TY COBB LIKELY TO WIN AMERICAN BATTING HONORS

George Jackson of Boston, Leading National League Batsman with Ten-point Margin but had Bad Slump Last Week

George Jackson of the Rustlers is still at the top of the National League hitters, and he holds the honor position by a comfortable margin, notwithstanding that he has had something of a slump and his average is 20 points lower than a week ago. Jackson, however, has not been the only one to suffer a setback in hitting. Wagner has not yet gotten his batting eye back and is six points lower than a week ago. Almeida, Meyers and R. Miller all fell off last week, and the whole league now presents only 10 players hitting .300 or better, four fewer than last week. The records:

DEL REY, PACING SENSATION OF STATE OF CALIFORNIA

Three-year-old Stallion Worked Mile in 2.05 1-4 Unpaced—By Nutwood Wilkes

California has another pacing sensation in the 3-year-old Del Rey, who has worked in 2.08½. The following from the Breeder and Sportsman tells that he is not to be held over as he continues to show championship form.

"Among the many surprises that attracted the attention of the thousands who assembled at the race track. Sacramento, last Thursday was the remarkable fast workout given to the pacing 3-year-old stallion Del Rey by his trainer and driver, Charles De Ryder.

"Without any runner, and just on his courage, this colt paced the mile in the record-breaking time of 2.05½, covering the last half in 1.02. He will be taken to Phoenix and over that fast track will be sent to lower all records for colts of his age. He has already done this, but it is the opinion of competent horsemen that he will pace close to two minutes.

"Del Rey is a remarkably well-developed colt. He stands close to 16 hands, is a deep, dark bay in color, with one hind foot, white. He is noted for his intelligence and love for racing. No horse apparently enjoys more. He is by Nutwood Wilkes, 2.16½, owned by Robert Wilson, Spruce Lawn farm, Springfield, O. His dam is Ramona, by Demonio, 2.11½, second dam Corrollow (dam of Ben F, 2.07½), by Steinway, 2.25½; third dam Lady Winkler, by Signal.

"Del Rey traces twice to Strathmore, through Demonio and Steinway and twice to George Wilkes through his sire and Alcantara, 2.23, sire of the dam of Demonio. He was bred by James W. Marshall of Dixon, who sold him to Messrs. Hazard & Silva of Dixon. Del Rey was not entered in any of the futurity stakes, and as his



DEPARTMENT OF THE NAVAL SERVICE

A competitive examination will be held in November next at the examination centres of the Civil Service Commission for the entry of Naval Cadets for the Naval Service of Canada; there will be 25 vacancies.

Candidates must be between the ages of 14 and 16 years on the 1st of January next; must be British subjects and must have resided in Canada for two years immediately preceding the examination; short periods of absence abroad for purpose of education to be considered as residence.

Successful candidates will join the Royal Naval College at Halifax, in January next; the course at the College is two years and the cost to parents, including board, lodging, uniform and all expenses is approximately \$400 for the first year and \$250 for the second year.

On passing out of College, Cadets will be rated midshipmen, and will receive pay at the rate of \$2 per diem.

Parents of intending candidates should make application to the Secretary Civil Service Commission, Ottawa, before the 15th October next.

Further information can be obtained on application to the Secretary, Department of Naval Service, Ottawa, N.B.
