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ITALIAN WARSHIPS ARE ON THE MOVE

Rome, Sept. 25—It is reported that an Italian Squadron consisting of the battleship Napoli and Roma, the armored cruisers Pisa, Amalfi, Giuseppe, Garibaldi, Varese and Francesco Ferruccio and two flotillas of destroyers and torpedo boats left Syracuse last night for Tripoli. The warships carried no troops and it is understood will confine their actions to the present watching the coast. They will interfere only in the event of an outbreak on the part of Turkey. No official confirmation of this can be obtained. There is the strictest censorship on the newspapers here, which are threatened with dire penalties if they publish anything concerning the naval and military movements.

The new government will have a plum in the form of the governorship of New Brunswick to hand out in February. The names of Chief Justice Barker, W. H. Thorne and Senator Wood are being mentioned in connection with the office.

PRESIDENT TAFT AT HUTCHINSON

Hutchinson, Kas., Sept. 26—All Hutchinson lent itself today to the reception of President Taft, who arrived in the city this morning for a visit of more than twenty-four hours. In honor of the occasion there was a general closing of all business houses and along the route of the procession from the centre of the city to the State Fair grounds, where the President reviewed the procession and delivered an address, residences and stores were covered with decorations in the national colors. The President and several visiting governors, with a large military escort, headed the procession, which was nearly ten miles in length and comprised many elaborate floats illustrating the history of progress of Kansas since her admission to Statehood fifty years ago.

J. M. ROBINSON & SONS WEEKLY STOCK MARKET REVIEW

St. John, Sept. 22—The stock market this week has been very full of interest, continuing in the early part of the week, the weakness and decline which has so long characterized its movements, culminating on Thursday in tremendous activity and rather undue weakness in Steel and Copper stocks.

From the present point of view, it is very difficult to understand the decline which had continued steadily for so many weeks without any rally as a general rule bear markets are characterized by sharp declines followed by rallies then quietness and a repetition, but in the present case it has been a steady and gradually falling off of price for the last two months, Thursday however seemed to mark the culmination of this movement for with sales of over one and a quarter millions shares, the general list held very well, United States Steel stocks particularly the preferred being the vulnerable points.

Conditions both in United States the United States, there is undoubtedly the United States there is undoubtedly business depression particularly in steel and cotton industries and while the agricultural crops will probably in the aggregate be well up to the average, the percentage of yield is not nearly so good as was expected. In Europe there is the political trouble between France and Germany which while in process of settlement has not yet reached a satisfactory conclusion and this through its effect on the Berlin financial markets and the selling of American stocks, has had a very weakening effect, labor troubles too are predominant particularly in Great Britain and this condition is also threatened on the American Railroad.

A further influence was the advance of the German Bank rate early in the week to 5 per cent followed by the Bank of England on Thursday to 4 per cent. Both these advances were expected but they nevertheless have had their effect. In New York and American Cities generally, money is easy and in plentiful supply and it is a remarkable feature of present conditions, that it is New York which is lending money abroad rather than being the borrower, as is usually the case; this condition has no doubt given rise to the story that J. P. Morgan was called upon to lend a large amount to protect Germany from panic.

CANADIAN MARKET

Canadian Markets have been particularly strong holding their position wonderfully in the face of declines in New York.

On Thursday the Montreal Exchange was closed owing to Elections the result of which has greatly pleased financial interests who regarded the Reciprocity agreement as a menace, fearing that it would shake British and foreign confidence in Canada as a field for investment, as a result the market on Friday opened several points higher and continued very strong with transactions; this is not to be wondered at since the majority of stocks listed in Montreal are either those of protected manufactures or those which derive a benefit directly or indirectly from protection, the verdict of the country leaves no room for doubt as to the policy which the Canadian Government will be called upon to pursue and establishes Canadian business more strongly than ever.

DR. W. W. DOHERTY REMANDED TO JAIL

Campbellton, Sept. 23—The preliminary hearing of Dr. W. W. Doherty charged with causing the death of Daniel J. Bruce, will be begun at Dalhousie on Friday next before Police Magistrate F. F. Mathewson Friday afternoon.

The quarrel which resulted in the tragedy occupied less than a minute. It is said Bruce was standing outside Ferguson Bros' store with Mr. McGinn a commercial traveller, talking when Dr. Doherty came along and addressing Bruce, said, "Come along in here, I want to speak to you."

The two walked into the store leaving McGinn on the steps outside. A moment later McGinn heard Dr. Doherty say, "Take that," and saw him jab Bruce with his umbrella at an inquest held Friday afternoon the jury returned a verdict to the effect that: "Deceased came to his death by means of a blow from an umbrella in the hands of Dr. W. W. Doherty." Immediately after the inquest, the prisoner was taken before Police Magistrate Mathewson and remanded as above till Friday.

Topeka, Kas., Sept. 25—Topeka will be President Taft's first stop after he leaves Hutchinson tomorrow morning. His visit here will be in connection with the big celebration now on, of the semi-centennial of Kansas as a State. While here he will lay the corner stone of the State Soldiers' Memorial Hall, which the State of Kansas is to erect at a cost of \$350,000 in memory of the Kansas soldiers who fought for the Union.
