, but in the second half the local team was simply outclassed, Moncton scoring seven goals, while Halifax did not find the net once.

It was the work of Scott, Doran and Nichols that defeated the Halifax team. McNamara refereed in a satisfactory manner.

It was one of the greatest games ever played in Eastern Canada. BIG CROWD

Not even in the palmy days of hockey has there been more interest in a game and at seven o'clock last night the fans started to pour towards the rink in the hope that they could secure some of the seats that would entitle them to standing room. The plan was all sold out on Wednesday, so that hundreds had to take chances last night of getting rush tickets, and there were stirring scenes when the doors of the Arena swung open and one solid mass of humanity surged in.

AT LIGHTNING SPEED

The ice was like a sheet of glass, and play started out at a lightning clip. In the first half Halifax players had slightly the better of the play, scoring three goals to the visitors' two. When the teams left the ice at half time it looked as if the game would be a keen struggle and not even the most enthusiastic Moncton supporter in his wildest predictions expected to see the Victorias score six goals in the second half and Halifax none.

SECOND HALF

The result of the second half was the greatest surprise ever sprung in hockey circles in the Maritime Provinces and there is only one sane explanation and that is that the Halifax team was completely outclassed by seven of the greatest hockey players that could be secured for money between Halifax and Port William.

Moncton was determined to win the game and money was no object and they put a team on the ice last night that without doubt was, with one exception, the grandest aggregation of hockey players ever seen in this city.

No sooner had the teams faced off in the second half than it was plainly visible that Moncton was determined to win and not for one minute in this half did the Halifax players have a look in, as the score indicates the local players were outplayed and outclassed.

He was not only ordered to return the trophy he won, but also was suspended for four months. Unless reinstated earlier this will bar him from competing in the national championship here in April.

Notice of Legislation

The City of Fredericton will present at the next session of the Legislative Assembly, of New Brunswick Bills for enactment as follows:

(1) A Bill to extend the Water, Fire and Light limits of the City of Fredericton from O'Dell Avenue to the Hermitage (so called) and for authority to issue debentures in aid of such extension.

(2) A Bill in aid of John Palmer & Company, Limited, authorizing the City to enter into an agreement with the Company to guarantee and pay interest at the rate of five per cent. per annum on ten thousand dollars of the Company's debentures for the space of ten years, upon the erection by the Company of a new Factory and Warehouse in this city at a cost of not less than twenty-five thousand dollars, to provide a free site for such Factory and Warehouse by paying ground rent for the period of twenty-one years, and to grant exemption from taxes on such buildings of the company and free water from the city system for the period of ten years.

(3) A Bill revising and amending the Civic Election Laws of the City of Fredericton, and to provide for a secret ballot thereat, and the election of the Mayor and Aldermen for two years, one Alderman for each ward being elected annually.

(4) A Bill to confirm the issue of Street Debentures.
