WRIT OF HABEAS
CORPUS GRANTED
IN WADE CASE

Arrest of Prominent Sunbury and Queens' Conservatives May be Made

Judge Wilson this morning granted a writ of habeas corpus returnable before Magistrate White at Burton tomorrow at noon for the release of James Wade of Waasis who was arrested on Thursday last at the instigation of Conservative heeleders in Sunbury County on the charge of violating the provisions of the Election Act at Waasis poll. In event of the service of the writ being contested one of the most sensational cases in connection with an election in New Brunswick will begin.

EVIDENCE SECURED

Col. H. H. McLean the Liberal candidate in Queens-Sunbury and those who worked for him in that constituency in the recent campaign have obtained evidence of the most bare-faced violation of the election act on the part of those who worked for the Conservative candidate and it is probable that a large number of arrests will follow any move of his opponents. The parties against whom such evidence has been secured are not of the ordinary run of political "heelers" but are among the leading Conservatives of Sunbury. It is known that at the Sheffield poll more than twelve ballots cast for the Conservative candidate were marked in such a manner as to be identified afterward. There is also a well founded suspicion that in Chipman, Queens County similar methods were used to destroy the majority which it was certain Col. McLean would have received there had the election been conducted properly. In Lincoln gross corruption is alleged on the part of the Conservative workers and arrests in that parish may be expected.

FUNERAL AT WAASIS

The funeral of the late Mrs Elizabeth P. Nason took place yesterday afternoon from her late home at Waasis. Interment was made in the Baptist Cemetery, Rusiagornish, the funeral service being conducted by Rev. T. B. Bell. The deceased departed this life on Saturday, death being caused by nervous prostration with complications. She was thirty-six years of age and is survived by her husband Mr. Leslie R. Nason, and seven children. The deceased was a daughter of Mrs Lewis Gereau of Waasis.

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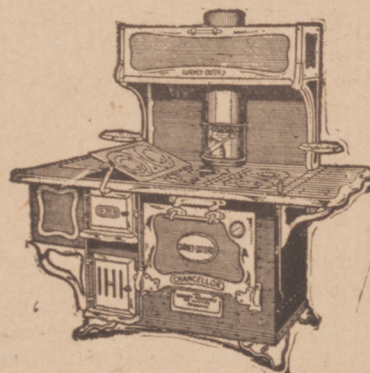
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
