A large audience saw Madame X
played at the City Opera House by
Miss Adelaide French and her com-
pany. The drama is in a prologue
and three acts, adapted by Jean
Raphael from the French by Alexan-
der Bisson. The play is typically
French, the plot centering about an
erring wife who is turned out of doors
by her husband but who is sustained
throughout her life by a love for her
son. Twenty years after leaving her
home she returns to France and
there murders the man who threat-
ens to reveal her identity to her
husband and son. She is tried for
the murder and is successfully de-
fended by her son, whom she recog-
nizes in the court-room. A reconcil-
iation with her husband is made im-
possible by her death.

Miss French in the title role, ably
sustained her well-deserved reputa-
tion as an actress. Albert A. Cre-
cellus as Louis Floriot and Arden
Le Sage as Raymond Floriot, played
difficult parts in an excellent way.
The support received from the other
members of the company was good
and the staging and scenery was in
all of the plays by Miss Adelaide
French's company, were far above
the average to which local play-
goers are accustomed.

winding up the bank's affairs would
proceed without delay.

TO BE REBUILT.

Globe.—It is the intention of the
Crystal Stream Steamship Company
to have the Sincennes, which was
recently burned at Cole's Island, re-
built. The hull was found to be in
much better condition below the
water line than at first was thought.
However, several plates will have to
be replaced near the top. The work
will commence in the near future.
New machinery will be installed and
it is the intention of the company
to make her one of the fastest, if
not the fastest, boat on the river.
The cabins will not be built out like
the old boat, but will be narrower.
If all goes well the boat should be
completed and ready for the opening
of navigation next spring.

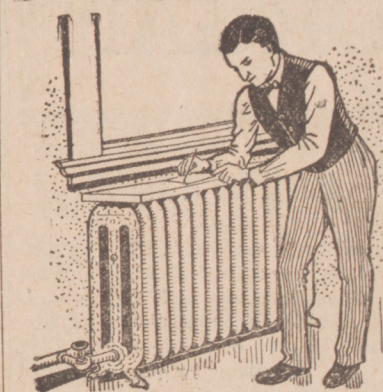
