Lynch was re-elected president of the National League for one more year at a short session today at the Waldorf-Astoria, the feature of the election being the flip-flop made by Pres. Charles W. Murphy of Chicago, who with the insurgent band and voted with the Hermann-Dreyfuss combination, giving Mr. Lynch his office by a 6-to-5 vote.

**PITTSBURG DISAPPOINTED
OVER SALE OF BOSTON CLUB**

Pittsburg, Dec. 13—Keen was the disappointment felt by a number of Pittsburg capitalists this afternoon when words came that the Boston National League baseball club has been sold to New Yorkers.

Shortly after the death of Wm. Hepburn Russell there was organized in Pittsburg a company composed of five or six wealthy sportsmen, and B. Power was authorized to get into communication with William Beverly Winslow, representing the Russell estate. This was done and after considerable correspondence Mr. Power made Winslow an offer of \$175 per share for 945 shares of the Boston National League club stock.

**BOARD OF ARBITRATION
MAKES AWARDS OF PLAYERS**

New York, Dec. 15—The board of arbitration of organized baseball clubs settled today the dispute between the Hartford, Conn., club and the Kewanee, Ill., club for the services of pitcher William Powers by awarding Powers to Kewanee. Pitcher "Lefty" McDonald, claimed by the New Bedford, Mass., club and the Hamilton, Ont., club, was awarded to New Bedford.

The claim by Joseph Sheehan against the Eastern (now the International League) was disallowed, as was the claim by Robert Spade against the Newark of the same league.

BEATEN IN PARIS
BY FRENCHMAN**

Harry Lewis Went Full Route in a
Twenty-round Bout but Lost on
Points

Paris, Dec. 13—Carpenter, the 17-year-old French welterweight champion, won the decision over Harry Lewis, the American pugilist, in a 20-round fight at the Cirque de Paris tonight. The fight went the limit and carpenter won on points.

Among the spectators were hundreds of women in evening gowns. They applauded the decision of the judges which was unanimous in the Frenchman's favor.

In the early rounds, Carpenter had all the better of the bout. He succeeded in closing Lewis' eye and in the 10th punished the America severely. After some stalling, Lewis came up fresh for the 15th. He jabbed Carpenter repeatedly and his blow had considerable force. He held his own until the fight was called at the end of the 20th, but the Frenchman had shown better form throughout the contest.

Jack Johnson, the world's champion, was present and was introduced to the spectators. The fight was for a stake of \$5000, of which \$3000 went to the winner.
