OMAHA WOOLGROWERS DEMAND PROTECTION

Omaha, Dec. 14—Fifteen hundred men who are as familiar with the names of Cotswolds, Hampshires, Angoras, Rambouillets and other varieties of sheep and goats as their are with their A, B, C's gathered in Omaha today for the opening of the forty-eighth annual convention of the National Wool Growers' Association. In the size and representative character of the attendance, the convention has never been eclipsed in the history of the association which is one of the oldest live stock organizations in America. While the majority of the delegates come from the west there are many in attendance from Ohio, Kentucky and other wool growing States east of the Mississippi river.

The flockmasters believe that the wool growing industry in the United States has reached a critical stage in its existence and they have come to the convention prepared for exhaustive discussion and vigorous action. Schedule "K" and the report of the tariff board will be the leading subjects of consideration. A vast array of statistics will be offered to show that the sheepmen are not responsible for the present high prices of clothing and other wool products. On the contrary it is declared that they have not been making any money for several years. For the past year, it is stated the wool men have actually lost money, because the manufacturers as a result of the tariff agitation would not buy except on a free trade basis.

The convention will demand that the American Wool growers be given that degree of protection which is represented in the differences in the cost of producing a pound of wool in the United States and in foreign countries. The association believes that the importance of the industry justifies its protection at the hands of Congress. Attention is called the fact that 19 per cent of the people of Wyoming are dependent on the wool growing industry. In Missouri there are 54,000 wool growers, 42,000 in Iowa and large numbers in numerous other States.

The three days of the convention will be notable for the prominence of many of the speakers as well as the importance of the subjects discussed. Senator Dora of Idaho is scheduled for an address on conservation. F. J. Hagenbarth of Spencer Iowa will speak on "Schedule K and its Relation to the Wool Growers." Other speakers and their topics will include the following: "Wool Growing and the Tariff," Senator Joseph M. Dixon of Montana; "Breeding of American Plants and Men," M. M. Hayes Assistant Secretary of Agriculture; "Consumers vs Producers," Congressman A. M. Buckler of Colorado; "Wool Growing in South America," Joseph E. Wing of the national tariff board; "Importance of Sheep to the Farmer," Y. J. Knollin of Chicago; "Tariff on Meats," Judge S. H. Cowan of Port Worth; "Wool Growers and Their Neighbors," Dr. J. M. Wilson of Douglas Wyo.

The officers in charge of the convention are: President F. E. Gooding, former governor of Idaho, Western vice president George Austin, Salt Lake City; Eastern vice president, A. J. Knollin, Chicago, treasurer, Frank E. Miracle, Helena, Mont.; and secretary S. W. McClure, Gooding, Idaho.

THIEF WHO MADE A QUICK CHANGE

CLOSING OF AGENCIES A POLITICAL MOVE

Boston, Dec. 13—"The closing of the Canadian immigration agencies is purely a political move by Premier Borden," in my opinion," said Thos. Hetherington of New Brunswick, the Boston Agent of the Canadian Immigration Service, this morning.

In pursuance of a plan of the Canadian Government to close its long established immigration agencies in the United States, Mr. Hetherington, who has his headquarters in the Tremont building, has received orders to close the office on Dec. 30th. "In Canada it is not customary to remove a government employee from office without a specific reason, or unless he has committed a political offense," continued Mr. Hetherington, "and I believe the disposing of the immigration agents by the Borden administration to be only temporary in order that the present Laurier staff may be replaced later on by men of Mr. Borden's party."

"There can be no question as to the success of the immigration service. Last year over 60,000 immigrants entered Canada carrying an average of \$1,000 each. Of these 1,200 were sent directly by the Boston office, and as many more through its influence.

"The apprehension that the enormous influx from the United States will result in a strong pro-American sentiment in Canada may seem consistent with the cry of American annexation used by Mr. Borden in his recent campaign, but I do not think that Mr. Borden or his cabinet believe that there is the slightest danger from this source. This anti-American sentiment was aroused merely that the Borden party might swing the election.

CHINESE NEWSPAPER ATTACKS FOREIGNERS

Shanghai, Dec. 14.—Sin Wan Pao, the leading Chinese newspaper in Shanghai, makes a strong attack upon the "four power" financiers, who, it alleges, are about to pay an instalment of railroad fund to Premier Yuan Shi Kai for war purposes.

The newspaper says that this is evidence that the foreigners are helping to kill the Chinese by assisting the Manchus and calls on the Chinese to help themselves. The foreign chamber of commerce at Shanghai has adopted a resolution protesting against all loans to the head administration.

The New York Peace Society, of which Andrew Carnegie is president, has appealed to Italy to submit her troubles with Turkey to The Hague.


